

# \$13 Million Liquor Boost Sought in California To Relieve Small Taxpayer

SACRAMENTO (AP) — A \$13,750,000 boost in liquor levies emerged today as the only part of an administration plan to shift a 20 million dollar tax load from low bracket state income taxpayers.

Assemblyman Marvin Sherwin (R-Piedmont) declared he would appeal directly to the Assembly to overrule its Revenue - Taxation Committee in sidetracking two companion proposals for a bigger tax bite on beer and the state's

share of taxes. Opponents termed the tax - shift plan a political "fastie."

The action came late Thursday night in the midst of meetings by both houses—the Assembly worked beyond midnight — in the sudden legislative rush to beat the ap-

proaching deadline. The session ends a week from Wednesday. The Senate, as expected, passed tax by 1 1/2 cents—from 4 1/2 to 3 cents a gallon. The vote was 22 to 10. The Assembly has approved two bills calling for a 1 cent

increase for a speedup in highway building. There were objections in the upper house against the new county by county formula for spending the billion dollars expected to be produced by the 1 1/2 cent measure in 10 years.

The Assembly, meanwhile, voted gross receipts tax on for - hire trucks. Deadlocking 35 to 35, it defeated a controversial civil rights bill. The legislation, requiring 41 votes, sought to permit civil suits against employers or labor unions, for

racial or religious discrimination. The Assembly committee took these actions on the administration tax-shifting plan. Voted 12 to 8 to recommend raising the tax on hard liquor from 80 cents to \$1.50 a gallon. Defeated, without a record roll call, a measure to increase the state's take of pari-mutuel revenues at Santa Anita and Hollywood tracks by \$2,350,000 a year. Agreed, 15 to 5, to refer a third bill seeking an additional 2 cents \$3,500,000 a year—to an interim committee for further study.

# 'Reactionary Led,' Morse Says Of Associated Press

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) said Wednesday the Associated Press is owned by publishers who are by and large "reactionary businessmen" and that it is a "slanted news reporting service."

who wrote the story after an interview with Morse, said Morse gave every indication of being very angry. He said Morse used bitter and disparaging remarks about other senators. However, Morse said the story was a "lie." He said that instead of being mad, he was quite amused.

Morse declared in a Senate speech that such publishers do not like an outspoken "representative of the independent party." And he said the AP had a "bunch of clever writers skilled in the use of snide, reputation-assassinating adjectives."

"Of course, I did not agree with the result," Morse said. "I said the fight has just started." I said in good-naturedly, as far as the principle that I defended on the floor of the Senate was concerned. There was no anger about it. I fight hard, but I fight professionally."

# Portland Host To 2 Ag Groups

PORTLAND (AP) — Agricultural officials from 11 Western states British Columbia Mexico and Hawaii will meet here next week in two separate groups. E. L. Peterson state agriculture director said the Western Area Standardization Conference will be held Monday and Tuesday and the Western Plant Board will open a three-day meeting Wednesday.

That suggestion was made in a resolution at a Grange meeting here. The Grange also protested the Interior Department decision to withdraw its opposition to construction of dams on the Snake by the Idaho Power Co.

The Oregon senator has made several attacks on the Associated Press in recent months. After the Senate recessed, AP Reporter Kelly asked Morse for an explanation of the senator's remarks about Kelly's story. Morse refused to discuss it, and ordered Kelly to leave the room "or I'll have you removed."

# Portland's Ship Base Dedicated


PORTLAND — Portland's new 3 1/2 million dollar ship repair base was dedicated Thursday by Gov. Paterson who said the new facility would improve Portland vastly as a seaport. The new unit centralizes repair facilities. A 1667-foot pier and two 15000-ton drydocks are at the repair base on Swan Island.
