Co-hostesses with Mrs. Brown were Mrs. Claude Brown and Mrs. Dick Boten. Refreshments were served at the afternoon close.

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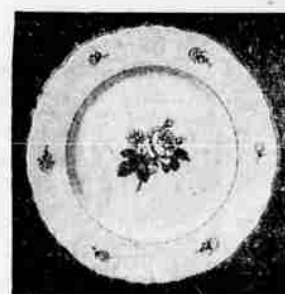
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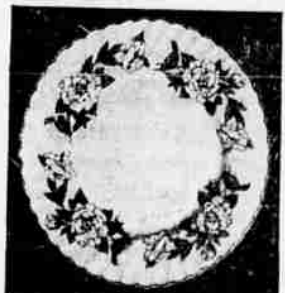
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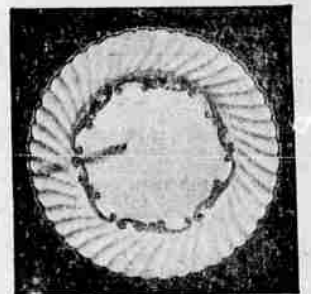
1 . . . VICTORIA, the beloved rose in rare beauty on a creamy background—buds dance on graceful rim.
