

# Glenn Ford Proves He's Tough On Leading Ladies

HOLLYWOOD—"I hear you're tough on your leading ladies. Well, we'll see about that."

That was Ann Sheridan's comment to Glenn Ford when they met on the first day of "Rage of the Jungle." She learned in a hurry. They went right into a scene in which he grabbed her arms and wopped her across her pretty face.

"I found out about that boy," she sighed later. "I was black and blue for two days. Glenn looks like the gentle sort, but honey, it's always the gentle sort who are roughest with their women."

Ford has been slapping dames on the screen almost since the start of his postwar film career. "I guess I'm typed," he shrugs.

It's an odd kind of typing for the soft-spoken, Quebec-born actor. He all started when he dealt Rita Hayworth some open-handed blows in "Gilda."

"I knocked her almost across the room," he remarked with a degree of pride. "But she got back at me. She had a scene in which she slugged me across both sides of the face. The blows loosened two teeth, and I had to have them replaced."

The "Gilda" flicker was wildly acclaimed in Spain and other Latin countries. Ever since then, Ford has been billed as "The Woman Killer" in those countries.

Ford continued his slugging match with Hayworth, dealing her slaps in "Loves of Carmen" and "Affair in Trinidad." Among the other dolls he has battered around are Ida Lupino in "Lust for Gold" and Diana Lynn in "Plunder of the Sun." He explained his technique.

"It's hard to fake a slap. You

can slug a guy on the screen and miss his chin by inches, the action happens so fast that nobody knows the difference. But a slap is different. It has to be the real McCoy. Otherwise you don't get the right reaction.

"I do it in one take. I give 'em a real, honest-to-goodness slap and get it over with. That's much better than the way these new fellows try to pull their punches. They don't get it right the first time. When a gal has to get slapped seven or eight times—that's when she gets hurt."

Does he subscribe to the Noel Coward epigram that "A woman should be struck regularly, like a gong?"

"Oh, no," he answered hurriedly. "Don't get me into anything like that. Think of the trouble I could get into at home if I were quoted as saying that!"

## Unethical Doctors Should Be Smacked

NEW YORK UP—The old and new presidents of the American Medical Association Monday called doctors to act vigorously against their colleagues charged with unethical practices.

The establishment of mediation committees by all county medical societies to hear patients' complaints was asked by Dr. Louis H. Bauer, of Hempstead, N.Y., retiring AMA president, and Dr. Edward J. McCormick, of Toledo, O., who becomes president Tuesday night.

Such practices as fee-splitting and ghost surgery were mentioned by Bauer, while McCormick said "the doctor who overcharges" hampers medical profession efforts to build public understanding.

## Vet's Mailbag

Since Spring term at many schools close at various dates during the first half of June, veteran students studying under the Korean G.I. Bill have been advised by the Veterans Administration to file changes of address with the VA if they plan to interrupt their training during the summer vacation period.

Training allowances for May, the VA pointed out, will go into the mails before June 29, which in most cases will be after the students have moved from their school addresses.

In the same manner, training allowance payments for attendance during any portion of June will not, in most cases, be paid before July 20, the same procedure which has been in effect during the entire school year.

A new mailing address included on the monthly certification by the veteran when he signs his certification of attendance for May will be accepted by the VA and the veteran may file a formal "Request for Change of Address" form at the time his certification is submitted.

The VA said the latter method is preferred, because there is less chance of delay in processing checks through the finance office.

A. Under your present arrangement, you would not be permitted to take the training. The law requires that you be assured of control of your farm—either by ownership, lease or some other arrangement so that you will be free to put into practice what you learn in school.

## Well-Covered Crowning Here

Basin radio listeners will enjoy the most comprehensive coverage of any international event in years on Tuesday when broadcast of Queen Elizabeth's coronation ceremonies from London is on the air starting at 4:30 a.m. PST.

Throughout the day, Klamath Falls' two radio stations will carry coronation programs.

KFLW will go on the air at 4:30 a.m. with direct coverage from London through the facilities of the American Broadcasting Co.

The departure of Queen Elizabeth and her royal entourage correspondents will follow the procession to Buckingham and describe the coronation ceremonies which will be climaxed by the crowning of Queen Elizabeth II. This broadcast is expected to terminate at approximately 7:30 a.m. PST.

Again Tuesday from 3:05 to 3:45 p.m., KFLW will air a program from the British Broadcasting Co., "Long Live the Queen."

This program will feature short talks by Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill and the prime ministers of Canada, New Zealand, South Africa, Pakistan and Northern Ireland. Queen Elizabeth will also be heard in her first official address to the British Nation and Commonwealth. The Queen will be presented by Prime Minister Churchill. The program will be narrated by Robert Donat, famous English stage and screen star.

For the benefit of persons unable to hear the daytime broadcast, KFLW will present "Coronation Highlights" from 8 to 8:30 p.m. PST.

The first coronation broadcast by Station KFLW is scheduled for 6 to 7 a.m. PST. Coronation Ceremonies will be aired again by KFLW from 8:30 to 9 a.m. PST. Special "Coronation Highlights" will be heard from 5 to 5:30 p.m. PST. Another coronation program is scheduled from 10 p.m. to 10:55 p.m. PST.

## State Weekend Toll Set at 5

Five persons, three of them children, were killed in Oregon in the long Memorial Holiday week end.

Gene D. Harbison, 9, son of Mrs. Juanita Harbison, Portland, was fatally crushed under the wheels of a freight car Saturday as he was chasing pigeons in a railroad yard.

One-year-old Marvin Pruett was killed at Medford Saturday when an automobile being backed out of a driveway at his home, ran over him.

John Ralph Erickson, 9, drowned in a gravel pit pool near Portland Sunday when he stepped into a deep hole while hunting for tadpoles with two companions.

Sherman Jensen, 16, of Portland, was injured fatally when his automobile ran off a Lower Columbia River Highway embankment early Sunday. Police said the youth apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

Mrs. Ann L. Cass, about 60, of Portland, was killed when struck by an automobile as she crossed an intersection at Eugene Friday night.

## Lost Bomber Found; 10 Dead

NORTH BEND, Ore. (AP)—The bodies of 10 Canadian Air Force men were to be brought down from Iron Mountain, south of here Monday.

They were killed last Tuesday when the B-61 Lancaster bomber crashed into the Coast Range ridge 43 miles southeast of here.

A ground party, which reached the wreckage Sunday, reported that if the plane had been 100 feet higher, it would have missed the 4,000-foot ridge.

Several bodies and parts of the huge plane were found on the other side of the peak. Three other bodies were found in the demolished fuselage.

The Coos County coroner, Brewer Mills, said all were killed outright by the force of the impact.

The wreckage first was sighted by a U. S. Coast Guard search plane Saturday after smoke was seen rising in the area. The smoke was timber which had been set afire by the crash.

On Sunday a ground party led by Canadian Air Force Squadron Leader J. Drake of Comox Air Base, B. C., reached the scene. Also in the party were representatives from the Coast Guard, the U. S. Forest Service, and Oregon State Police.

The plane, on a flight from Comox to San Diego, disappeared early Tuesday. Its last reported position was off the Oregon Coast north of here.

DUNSMUIR—Funeral services were held at 11 a.m. today in the Dunsmuir Methodist Church for Charles Edward McComie, 84, retired Southern Pacific locomotive engineer, under the auspices of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and the Odd Fellows Lodge.

The Rev. Robert M. DeWolf officiating. Interment was in the Dunsmuir Cemetery.

Affectionately known to his host of friends as "Mac," he died here suddenly Thursday, May 28. A resident of Dunsmuir for 40 years, McComie came from Sacramento where he began work as a fireman July 17, 1894, and was promoted to engineer Nov. 1, 1899.

Born Nov. 29, 1868, in Salt Lake City, Utah, he was one of a family of eight children. He had never married.

He was a member of the board of directors of the Dunsmuir branch, Bank of America, and made his home in the Travelers Hotel.

He is survived by cousins Mrs. G. B. Osborn of Oakland and Vernon A. Roach of Piedmont, Calif., who came for the services. Noble's Chapel was in charge of arrangements.
