WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Hollifield (D-Calif.) Monday declared the Eisenhower administration cutbacks in funds for atomic powered aircraft carriers and planes were timed to fit in with demands for concessions to private industry in the atomic field.

Hollifield, a member of the Senate House Committee on Atomic Energy, made the charge in a speech for House delivery.

72 Ways to Keep Baby's Milk Moving Steadily In

WASHINGTON (AP) — Parents: Next time junior's bottle stops up and he splits the night with his howls, take heart.

You have not faced this crisis alone. The Smithsonian Institution is authority for the disclosure that no fewer than 72 patents have been issued to inventors of special types of air vents to keep the formula flowing smoothly from the bottle into junior. The nonstoppage nipple, if indeed it has not already been invented, may be just around the corner.

US Firm Bid Under British

SEATTLE (AP) — An American firm, Westinghouse Corp., of Pittsburgh, has underbid a British competitor to build four generators for Chief Joseph Dam in the second call for bids.

The Pittsburgh firm's bid, the district Army engineer announced Monday, was the apparent low, at \$4,299,822. English Electric Export and Trading Co., London, was the apparent runner-up, at \$4,387,523.

The Westinghouse offer, was \$666,541 under its bid of last December 3, while the English company slashed their's only \$8,970.

After the British firm submitted a much lower bid in December, the Army engineers called for rebids. Severe criticism followed in England, but Defense Department officials replied that specifications varied among the bidders.

He condemned what he described as "self-serving efforts to soften up" the basic legislation giving the Federal government exclusive sway in the atomic energy field and said major changes in the law would be "premature, ill-considered and unwise."

Hollifield said there is "a bold-faced bid to withdraw from the U.S. government the exclusive ownership of bomb-making materials and to make possible the issuance of restrictive patents to private firms."

"Some industrial spokesmen," he said, are "trying to sell a bill of goods to the American people by exaggerating the prospects for atom power use . . . Some companies want to take over the job of manufacturing plutonium for atomic bombs, selling the plutonium in a high-priced government guaranteed market and developing atomic power for industrial use as a by-product."

The Atomic Energy Commission made public Saturday night concrete ideas for building industrial atomic energy plants, prepared for it by eight private industrial firms. All agreed that building and operating such plants within the next few years was technically feasible. But they were much less specific on whether such plants could produce power at a cost competitive with power from conventional sources.

This and other facets of nursing bottle lore are offered the public in an exhibit the institution has just opened on the evolution of nursery necessities. The bottle accounts for 232 patents.

The rise and fall of the long sucking tube is depicted. It was patented in 1864 as an invention designed so that a baby "can take the reservoir in its arms and the spout in the mouth," but lost popularity after 50 years.

Charles M. Winsup of Roxbury, Mass., obtained the first nursing bottle patent in the U. S. in 1841. The rubber nipple was patented four years later. In the interval, nipples were of ivory or silver—the latter perhaps for infants born with silver spoons in their mouths.

Brand New Swing Falls, Kills Boy

HOPKINTON, Ia. (AP)—Paul Ehls, 6, stood by eagerly while a new metal swing was erected in his yard here.

The boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Ehls, was happily swinging away when the metal framework suddenly toppled over, striking him in the back. He died a few hours later at a Monticello, Ia., hospital.

State Rejects Insurance Plan

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Insurance Department Monday rejected the filing of the Mutual Insurance Rating Bureau to reduce automobile insurance rates in some cases.

The filing would have given a 20 per cent reduction to automobile owners who have youthful drivers under parental control, but would have increased the rates up to 32 per cent for young drivers who are not under parental control.

The department said it turned down the request because it discriminated between individuals solely because of the marital status and status of parenthood, without being able to prove that people with children are safer drivers than those without children, or that married persons are better drivers than the unmarried.

The department urged the bureau to find a way to reduce rates for accident-free drivers, without going into their marital status or parenthood.

Hospital Oxygen Tanks Explode

COLUMBUS, O. (AP) — Oxygenated tanks exploded Monday in a small frame building adjoining Children's Hospital. Fire spread to the hospital's laundry but fireproof walls prevented the flames from engulfing the main structure.

While huge clouds of reddish smoke billowed, parents and nurses carried most of the 200 patients to a nurses residence across the street. They were brought back to their beds when the fire was under control.

No patient was injured. Lewis Jacobs, a hospital maintenance man, and three firemen were hurt, none seriously.

Damage was unofficially estimated at several thousand dollars.

If You Want To Get A Man, Wear Red And Purple

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—If you want to get a man, wear red and purple. Of course, the knack landing a male is somewhat more complicated than that. But designer Edith Head advises that red and purple are colors which are the greatest stimulants to romance.

"Red denotes a quiet, smoldering kind of sex," she remarked. "Purple is the more explosive, passionate color. Put red and purple together in the same outfit—and watch out!"

Miss Head is a petite brunette who leans to softer shades in her own smart attire. Perhaps this is so she won't take the play away from the glamor girls she dresses. At any rate, she is all hepped up on this color business, and she says it's based on science, not fancy.

"Some of us designers attended a color institute recently," she explained. "We were addressed by a doctor who treats mental patients at veterans hospitals. He told us that colors very definitely play a part in our temperament. He found that his patients reacted violently to certain colors and were soothed by others.

"Red and purple incite sex instincts. Natural colors—the brown of the earth, grey of stone and green of foliage—are restful to the mind. The depressive colors are lark brown and muddy grey, such as you might find under rocks.

"The doctors' waiting rooms are most effective in green or some other restful color. The doctor told us never to disregard it when someone says that he or she can't stand a certain color. That color probably does have a bad effect on them."

Miss Head is demonstrating these theories in the current color musical, "Red Garters." (It's a Western fantasy, not a sequel to "Red Shoes.")

As in conventional melodramas, the villain (Gene Barry) will be dressed in black and the hero (Guy Mitchell) in white. The leading lady, Rosemary Clooney, will appear in a sexy red. Pat Crowley wears an innocent blue, and Joanne Gilbert starts out in black and white. There's because you don't know whether she's going to be good or bad. She ends up in the red.

There are five torrid dance hall girls in the picture, and they'll be in purple and red, natch. At least from the color standpoint, the film is shaping up as the sexiest in years.

The designer has glamorized a large number of female stars, and hated green. She not only wouldn't wear it, but didn't want it in the same room. An indoor girl at heart, Barbara Stanwyck refused to wear brown, and red is verboten on Betty Hutton. Jane Russell is a sucker for red and purple, which may partially explain her success.

"I find that many of the newer crop of actresses—like Rosemary Clooney, Audrey Hepburn and Joanne Gilbert—are crazy about white," Miss Head added. "This is probably a trend, but I didn't know what the explanation is."

What about the men? Seems color psychology should also work for us. But we go on wearing the same drab hues year after year.

"Maybe that's what's wrong with civilization," Miss Head mused.

Footprints Lead To 2 Buried Boys

HAVRE, Mont. (AP) — Their footprints led to the discovery of two small Havre boys who apparently suffocated when a rain-soaked mound of dirt crumbled and buried them in an eight-foot ditch.

Coroner Emil Ellason said James D. Bays of Havre found the footprints Sunday and followed them to find the bodies of Ted Turner, 7, and George Meras, 8. The ditch was part of a project for a new school building.

Parents of the boys, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Turner and Mr. and Mrs. George Meras, said they had been missing since mid-afternoon.

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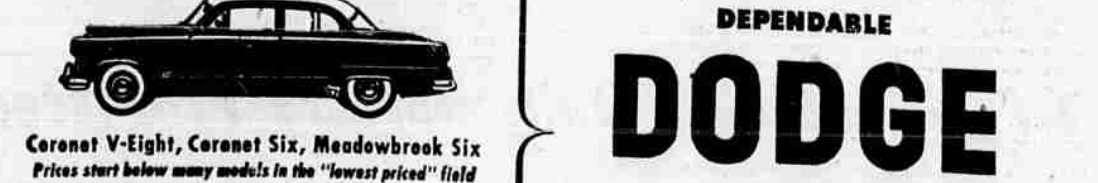
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
