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Ike TV Report To US Tonight
 WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower makes his first television report to the people tonight, apparently to bear down on the idea that in such perilous times spending must come down, but not too much and taxes remain up.
 Four Cabinet members will be on the program, too, taking their cues from the President and from big printed cards outside camera range.
 The broadcast is scheduled for 8:30 p. m., Eastern Standard Time.
 Reports were there might be some word on a new "goldfish bowl policy" of publicity for tax enforcement cases, perhaps to emphasize that the administration is trying to clean up what Eisenhower has called "the mess in Washington."
 But there were no advance signs the half-hour TV show would produce any major announcements. The White House says the program is intended largely to tell the people what the administration has done, and why, in its first four months.

"Counselor" Gets Probation For Reckless Driving
 MILWAUKEE (AP) — Ronald Zakowski, 19, was convicted of reckless driving yesterday even though he never touched the steering wheel.
 He was a passenger Saturday night in the auto in which John R. Ritzel, 18, led police on a 40-mile chase. Officers said Zakowski advised Fritzel on the progress of police pursuit.
 Civil Judge Leo B. Hanley said Zakowski was as much of a reckless driver as Fritzel and cited a state law which says one who "counsels" a law violator may be charged with the same offense.
 Both youths were placed on probation and had their driver's licenses suspended for one year.

Wheat Pact Okay Asked
 WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower asked the Senate Tuesday for speedy ratification of the revised 45-nation international wheat agreement.
 The President said in a brief special message he hoped the Senate would act so this government can take final action to put the agreement into effect by July 15.
 The agreement was completed in April and all the world's leading wheat exporting and importing nations have signed except Great Britain.
 Britain would not go along because of the maximum price of \$2.05 a bushel provided in the pact. She would not agree to more than \$2.00. The minimum is \$1.65.
 The agreement can still be put in force by the other nations, though the British holdout means that less of the world's total supply will be traded under the rule.
 The pact represents an effort to stabilize the world wheat market by a system of export and import quotas, and a range of specified prices. The agreement which the new one supercedes provided a maximum of about \$1.65.

Soviets Agree To Chess Match
 NEW YORK (AP) — Russia's top chess players have agreed to meet an American team in a tournament here starting July 15, but there is still a question whether the Russians will get visas to this country.
 This was announced Tuesday by Harold M. Phillips, president of the U.S. Chess Federation.
 Phillips said he had been informed in a cablegram from Folke Rogard of Stockholm, president of the International Chess Federation, that the Russians had wired Rogard they would be ready for the July 15 date.
 Phillips said the Russian cablegram informed him that members of the Soviet team had applied for U.S. visas for the match. He said he understood there would be no U.S. government statement on the likelihood of the visas being approved until official notification reaches the State Department of the visa applications.
 Russian and American teams played a 2-to-2 tie in the Olympics, but the Russians finished first in the journey to the Americans' fifth place.

New Milk-Pricing Mode Announced
 CORVALLIS (AP) — A milk pricing proposal, based on the energy value of milk, was announced Tuesday by the Oregon State College dairy department.
 P. M. Brandt, head of the dairy department, and G. A. Richardson, dairy professor, have compiled a group of tables evaluating milk according to energy and apportioning the energy between fat and solid non-fat.
 They said a milk evaluating system should include such matters as paying producers according to the use made of milk, a seasonal price adjustment, a workable pooling method, and an industry promotion program.

French Crisis Delays Meet
 PARIS (AP) — The Foreign Office said Wednesday the date of the big three meeting in Bermuda hinges on the outcome of France's ministerial crisis.
 An informal exchange of notes has been made between the United States, Britain and France on the subject and it has been agreed that no positive date can be set until France has a government.
 It originally had been planned for President Eisenhower, Prime Minister Churchill and the French premier to meet June 17. Foreign Office sources said.

USS Caine Underway On \$2 1/2 Million Mutinous Trip

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The embattled USS Caine gets under way this week on a \$2 1/2 million dollar voyage into mutinous waters.
 Commanding this crew is the ace director, Edward Dmytryk, who has been commissioned by the Stanley Kramer Company.
 Many people said it was a voyage that never could be made. The Navy would never give permission for a film version of "The Caine Mutiny," they predicted. Dmytryk, an earnest, athletic-looking fellow,

explained to me the reasons for the doubts.
 "When the book first came out," he related, "two studios thought they might buy it. They submitted synopses of the story to the Navy Department. These synopses were hurried and crude and distorted the true story. The Navy turned thumbs down."
 But Stanley Kramer was undaunted. He plunked down an estimated \$65,000 to author Harman Wouk and submitted nothing to the Navy until he had a completed script by Stanley Roberts. The buy is the biggest film bargain since David Selznick laid out \$50,000 for "Gone With the Wind." "Caine" is still on best-seller lists after 18 months.

The Navy is offering full co-operation for the picture. It has assigned as technical advisor Comdr. James C. Shaw, a St. Paul, Minn., veteran who is an expert on small ships. The Navy will also provide the use of its installations and two small destroyers which will simulate the Caine.
 "The Caine was an old four-stacker, but you just can't find them any more," reported Dmytryk. "Comdr. Shaw said the last one he saw was in England a year or so ago. It was one of the 50 given to Britain and was tied up at dock as a training ship."
 The picture starts this week in Yosemite Valley, where the romance of Willie Keith and May Wynne takes place. (She's played by New York actress Donna Lee Ruckey, who will now be known professionally as May Wynne.) Then the company spends a few days at San Francisco, where the USS Tompkins will be used.
 The sea stuff will be shot in E. wall with the USS Boyle. The picture will be finished up in Hollywood, where the typhoon will be staged on the Columbia lot. An exact replica of the court-martial room at Yerba Buena Island will be used for the trial sequence.

Smaller Hop Crop Forecast

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Trade reports indicate a smaller hop crop this year, due to reduced acreage and unfavorable weather, the Federal-State Market News Service reports.
 Unseasonably cool, showery weather is giving California growers a bad time. They report a rather severe infestation of downy mildew, particularly in coastal counties.

Portland Robin Associates With Human Beings

PORTLAND (AP) — A young robin here perches in associating with human beings.
 It is about five weeks old. Three weeks of that time was spent inside the Stanley Stites' home. The family took the fledgling in after finding it, apparently helpless, in the yard.
 Turned loose, the bird stayed in the neighborhood. Mrs. Stites emerges from the house every three hours during the day to offer it food. Whenever a member of the family is outside, the bird flies up to perch on a shoulder.
 The other robins can't understand it. They squawk loudly in their alarm over this conduct.

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 Preliminary reports from a survey by the Hop Control Board indicate producing acreage in California, Idaho, Oregon and Washington may be as much as 9,000 acres below the 38,100 acres that produced the 1952 crop. The large share of this reduction, the service said, is in Oregon and California coastal counties, partly through blow-outs and partly through hop yards being left idle this year.
 Weather conditions also were reported unfavorable in the Pacific Northwest, resulting in uneven growth and some downy mildew infestation.
