The physical properties of the college represent an investment of \$3,000,000.

The educational fund of approximately \$867,000 has aided more than 10,000 young women to higher education.

The Sisterhood now embraces more than 3100 chapters in 46 states, the District of Columbia, the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii and includes a membership of 115,000 women.

Sows, however, were steady to mostly 25 cents higher. Cattle also were mixed while spring lambs were 50 cents lower. Barrows and gilts generally sold from \$25.00 to \$26.00. Several better loads going to \$26.10 and \$26.25. Sows mostly ranged from \$20.00 to \$23.50.

Steers and yearlings were steady to 25 cents lower but cows and bulls strong to 25 cents higher in a two-way trade. The balance was generally steady.

Good to prime steers usually sold from \$20.00 to \$24.50 and comparable heifers from \$19.50 to \$24.50. Cows topped at \$15.00. Receipts were: Cattle 14,000, hogs 8,000, sheep 700.

GRANTS PASS (U.S.) — AFT. culinary workers posted pickets in front of two large downtown restaurants here Wednesday morning.

One of the two restaurants is operated by Dwight Battey, president of the Grants Pass Restaurant Owners Association.

Battey and L. H. Dodds, business agent of the Culinary Alliance and Bartenders Union, Local 329, said the major issue is a union shop clause, which the owners wanted stricken from the present contract.

Dodds said Tuesday the local had authorized a strike against association members, but that the Grants Pass Central Labor Council had not yet given its approval.

Good Pen Record Saves Dowler From 2nd Stretch

A good record at the Oregon State Prison paid off Wednesday for Lloyd Dowler when he faced Circuit Judge David Vandenberg on a bad check charge.

Last week Sheriff Murray Britton picked Dowler up at the gates of the state prison. The sheriff had a warrant for his arrest.

Dowler had just completed a term for check passing in Medford. He was wanted in Klamath Falls for passing a spurious check at the Hafter Furniture Co.

The ex-convict was represented in court Wednesday by Attorney J. C. O'Neill who made an eloquent plea for clemency. He told the court that Dowler had "seen the error of his ways" and that another prison term would not further his reformation. He said Dowler had a good record while in prison.

Judge Vandenberg put Dowler under five years probation.

The alleged abortion was committed 9 1/2 years ago, and the court proceedings were started six years ago.
