The Rickys team waited until the last night to cop the City Bowling League title — but they needed a big assist from the cellar-dwelling Juckeland's team.

Two points behind Coca Cola going into last night's session, Rickys shut out Hercules 4-0, while Juckeland's was knocking Coca Cola out of the lead with a 3-1 win. That gave Rickys the championship by one point.

Underwoods missed a chance at a tie for the title when they dropped a 1-3 decision to Tulelake Crater Lake Machinery.

Juckeland's, in scoring its upset, rolled the high team game, 870. Underwoods had an 871 for second high and added lines of 733 and 795 for the top three-game score, 2399.

Rickys was second with 2398 on games of 822, 770 and 806.

Bob Morrison of Juckeland's turned in the high line, 215, and tacked on games of 168 and 202 for a 585, the top three-game individual score.

Don Rumlhart of Klamath Lumber & Box trailed with a 522 on lines of 139, 204 and 209. Erik Carlson's 211 was the second-high line. He rolls for Underwoods.

Top bowler in the league for the season was Bob Victorin of Crater Lake Machinery with a 175 average. Morrison finished with a 170, Frank Hall of Beeber Food Sales 169.

Rickys' 908 was the top team game for the season, followed by Beeber with 889 and Safeway with 882.

Underwood rolled the best series 2524. Crater Lake notched a 2465. Coca Cola a 2462.

Clarence Gansberg of Rickys rolled a 250 line and 603 series (the only 600 score of the season) but an individual or team can cut into the prize money in just one department so Gansberg settled on his 250 line score.

Joe Wachter's 343 was next best. Morrison's 235 third high. Wachter is a Coca Cola bowler.

Gansberg's stepping aside gave Gordon Lowe of Hercules the top series score for the season's run, 8.590. Lloyd Drew of Beeber followed with a 586, Fred Klink of Rickys, 585.

Tannas Will Probably Get Brush

NEW YORK (AP)—Tom Tannas, the most articulate of Ezzard Charles' co-managers, was prepared to go before the New York State Athletic Commission today and demand that the former heavyweight champion be matched against Roland La Starza next month the winner to challenge Rocky Marciano in September.

The expectation was that Tannas would get nowhere. Jimmy DeAngelo, manager of La Starza, states emphatically that his tiger will not fight Charles or anyone else before he is given his long overdue return crack at Marciano, who beat him on a split decision three years ago. IBC, the promotional octopus, realizes all too well that a Charles-La Starza bout might prove such a clincher that nobody would wish to see either of them fight Marciano.

Both the champion and his manager, Al Weill, have said they would prefer to give La Starza the first shot. Not necessarily, however, in September. They have made the painful discovery that any further fighting Rocky does this year would be for the almost exclusive benefit of the federal treasury. It is a tough problem to lick, and it remains to be seen whether, under such circumstances the commission can force a champion to defend his title every six months.
