CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO — Old crop soybean contracts firmed on the board of trade Tuesday but the rest of the market had a ragged and easier appearance.

July and September soybeans were held by advancing quotations for both bean oil and bean meal in the cash market. This was due to the new crop months, however, as they slumped.

The market suffered a mid-morning spill on a sudden expansion in selling pressure. It recovered slightly from this drop, but only in the case of old crop soybeans was it able to show sustained strength.

Wheat closed 1/4 lower, July 2.03 1/4, corn 1/4 lower, July 1.54 1/4, oats 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, July 1.43 1/4. Soybeans 1 cent lower to 2 cents higher, July 2.90 1/4, and land 5 cents lower to 5 cents a hundred pounds higher, July 59.50.

CHICAGO — Live hog and most cattle prices were lower Tuesday. Sheep and lambs were steady to lower.

The general hog market was active and uneven, with butchers 25 to mostly 50 cents lower and sows steady to 25 cents lower.

Slaughter steers and heifers were steady to 25 cents down. Cows were weak with Monday's close in late trade. Bulls grading commercial and below were steady. Vealers were weak. A few loads of prime yearlings and fed steers brought \$23.50.

Spring lambs were steady, but old crop lambs were weak to 50 cents off. Slaughter sheep were steady.

Salable receipts were estimated at 9,000 hogs, 7,500 cattle, 500 calves and 1,000 sheep.

Judge Lashes State Officer

Circuit Judge David Vandenberg Tuesday issued a statement sharply criticizing operations of a state probation officer in Klamath county.

The judge accused the probation officer, Paul Morgan, of giving probationers permission to violate the orders of the court.

A rift between the court and the probation officer was brought to light after Larry Witt, a musician on probation, told the court Morgan had given him permission to leave the state. The judge said other probationers were told it was "all right to drink if it didn't do it in public."

The judge added that the situation became so bad that he called Lincoln Pfeiffer, senior probation officer in Salem and told him that he would not read any more of Morgan's reports. Subsequently, the judge said, Hal Randall, executive secretary of the State Parole and Probation office, came to Klamath Falls to investigate the situation.

"It is the policy of the court," Judge Vandenberg explained, "in granting probation to forbid the drinking of liquor, either privately or publicly. The probationer is not allowed to leave the state of Oregon without permission of the court. The probationer also must obtain steady employment."

"Mr. Morgan has given probationers permission to break all these rules. If it happened in just one case, it wouldn't be so bad. However, time and again, probationers have appeared before the court and said the probation officer had given them permission to violate the terms under which they were released."

Judge Vandenberg said the court has been embarrassed by these situations.

"We can't very well put a man in the penitentiary for violating probation when he did it with permission of the probation officer," the judge declared.

Referring specifically to the Witt case, he said the musician was given permission to go to Dorris frequently to play at dances.

Witt was arrested in June 1950 after his automobile was seized on attachment and he took it out of a garage where it was impounded and drove it to California. He was placed on five years probation.
