CHICAGO (AP) — Feed grains held firm while wheat and soybeans slipped lower on the board of trade Thursday.

Selling in wheat followed overnight issuance of an Agriculture Department crop forecast which substantially raised estimated prospects of winter wheat from a month ago and set spring wheat production at an all-time record.

Wheat closed $\frac{1}{4}$ lower, July \$2.02 $\frac{1}{4}$; corn $\frac{1}{4}$ higher, July \$1.54 $\frac{1}{4}$; oats $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1 cent higher, July $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1 cent higher, July \$1.42 $\frac{1}{4}$; soybeans $\frac{1}{4}$ to 2 cents lower, July \$2.88 $\frac{1}{4}$, and lard 17 to 23 cents a hundred pounds lower, July \$9.42.

California Lawmakers End Session

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The California Legislature ended its 1953 session early Thursday, almost to the last second.

Its last big job was to approve a bulky bill spelling out how the record 1953-54 school fund of 387 million dollars is to be split among California's 2,500 school districts.

Wary after nearly six months of lawmaking, the Senate wrangled, with clocks stopped, beyond the midnight deadline for adjournment. The lawmakers also:

1. Voted to place before the voters in the 1954 general election a proposition that would give assemblymen four year terms instead of their present two and senators six years instead of four and limit future governors to two four year terms.

2. Completed action on special appropriation bills that total about 10 million dollars. The biggest one is \$5,400,000 for child care centers. If Gov. Warren signs all the money bills, the state will, by his Department of Finance Revenue estimates, still wind up with an 8 million dollar surplus June 30, 1954. That's made possible by deep cuts the Legislature made in its budget.

3. Passed two bills channeling up to 2 1/2 million dollars of state highway funds into grade separations and bells and gates at railroad crossings.

4. Saw the death of a bill passed by both Houses to create a Department of water resources. Warren said he would veto the measure because of other changes it would have made in state water law.

But on the final day a bill creating a California Klamath River Commission was given final passage and sent to Gov. Warren. It will work with an Oregon commission on the distribution and use of the river's water.

Slaughter steers, heifers, cows and bulls were slow, uneven and steady to 50 cents lower. Vealers were down \$1.00, to \$2.00 from Wednesday's average. Most good to high choice steers and yearlings weighing 1,300 pounds and less brought \$19.50 to \$22.00.

Slaughter lambs were generally steady. Slaughter sheep were steady to strong. The bulk of the good to prime native spring lambs brought \$24.00 to \$28.00.

Fir Parleys Resume Again

PORTLAND (AP) — For the first time in a month, contract negotiations resumed here Thursday between the CIO International Woodworkers and eight fir industry employer groups.

The meeting is the first since the union settled its wage dispute with Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., accepting an offer of a 5 cent hourly wage increase.

Meanwhile, counting of some 40,000 strike ballots continued in Portland. A. P. Hartung, union president, said he did not know when the results would be announced, but did not expect counting to be completed until next week.

The members voted on whether to accept an offer of renewal of the present contract or whether to authorize a strike June 18 if no agreement is reached before that date.

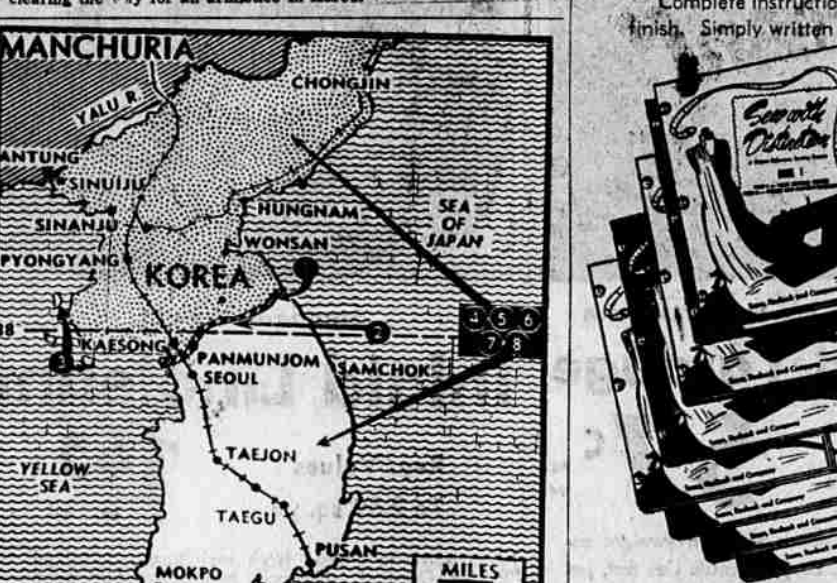

TRUCE PROVISIONS — (1) Twelve hours' after truce, hostilities cease. (2) Within three days each side will withdraw 1.2 miles, creating 24-mile buffer zone. All fortifications within the zone would be destroyed. (3) Within five days both sides will withdraw forces from islands on opposite sides of truce line. These islands are mainly held by U. N. forces and have been invaluable radar stations and bases for obtaining information from behind enemy lines. (4) Representatives of both sides and four neutral nations will enforce truce. (5) Size of forces will be frozen, although each side may rotate or replace 35,000 troops a month. (6) Building of "non-military" airfields will be permitted. Communists have advantage as they will be able to rebuild bombed airfields and communications. Red aircraft had to base north of Yalu River. (7) Within two months, all prisoners who wish to be repatriated will be exchanged. (8) Within three months there will be a conference on issues still to be decided.

Controls-Hating Ag Chief Faces Record Crop-Restricting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson, an avowed foe of government controls today faced the prospect of having to apply restrictions on more crops in a single year than any of his predecessors.

An official crop report yesterday put the wheat supply at a surplus level which—unless there is an unforeseen major development—will require Benson to invoke rigid marketing quotas on the 1954 crop. Growers already have approved 1954 controls for the major types of tobacco and for peanuts. Benson announced this week he will impose marketing controls of this year's production of sugar in Puerto Rico and in the domestic cane sugar area.

Reports on cotton planting indicate production of this crop may put supplies in a surplus class also requiring controls on next year's production. Returning from a recent farm conference in the Midwest, Under-Secretary of Agriculture True D. Moore said it appeared that the corn acreage would be larger this year than last. Thus, it would be possible for the corn supply to reach a surplus mark also requiring quotas next year.

During the campaign last year, President Eisenhower pledged a minimum of agricultural controls. Benson, in speeches and statements, has said farmers want a federal farm program that would free them from government domination.

The secretary has little choice in using measures to cut down on production of major crops in excess supply. Farm laws require use of acreage planting allotments and marketing quotas when supplies of major crops reach specified levels.

Benson has pledged faithful administration of these laws. Nevertheless, he has said that he will seek better programs.

Benson has until July 1 to announce a decision on wheat controls, and he probably will wait until that time. Something could happen—although the chances are remote—to change the situation.

Yesterday's Agriculture Department report forecast this year's wheat crop at 1,132,500,000 bushels. This is at least 232 1/2 million bushels above the level which might permit an escape from quotas.

Kerr-Gifford Sold to Cargill

PORTLAND (AP) — Sale of capital stock of the grain firm of Kerr Gifford & Co., Inc., to Cargill, Inc., of Minneapolis was announced here Thursday by Thomas Kerr, president of Kerr Gifford.

No price was named. The Oregon Journal said, though, that informed sources estimated the price at between four and five million dollars.

Kerr said there would be no change in organization or management of Kerr Gifford, the West Coast's oldest independent grain operator.
