The "weather permitting" sign is still up as Klamath Falls hard-top drivers tune their cars for another scheduled speed program at Gems Speedway Sunday night. Time trials open 6:45 p.m.

Local pilots are meticulous about getting their chariots in top shape because they'll be racing against a contingent of California drivers tomorrow night, in keeping with the race club's recent vote to make Gems Speedway an "open-track."

This means that only professional drivers will be kept off the oval—those that race for a living without any other means of livelihood.

The local club recently voted the "open track" when only 29 cars showed for the May 31 show, not enough to insure customers the most for their money.

The Wenatchee Chiefs, on the warpath after a 50-50 start in the Western International League baseball campaign, were riding the crest of a five-game win streak Saturday.

The Apple City squad pounded three Lewiston pitchers for 13 hits Friday night in romping to an 8-4 victory over the league leaders. The win went to Charlie Oubre, who scattered 10 Lewiston hits in going the distance.

In the loop's other two games, Spokane thumped Yakima's cellar-dwelling Bears 5-4 in a 10-inning edged Salem, 5-4 in a 10-inning thriller. Tri-City at Calgary and Victoria's two-game stand at Vancouver were rained out.

The Chiefs, who pushed across three runs in the first, got all they needed in the third when Ross Mc Cormack slapped out a three-run double after Jake Helmuth had opened the inning with a solo homer.

Feller Faces Yankees

Cleveland's Bobby Feller, never a fireball against the New York Yankees, today draws the tremendous task of trying to stop them from winning 16 straight.

Under normal conditions Feller isn't the pitcher you would pick to beat the Yanks, especially when it's the days when he was Rapid Robert, he never completely solved the New Yorkers. They're the only outfit in the league with a lifetime edge over him, having beaten Bob 38 times in 65 decisions.

But conditions aren't normal in the American League. The Yankees not only are threatening to run off and hide, they've already done it from at least six of the seven other clubs.

CHANCE

Only Cleveland holds a wisp of a chance—barring a complete Yankee collapse. Today's game has to be the big one. The Indians are 7½ behind and they have two more coming up with New York tomorrow. The season is a third over. Since nobody else is beating the Yankees, Cleveland can't afford to let this series slip by without gaining some ground.

The Indians haven't been hitting recently and last night was no exception. Their two runs were homers, by Dale Mitchell and Hank Medica, but they got only four other safeties. The Yanks, as usual, had one big inning. They scored three runs in the seventh on four singles and a pair of walks. Whitey Ford, lifted during the rally for a pinch hitter, won his seventh straight.

The National League lead changed hands for the fourth time in two weeks. Milwaukee split a night doubleheader with Pittsburgh, losing 4-2 and winning 11-2, while Brooklyn defeated Chicago, 7-4. Brooklyn now leads by half a game.

St. Louis whipped the New York Giants, 3-1, and Cincinnati surprised Philadelphia, 4-1.

LOSERS

In other American League games Detroit edged Washington, 2-1; Boston nipped Chicago, 4-3 and Philadelphia ran the St. Louis Browns' losing streak to 11 with a 5-3 triumph.

Eddie Mathews smashed his 19th home run and two triples in the first Milwaukee-Pittsburgh game. The Braves roared back with 10 runs in the first inning of the night cap on nine singles, permitting Max Surkont to coast to his eighth victory.

Brooklyn blew an early three run lead against the Cubs, then rallied against Sheldon Jones for two runs in the fourth and one more in the seventh. Jim Hughes, in relief, picked up his first victory.

Grant Dunlap made one of his rare appearances as a pinch hitter for the Cardinals at New York and delivered a triple with two on base and three runs in the seventh.

DISTANCE

Jackie Collum of Cincinnati, the smallest pitcher in the majors, went the distance for the second time since he first hit the big leagues in 1951 and picked up his first victory in two years. Earl Torgerson's homer was the only damaging one of six Philadelphia hits.

Jim Delsing provided a sudden death finish at Detroit when he blasted the first pitch in the last home run. The Senators had tied the game in the top of the ninth. Hector (Skinny) Brown, a wash-out when he worked for the Chicago White Sox, came back to haunt his old mates as he combined with Ellis Kinder to beat them on seven hits.

For the second time in two days Eddie Robinson brought Philadelphia a victory with a home run. He beat Chicago Thursday with a ninth inning homer and at St. Louis last night he broke a 3-3 tie with a circuit clout which also scored Dave Philley.

Ben Hogan Leads By 2 Strokes

OKMONT, Pa. (AP) — The National Open Golf Championship that threatened to become a one-man runaway got back to normal Saturday with four signs, experienced campaigners fighting it out over the last 36 holes.

It was Ben Hogan in front by two strokes with Sam Snead, George Fazio and Lloyd Mangrum in hot pursuit as 60 players survivors of more than 1,600 who originally entered and 300 who began play here Tuesday—went into the deciding double round.

The fans who have swarmed over the rolling 6,916 yards of the Okmont Country Club course stopped wondering whether anyone could break 300 on its fearsome hills and turned to discussing whether Ben Hogan could maintain his sub-par pace against the three-way threat.

EVEN PAR

Hogan Friday added an even par 72 to his opening 67 for a 139 total. He had a 28, one over par, on the first nine Saturday.

Snead drove into a second place Friday with a remarkable record of 36-33—69. Fazio put a second sub-par round, a 26-35—71, on top of Thursday's 70.

Mangrum had a 143 at the halfway mark, two strokes behind the 141 of Snead and Fazio.

Behind Hogan, Snead, Fazio and Mangrum, with scores that were barely within range of the top spot, were four of the tournament's real outsiders.

EX-GRIFFINER

Jay Hebert, a young Erie, Pa., pro who once was an assistant at Okmont, has two rounds of 72 for 144. Dick Metz, a veteran of 27 years of tournament golf, had 75-70—145. Tied at 146 were Al Menzies, runner-up to Jack Westland for the amateur championship last fall and playing in his first national open, and amateur Frank Souchak, a 225-pound, 38-year-old former football player who is an Okmont club member.

Lightweight Champ Seeks Gavilan Scrap

NEW YORK (AP) — Lightweight Champion Jimmy Carter is taking aim at Kid Gavilan's welter title after disposing of the challenge of toe-dancing George Araujo.

Willie Ketchum, Carter's manager, said today he would post a \$2,000 forfeit next week for a title shot at the Cuban Keed who rules the 147-pound division.

"There's nobody left we can get money with," said dollar-minded Willie. "So we'll go after Gavilan." Lightweight or welterweight, one

of his," Carter said. "He kept pecking away with that left at my cuts. Actually it was my jabs that set him up, too. I was getting them in real solid and it was hurting him. Then I gave him those body punches. But it was the rights to the chin that hurt him most."

Carter trailed in the official voting at the end of eight rounds against the nimble young challenger from Providence, R. I. Bouncing in and out with his flicking jab, he made a fight of it. Always pursued by Carter, the 22-year-old challenger occasionally would stand and flurry back.

Suddenly Carter struck in the ninth with a furious burst that floored Araujo twice and left him confused and wobbling at the bell.

Two crushing body punches in the 13th crumpled Araujo, prompting Referee Al Bert to stop it. Up to the 13th Bert and Judge Harold Barnes had Carter out from 7-5 and Judge Bert Grant saw it 8-4 for the champ. The AP card agreed with Grant.

"I fought the best I know how," said Araujo, naturally disappointed but making no excuses. "That Carter is a very good fighter. He fooled me with his right hand. I had no idea he could hit that hard."
