Intellectual Should Refuse To Testify, Says Einstein
 NEW YORK (AP) - Dr. Albert Einstein said in a letter made public Thursday that "every intellectual" should refuse to testify before a congressional investigating committee.
 The letter was received by public school teacher William Fraunglass, who faces loss of his job for refusing to testify before the Senate internal security subcommittee.
 In his letter, dated May 16, the famed physicist said in part: "The reactionary politicians have managed to instill suspicion of all intellectual efforts into the public by dangling before their eyes a danger from without."
 "Having succeeded so far they are now proceeding to suppress the freedom of teaching and to deprive of their positions all those who do not prove submissive, that is to starve them."
 "Every intellectual who is called before one of the committees ought to refuse to testify, that is he must be prepared for jail and economic ruin, in short, for the sacrifice of his personal welfare in the interest of the cultural welfare of his country."
 "This refusal to testify must be based on the assertion that it is shameful for a blameless citizen to submit to such an inquisition and that this kind of inquisition violates the spirit of the Constitution."
