## 30,000 Reds Rip Through Allied Lines

 SEOUL (AP) - Thirty thousand Communists ripped into Allied lines today, breaking through as deep as two miles in the mightiest Red offensive in two years.

Two South Korean divisions under the East-Central Front buckled under an assault by two fresh Chinese divisions—about 2,000 soldiers.

A few miles to the west, another 10,000 Reds pierced Allied lines in several places before they were halted in bloody trench fighting by infantrymen of the U. S. 3rd and South Korean 9th Divisions.

U. S. airmen flying shuttle missions dumped more than 2,235,000 pounds of bombs on the flaming 40-mile front. Smoke of battle could be seen for 60 miles.

It was the greatest Red drive since the 1951 spring offensive, and apparently intended to gain the Communists as much ground as possible before the impending armistice.

Fighting raged throughout the day and last reports described it as "fluid"—meaning in full blast and undecided.

The Communists engulfed Capitol Hill and Outpost Texas, south of and undecided.

The Communists engulfed Capitol Hill and Outpost Texas, south of Kumson, and had the South Korean 5th and 8th Divisions reeling south toward the Pukhan River.

Fragmentary dispatches from the front painted a bloody picture of reckless Chinese pouring over a 3,000-foot peak which dominates the area held by the two ROK divisions.

Some Allied officers considered the offensive a Communist move to punish the South Koreans, whose government has threatened to drive to the Manchurian border if a truce is signed, there was a possibility, too, that the Reds wanted one final victory before an armistice for prestige purposes.

The nearby Pukhan River and the great Hwachon Reservoir, 25 miles south of the main battle area, presumably would block any sizable Red advance.

Li Gen, Maxwell D. Taylor, Eighth Army commander, went to the front for a first-hand inspection, after warning his troops in a Sunday broadcast that the impending armistice would not in itself mean an end to the war. He urged them to be ready to fight at any time if the Reds break the armistice terms.

South Korean troops launched a counterattack at the eastern end of the main Communist push and forced the Reds off an outpost known as Anchor Hill. Pierce fighting raged on nearby heights. The ROKs also smashed a Chinese assault on Christmas Hill, farther east.

To the west of the two embattled ROK divisions, fighting slackened and South Korean 9th Divisions after infantrymen of the U. S. 3rd cut up an attacking force of Reds near the Iron Triangle and Outpost Harry. The Chinese made lighter thrusts elsewhere, mostly on the East-Central Front.

## Popular Records Resulting From Non-Musical Films

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) - The movies are again inspiring a volume of popular records, but it's not because of musicals. The dramas are doing the selling.

Film musicals used to bring forth a number of hit songs and records. But something has happened. For one thing, the scores for movie hits produce the singable tunes of yore. Also, the music business has become a topy-turvy world in which inane jingles, cornball tunes and shouting singers in echo chambers have become hits.

Now comes a new wrinkle. The scores of dramatic pictures are producing songs and records that click. This is nothing new. In the old days, movies used to have theme songs that were played over and over again for a haunting effect.

Then there was the still-popular "Laura." The background theme of the picture, written by David Raksin, was lyricized by Johnny Mercer, and the song became a hit.

The current favorite is Where Is Your Heart? which is billed as "Song From Moulin Rouge." (This kind of billing helps the exploitation of the picture). The Percy Faith record has topped the record selling, juke box and disc jockey lists for several weeks.

"Anna," by the Italian star, Sylvania Mangano, is another top seller. It is from the Italian film, which has been dubbed into English for American audiences. Another hit is "Ruby," as done by Richard Hayman and Les Baxter. It is taken from the Jennifer Jones-Claudio Rains film, "Ruby Gentry."

A popular orchestral number is the haunting music from "The Bad and the Beautiful," recorded by David Rose. A newcomer to the hit lists is "Return to Paradise," the music from the Gary Cooper film made in the South Pacific. It is available in versions by Rose and Percy Faith, among others. The theme from Charlie Chaplin's "Limelight" is also catching on.

The ballad from "High Noon" is still getting a play in the record business. The Academy Award for the tune helped revive it.

## Weather Stations May Be Trimmed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Dr. F. W. Reichelderfer, chief of the U.S. Weather Bureau, has told Congress that some weather bureau stations will have to be closed down if there is any sharp cutback in funds.

Whether some or all of the bureau's 60 weather stations are closed, or trimmed in operating forces, Dr. Reichelderfer recently told a Senate committee, depends on what the lawmakers do with bureau's money request for next year.

The extent of any curtailment apparently depends on how far the House is willing to go along with the Senate.

The stations he said were under consideration for closing if there is a lack of money include: Ellensburg, Kelso, North Head and Tacoma, Wash.

Subject to possible reductions in force and operating hours would be: Salem, Ore.; Tatoosh Island, Wash.

## Plant Experts To Tulelake

J. Emmon Scott and Merlon Allen, plant pathologists of the University of California, will visit Tulelake on June 16 to discuss potato diseases with the Tulelake Farm Advisor and Tulelake Field Station manager.

Farm Advisor Ken Baghott said he asked Scott and Allen to come to Tulelake because he felt they could present valuable information to Tulelake growers on the control of nematodes and other diseases which affect Tulelake potato growers.

Scott has had considerable experience on the control of pathological organisms in all kinds of crops. Allen is a specially trained nematologist, who works solely with nematodes. Allen received his Doctor's degree from Utah where he worked under the foremost nematologist in the U.S., Dr. Horn.

Baghott suggests that all Tulelake Farmers who are interested in potato problems attend the potato meeting called by the Tulelake Growers Association, June 16.
