Oregon AFL Looks To Purge

COOS BAY (AP)—The AFL in Oregon gave notice Monday that it intends to take up the predicted ballot-box purge of 10 or more legislators.

President J. D. McDonald told the State Federation of Labor in its opening day of convention here, "We need at least 10 new House members and six new senators for the 1955 session".

The purge attempt was predicted last week by Secretary James T. Mori, who asked the state Grange, the Farmers Union, the CIO and the railroad unions to join in drawing up a list of legislators to be defeated.

McDonald in his annual address said the same group of legislators not only opposed labor legislation but also opposed farm legislation and "other groups interested in the welfare of the majority."

He reiterated opposition to the anti-picketing bill passed by the recent Legislature. He called it a "superfluous law" and said it was sponsored by "reactionary legislators."

He urged management not to resort to the law, but to settle affairs with labor at the conference table.

"You cannot allow a superfluous law to stampee you into industrial strife," McDonald said.

The council approved resolutions calling for:

Federal construction of Hells Canyon Dam.

Administration transmission lines to Klamath Falls.

Protesting and proposed cut in social security.

Douglas Freeman, Historian, Dies

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Tributes poured in today for the late Douglas Southall Freeman, newspaper editor, historian and Pulitzer Prize-winning biographer. He died Saturday of a heart attack at his home here at the age of 67.

Freeman, who spotted in Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower the qualities he thought the country needed, urged the general to head the call for political service. Eisenhower said later that his friend Freeman had been "the first man in the United States who ever got me to thinking seriously about a possible political career."

Freeman was editor of the Richmond News-Leader for 34 years, from 1915 to his retirement in 1949. He was working on a biography of George Washington when he died. By last fall he had completed five volumes of the planned eight-volume work.

The blast took place in the Savoy theater at Newry, County Down, about 40 miles from Belfast. No one was injured.

468 HOUSE FIRES
CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Weekend fires in seven villages in various parts of Egypt left a death toll of 24 persons and 67 injured, with 868 houses destroyed. The outbreak coincided with the three-day holiday of Bairam, ending the dawn-to-dusk Ramadan fast.

Dead Baby Found In College Girl's Trunk; No Diploma

WATERVILLE, Me. (AP)—While classmates joined today in commencement, the happy climactic day of college life, Colby College coed, Harriet Sart, 21, conferred with parents and counsel about her pending arraignment on a murder charge.

The tiny blonde, Nahant, Mass., senior was booked for murder after discovery yesterday of the decomposed body of a baby in a stored trunk bearing her name.

Joseph B. Campbell, county attorney, said Miss Sart would be arraigned in Municipal Court today. Campbell quoted Miss Sart as saying she gave birth to the baby girl unaided in her single room at the dormitory and put the infant in a trunk which was stored in the dormitory basement. Campbell would not say when the child was born or died, pending an autopsy report.

A 15-ounce cord of the type used for shoe laces was wrapped around the baby's neck, Campbell said. The discovery was made by a janitor tracing an unpleasant odor in the basement.
