

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK
CHICAGO (AP) — A small week-end accumulation of hogs cleared readily Monday in a fairly active trade at steady to 25 cents higher prices. Cattle were mixed but mostly steady while lambs were 50 cents to \$1.00 lower and ewes were about steady.

Most choice butcher weight hogs sold from \$22.50 to \$24.75, about two loads stepping up to \$24.85. Sows took \$18.00 to \$22.00 generally, but topped at \$22.25 for a few offerings.

Weakness in the cattle market appeared on hewlers which were as much as 25 cents lower and on cows which were steady to weak. Vealers and calves were steady to \$1.00 lower. Bulls, on the other hand were 50 cents higher.

Most good to prime steers took \$18.75 to \$24.50 and hewlers from \$18.00 to \$23.50. Cows topped at \$14.50, bulls at \$17.00, and vealers at \$20.00 on choice grade.

Good to prime spring lambs sold from \$23.00 to \$25.50 and ewes from \$6.00 downward.

Estimated arrivals for sale included 8,000 hogs, 22,000 cattle, 500 calves, and 1,000 sheep.

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures
prices fell the 10 cent a bushel limit in heavy selling on the board of trade Monday.

Liquidation was fairly large at the start and became heavier as the session progressed. July wheat dipped to \$1.88 1/2, the lowest price since Feb. 14, 1950. Laws of the board do not permit wheat prices to fall more than 10 cents in one session.

The expanding harvest in the southwestern winter wheat belt, and the lack of storage space for the new crop, were the main bullish influences.

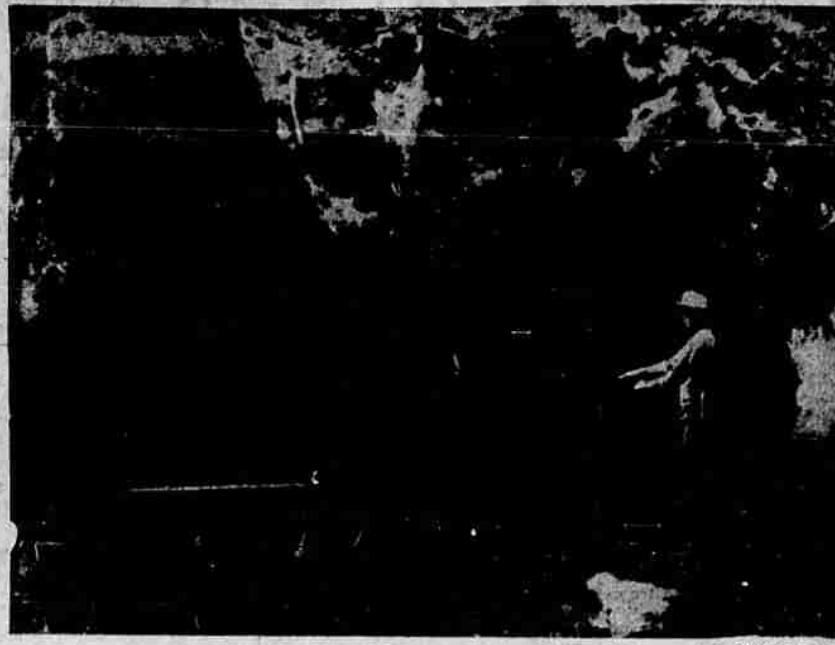
Corn also was weak. Oats and soybeans held up better than grains. A heavy decline in Chicago soybean stocks caused some short-covering in soybeans, particularly in the July delivery.

Wheat closed 3 1/2 to 9 1/2 cents lower. July \$1.88 1/2, 1 1/2 to 1 1/2 down 2 1/2 to 3 1/2, July \$1.49 1/2 to 1.50, oats were 1 1/2 to 1 1/2 lower, July 70 1/2, rye was 4 to 4 1/2 cents lower, July \$1.36-1.36 1/2, soybeans were off 2 1/2 to 4 cents, July \$2.83 1/2 to 2.84, and hard was 15 to 28 cents a hundred pounds lower, July \$9.00.

AUSTRIA SHAKES
VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Socialist opposition to conservative Chancellor Julius Raab's conciliatory policy toward Russia threatened Monday to split Austria's coalition cabinet. Raab on Saturday said his government is "most gratefully recognizing" Soviet concessions to Austria. He called for the "gradual establishment of mutual confidence" between his country and her Soviet occupiers.

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP)—The 7,120-ton British freighter Bedford Prince was abandoned by its crew of 35 and the captain after it smashed into rocks near the Gulf of Paria, Trinidad, early Monday, a U. S. Navy announcement said. The ship was bound for New Orleans with a cargo of tin.

Army Takes Over Colombian Government; No Shots Fired

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP)—Rival political factions united today behind Colombia's new military-controlled government. Army Chief Lt. Gen. Gustavo Rojas Pinilla ousted President Laureano Gomez in a coup Saturday night and installed himself as president. Not a shot was fired.

Leaders of the opposition Liberal party, which has been waging bitter warfare on the Conservative governments for years, in a statement endorsed the Army takeover, which it said was necessary "to bring the country out of political chaos and save it from grave consequences."

Silage Expands, Silo Falls, Fire Takes Down Barn

WOODBURN (AP)—A series of accidents did \$25,000 damage to two buildings on the Mantion Carl farm two miles northeast of here over the week end.

Expanding green silage toppled a terra cotta tile silo Saturday night. The silo fell on a barn causing a small fire from an electric motor.

Carl and neighbors thought they had put the blaze out, but he was awakened early Sunday to find the entire barn ablaze. He said part of the loss was covered by insurance.

State DAV Resolves, Elects; Two From Klamath Named

GRANTS PASS (AP) — The Oregon Disabled American Veterans organization Saturday urged passage of a national pre-paid medical plan to provide medical care for all veterans.

The group, however, rejected two other resolutions dealing with current controversies. One would have condemned the tidelands oil legislation as a "give-away," and the other would have urged federal construction of a Hells Canyon Dam.

These two were first reported as being approved.

Samuel E. Booth, Portland, department commander, explained that copies of the resolutions passed at the annual convention were given to the press, and copies of the two rejected resolutions were inadvertently included.

Walter Munger, Oregon City, was elected commander. Other officers: David Robinson, Grants Pass, senior vice commander; George Simmons, Medford, junior vice commander; Doris Quayle, Portland, treasurer, and Olive Adamson, Klamath Falls, chaplain.

Indochina's King Exiles Self To Force Changes From French

SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — French circles said here today that France may have to depose King Norodom Sihanouk if he does not soon end his self-imposed exile in Thailand and return to his Indochinese kingdom of Cambodia.

The 31-year-old monarch and an automobile entourage of 27 persons suddenly popped across the border Saturday and arrived in Bangkok yesterday. The monarch said he hoped to force France to grant fuller freedom to his Communist-threatened kingdom.

Before departing, the King transferred full power to his Prime Minister, Pen Muth, who remained in Cambodia's capital, Phnom Penh. The King gave no indication he intended to abdicate.

In Bangkok today, a spokesman for the King said he had fled to prevent an anti-French revolution, and to lead a crusade to rally world opinion which he hoped would force France to grant his country independence.

French officials here expressed fear the King's flight would touch off uprisings by Cambodian ultranationalists, as well as by strong underground forces of the rebel Communist-led Vietminh.

French observers said France would have to take steps to avoid trouble in the kingdom if Norodom did not return. They suggested two possible solutions:

1. Depose the King and install his uncle, Prince Monireth, who is next in line for the throne;
2. Set up a regency under Prince Sauramarit, the King's mother.

French sources here said Cambodia was calm but troops had been alerted as a precautionary measure.

Norodom yesterday expressed willingness to continue friendship with the French but complained that they had stalled in negotiations for the complete independence of Cambodia.

He said, however, he was confident an agreement soon would be reached and he could return home.

The French government, caught by surprise by the King's self-imposed exile, declared in Paris it could "only highly deplore the gesture." The Ministry of Associated States said the King "has complicated a settlement which was in process of succeeding and he has brought certain trouble to a country which is menaced only by the danger of a Communist invasion."

In a long memorandum to the French high commissioner of Cambodia, the King demanded elimination of mixed jurisdiction permitting French nationals to be judged only in French courts, recognition of the total independence of Cambodia, appointment of the King as commander of anti-Vietminh forces in Cambodia and denunciation of economic agreements linking Cambodia to France and the rest of Indochina.

The French government said in a Paris announcement that the new development was unexpected since France and Cambodia had worked out a series of accords during the King's visit to Paris last March and these now were awaiting the monarch's scrutiny.

The French said France had agreed the King should head up an autonomous Cambodian army and that suppression of the mixed jurisdiction also had been agreed.

Cambodia, with a population of about 3 1/2 million and an area of 67,600 square miles of rice land and jungle, is tied in the French union with neighboring Laos and Viet Nam. The three states make up Indochina.
