

House Passes Reciprocal Trade Act; Fast Senate Action Seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — An administration-backed bill to extend the Reciprocal Trade Act passed today for quick action in the Senate after winning top-heavy 363-35 approval in the House.

Chairman Millikin (R-Colo.) of the Senate Finance Committee promised brief hearings and fast action on the bill.

But a close decision loomed in the Senate over a provision in the bill to increase the Tariff Commis-

sion from six to seven members. House Democrats late yesterday staged a bitter fight to knock out this provision but lost, 215 to 185.
