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DEALER INQUIRIES INVITED

Portland Jet Pilot Reported Dead; Nearly Was 2-3 Times

SEOUL (AP) — A 24-year-old Sabre jet pilot survived a harrowing crash landing in enemy territory. Then, on an emergency radio, he heard a reconnaissance pilot report that he'd undoubtedly been killed in the crash.

But his amazing luck held. A patrol of South Koreans reached him before the enemy appeared and led him through a minefield to safety. Uphurt except for minor bruises, Lt. Don Forbes, Portland, Ore., Wednesday called the crash and rescue "the biggest thrill I ever had."

The former Oregon State College football star was strafing a road on the East-Central Front when his Sabre was hit by enemy ground fire.

He crash landed at more than 125 miles an hour in a rice paddy. "After I hit the ground," he recalled, "there was a long series of jolts that ripped the wing off and tore my canopy away. I crawled out and hid in a ditch." He was in an enemy sector being pounded by the heaviest Allied air concentration of the war.

Forbes saw an Allied reconnaissance plane circle overhead and on his emergency radio heard the pilot report that the pilot of the crashed Sabre couldn't have survived. "I tried to call him on my radio, but I couldn't reach him," Forbes said. "Just then, I saw a patrol of

soldiers come into the field. I was not sure whether they were Chinese or Korean. They looked at me and I looked back. Suddenly, one of them smiled. Maybe you don't think I didn't smile back as hard as I could!"

The ROKs led Forbes through a

minefield to a command post, where a rescue helicopter picked him up. The young pilot said just 48 hours earlier he had thought his first Communist MIG and added: "Now that MIG seems a trifling tame."
