

Olson 3-1 Choice Over Young

Paddys' Hot Left May Upset Bobo's Plans

NEW YORK (AP)—Randy Turpin's fall work will be cut out for him tonight at Madison Square Garden when Carl (Bobo) Olson meets Paddy Young for the American middleweight title and the right to fight the Britisher for the world title in August.

Olson, Hawaiian-born San Francisco boxer, rates a solid 3 to 1 favorite over the rugged Irishman from New York's Greenwich Village. In fact, Olson may be the choice over Turpin if he gets past saddle-nosed Paddy. The pick here is Olson despite the everpresent danger in Young's left hook.

The 15-round match, scheduled for 9:00 p. m. (EST) will be shot across the nation on television.

AMUSED

The Young camp was amused by Flaherty's remarks. All along they scoffed at the topheavy odds. They assure Flaherty he need not worry about the site of any August match. "Paddy will wear anybody down," said Harry Stuckevers, his manager. "He'll do all the forcing. Olson will counter and Paddy will counter right back. Those odds are all wrong."

Young, a converted southpaw, is a good solid puncher with a left hook. He boxes better than many think, throwing a stinging jab. The hook to the body is his best punch. He takes a good wallop, fights back and comes strong in the late rounds.

GOOD BOXER

The baldish Olson, also 24, is a good boxer with an awkward but effective style. He holds his hands close together, sticking out his elbows to block punches like the French fighters. His punches do not carry the zing of a Durando but they have knocked out 25 opponents, four more than Young. Within the last 13 months Olson stopped Walter Cartier, Gene Halston and Lee Sala.

Two judges and a referee will score the fight on a round basis, using a supplementary point system.

Haas and Riegel Lead Pack In Inverness

TOLEDO, O. (AP)—A select field of 30 of the country's top professionals dashed Friday into the second round of the 16th Inverness \$18,000 invitational, one of the tightest tournaments in golf history.

Freddie Haas, former intercollegiate champ from New Orleans, and former national amateur

champion Skeel Riegel of Tulsa, Okla., showed the way in Thursday's opening 18-hole round with scores of 67, four under par.

But the leaders were barely hanging on, for 16 stars were within three strokes of them at tee time Friday, with 54 holes to go before someone gets the \$3,400 top prize.

Old man per—he's 71—put up quite a scrap against the talented field in the inaugural round. The 30 entrants turned in 94 birdies, but the field was only two under par for the route as 14 got back all but the two of the 94 birdie strokes on the tougher spots of the 6,545-yard layout.

The Inverness meet, switched to 72 holes of medal play after 15 years of best-ball team play, has 18-hole rounds scheduled Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Four Bums Lead In All-Star

CHICAGO (AP)—Four Brooklyn Dodgers hold leading positions in the All-Star Baseball Fall Friday.

The nation's fans, voting for starting lineups of the National and American League teams for the annual classic in Cincinnati July 14, so far have favored Pee Wee Reese at shortstop, Duke Snider in center field, Gil Hodges at first base and Roy Campanella as catcher.

Hodges and Campanella have been holding their front-running spots since the poll opened July 12. The other two moved up Friday. Reese went ahead of Philadelphia's Gran Hamner by 1,257 votes and Snider passed another Phillies star, Richie Ashburn, by 1,265.

The poll closes at midnight, July 3.

Sammy White, of Seattle, Boston Red Sox catcher, is third in the voting for that position with 10,338. He trails Yogi Berra, of New York and Sherman Lollar of Chicago.

Cards, Bums Aid Braves by Licking Each Other; Yankees Keep Rolling

The St. Louis Cardinals and the Brooklyn Dodgers are doing their level best to insure the 1953 National League pennant for the upstart Milwaukee Braves.

It's a strictly unintentional course. But nobody is happier than the transplanted Braves about the current state of affairs where the Cards can't win for losing in Brooklyn and the home-loving Dodgers would be much better off if they just skipped St. Louis on their Western tours.

The two would-be contenders have met nine times this spring. The Dodgers won the four played in Brooklyn and the Cards is have just finished sweeping their second series—a total of five games—from Brooklyn in St. Louis.

OPPORTUNISTS

Milwaukee, certainly not an outfit to let such a golden opportunity slip by, has gained three full games during Brooklyn's decline and fall in St. Louis. And because the Braves, too, have been winning, the only progress the Cardinals have made towards first place is the half game they picked up yesterday when Milwaukee was rained out.

The Cardinals beat the Dodgers, 12-4, in the windup of their series, played with the thermometer pushing 100 degrees. The Chicago Cubs moved within two percentage points of getting out of the cellar as they whipped Pittsburgh, 8-4, and New York defeated Cincinnati, 6-3.

The onrushing New York Yankees subdued St. Louis twice, 5-0 and 3-0, stretching their amazing American League lead to 11 games over Cleveland. The Indians had to go 12 innings to beat Philadelphia, 6-4.

BIG INNING

Boston broke almost all modern records for single inning scoring by pushing across 17 runs in the seventh against Detroit. The Red Sox went on to win, 23-3, making a total of 40 runs scored off Tiger pitching in two games.

Chicago defeated Washington 8-4, with six runs in the ninth inning.

Carl Erskine, who used to be able to beat the Cardinals just by tossing his glove on the mound, lasted only four innings and gave up six runs—three of them on a bases loaded double by Stan Musial. The loss marked the 10th straight game a Brooklyn starting pitcher has failed to last. Harvey Haddix, aided by Hal White in the sixth, picked up his eighth victory.

Hank Sauer, a home run specialist last season, hit his first since May 30 in the Cubs' third straight success over Pittsburgh.

Left-hander Dave Koslo lasted long enough against Cincinnati to gain his first victory of the year, although he had to have help from Hoyt Wilhelm in the sixth.

Eddie Lopat in the first game and Jim McDonald and Tom Gorman in the second game baffled the Browns as the Yankees made it three in a row and 31 out of their last 36 games.

STAN THE MAN

ST. LOUIS—Stan Musial is starting to get his hits again — and they're all doubles. The Cardinal outfielder has connected for four doubles in his last eight trips to the plate. Last season Musial was the leader in two-base hits with 42. A pair of doubles in Thursday's 12-4 victory over Brooklyn boosted his total of two-baggers to 13.

Lopat's victory was his eighth straight this season. He won his last five in a row last year.

During the runfest at Boston the Red Sox collected 14 hits and six walks to score their 17 runs. One of the hits was a home run by Dick Gernert with two on base. All but two of the other safeties were singles.

Three men reached base three times in the inning. Gene Stephens doubled once and singled twice. Sam White and Tom Umphlett got two singles and a walk apiece. White scored three runs. All were modern major league records.

Forced into extra innings when

Joe Astroth homered for the Athletics in the ninth, the Indians picked up two runs in the 12th on an error and three scratch hits.

Two walks, a double and four singles produced the six Chicago runs in the ninth at Washington. Virgil Trucks made his first start for the White Sox since being traded by the Browns, but Mike Fornieles in relief got the decision.

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
