# Portland's Heard Wins Stellar Mound Tilt with Oaks' Gettle

The Pacific Coast League has seen its top pitchers' battle of the season and it may still be tops when the campaign is over. Jesse Heard, Portland's little southpaw from Memphis, and Al Gettle, Oakland's veteran right hander from Urbana, Va., struggled through 10 scoreless innings last night in Oakland.

Then, in the 11th, Portland exploded for three runs. Oakland went down scrapping and put across two runs in its half. But Heard holds a 3-2 decision over Gettle, who had a no-hitter going until the seventh. Singles by Jim Russell, Herm Reich, Don Eggert and Charley Grant, after Jim Gladd had walked, pushed across Portland's runs. Piper Davis' long single accounted for Oakland's two. Heard allowed only six hits, Gettle eight.

**COMEBACK**  
Seattle, seemingly beaten as it went to bat in the ninth at Los Angeles, scored five runs and came out with an 8-5 victory over the Angels, who dropped five game out of first place. Ninth inning homers by Walt Judnich and Gordy Goldsberry highlighted the winning drive against Angel relief hurler Randy Gumpert. Long Tom Lovrich, who relieved starter Vern Kindsfather, was the winner. He gave up a homer in the ninth to Angel first baseman Fred Richards but struck out two men in the inning.

**MISSOURI HELP**  
Ken Gables, Walnut Grove, Missouri's contribution to the Sacramento hurling corps, set Hollywood down with five hits and beat the Stars, 4-1. Nippy Jones, Sac first baseman, tripled with two on in the eighth, inning and sewed up the game. It was the first victory in the series for the Solons. Mel Queen, Hollywood right hander, gave six hits. The defeat dropped the Stars 1 1/2 games behind the league leading Seattle Rainiers.

**Jackie Robinson Out With Injury**  
CHICAGO (AP) — Jackie Robinson will be missing from the Brooklyn Dodgers lineup for at least three days, perhaps longer. Robinson bruised and lacerated his right knee as he crashed into a concrete wall trying to catch a foul fly Thursday at St. Louis. The x-rays were negative but Robinson had difficulty walking and the knee was badly swollen.

**Kansas Mentor Ex-OSC Man**  
CORVALLIS (AP) — Fred "Tex" Winter, named Thursday to become basketball coach at Kansas State College, formerly played for Oregon State College. He was on the OSC basketball team of 1942. He also won the Northern Division pole vault title that year. As a Navy student, he later played for several Navy installations and the University of Southern California, winning the national AAU pole vault title for USC in 1946.

**1,000TH HIT TWICE**  
PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Johnny Wyrostek of the Phillies experienced the thrill of getting his 1,000th major league hit twice. In the first inning of the May 6 game against the Cincinnati Redlegs, Johnny banged a triple and was elected to join the "1,000 Hit Club." However, the records were wiped off the books when the game was rained out after two innings. He got that big one officially in the first inning of the May 9 contest against the Dodgers. It was a single off Joe Black.

# Pro, Amateur Aces Vie In Women's Open Tilts

ATLANTA (AP) — Two amateurs set out to give two veteran professionals their comeuppance in semifinal matches of the Women's Western Open golf tournament Friday.

Pat Lesser of Seattle and Dot Kirby of Atlanta had their work cut out for them, however, because their opponents were two of the best pros in women's golf—Louise Suggs of Atlanta and Patty Berg of St. Andrews, Ill.

It was another "revenge" match for Miss Lesser, the 19-year-old national intercollegiate champion from Seattle University. Her opponent was Miss Suggs, this year's leading money winner. In their only previous match, Miss Suggs beat the dark-haired coed, 4 and 2, in the first round of last year's Western Open.

Pat ousted amateur Jean Hopkins of Cleveland, O., 8 and 7 — the most lopsided score of the tournament—in Thursday's quarterfinals. Miss Suggs eliminated amateur Pat Grant, a WAG major at Fort McClellan, Ala., 5 and 3.
