Trackmen Eye NCAA Records

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — The elite of America's collegiate track and field athletes go after more records in Nebraska's twilight Saturday night in the conclusion of the 32nd annual NCAA meet.

They hoped to write new marks into the books to accompany the record-smashing 183-foot discus toss by Jim Iness of Southern California in the Friday preliminary.

At least one additional meet record seemed certain Saturday night. That's in the miles which will feature Wes Santee, the slim young man from the Kansas prairies. Wes ran 4:02.4 at the Compton, Calif., relay's June 5, and that's faster than the mile has been traveled by any other American.

Olson Bobo Gets Young By Wide Vote

NEW YORK (AP) — Gaim, poker-faced Carl (Bobo) Olson believes he will beat Engino's Randy Turpin "on style" and win the world middleweight championship in August.

Shortly after he handed durable Paddy Young an artistic icing in Madison Square Garden last night to capture the American 160-pound crown by a unanimous and very big margin baling Bobo said: "I've got the style to beat Turpin."

"It's awkward, strong and pretty good," said Bobo of the one-time world champion, "but I believe my bobbing and weaving style will do it."

TROUBLE

"I saw pictures of his second fight with (Ray) Robinson," said Bobo as he dunked his hands in a bucket of ice water, "and I know my style will give him more trouble than anyone else has."

Including Robinson?

"Yes, including Robinson," said Bobo.

Olson and Manager Sid Flaherty were eager for the clash with Turpin but Flaherty said he wasn't happy with promoter Jim Morris' choice for the site. Morris wants to put it on in New York's Yankee Stadium on Aug. 27. Flaherty said he prefers San Francisco, his and Bobo's home town.

"We can do \$500,000 at the gate in Kzar Stadium and televise the fight, too," said Flaherty. "That's a lot better than they'll do in New York."

GOOD TAKE

Last night's massacre, which drew 7,418 fans, grossed \$36,250 at a \$12 top. The 15-rounder was broadcast and telecast nationally, with an extra \$50,000 for radio and TV, each gladiator collected a total of about \$23,000.

The 24-year-old Young, a power puncher with his left, was in the fight in the first three rounds, briefly again in the seventh, and eighth and in the fifteenth. Otherwise it was no contest.

At the finish Judge Arthur Susskind scored it 12-3, Judge Arthur Aldana had it 11-3-1, and Referee Pete Seakos, 9-4-2. The AP scorecard scored it 11-3-1.

NO KNOCKDOWNS

There were no knockdowns and nothing close to one although both got in their Sunday punches. Especially in the second. In that stanza Young first shook up Olson with a left hook to the jaw but slope shouldered Bobo came back with a left hook of his own that seemed to rock Paddy.

Young, who weighed 159½, to Olson's 159½, thought he could wear down the 3 to 1 choice with body bombs. Bobo took them without flinching and returned all with interest.

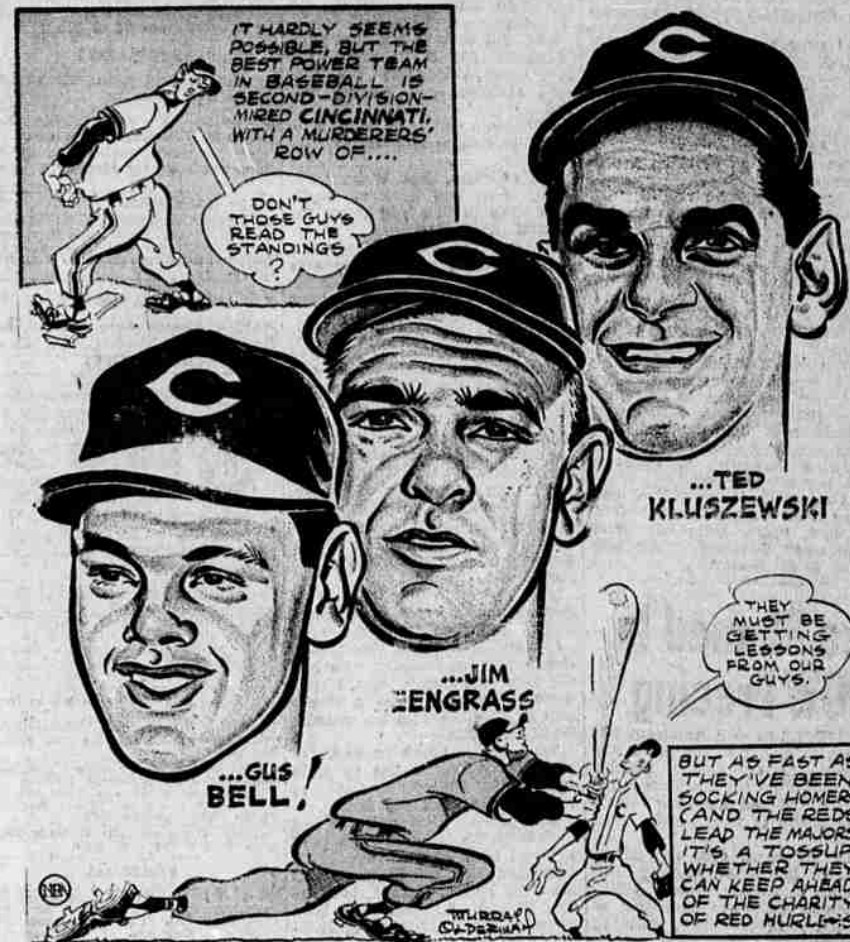

2nd Place Takes AL Spotlight

The big question around the American League right now is "Who do you like for second?" It's true that the New York Yankees' tremendous first place lead has been shaved to a mere 10 games, but if you look a little deeper into the standings you find that a real battle is developing for the runner-up slot.

Only three games separate second place Cleveland from fourth place Boston with the Chicago White Sox sandwiched in between. Even Washington and Philadelphia can't be counted out of the race for second.

The Senators are five lengths behind the Indians and A's, although now in the midst of a three game losing streak, are only 7½.

JINX LICKED

The Indians whipped Washington, last night, marking the first time they have won a game on the same day that New York lost one since May 8. The Yankees bowed to Ted Gray and the lowly Detroit Tigers, 3-2.

The White Sox defeated Philadelphia, 5-2, and the Red Sox, although lamed considerably after their wild scoring spree of the past two days, beat the St. Louis Browns, 4-1.

In the National League the Braves absorbed their worst beating since moving to Milwaukee. The revitalized New York Giants swamped them, 15-1.

Brooklyn broke a four game losing streak by taking the second half of a doubleheader from the Chicago Cubs, 7-1, after the Cubs had come from behind to take the free-hitting opener, 11-8.

CARDS ROLL

The third place St. Louis Cardinals kept rolling with a 10-2 triumph over Pittsburgh, their ninth victory in their last 10 games. Philadelphia whipped Cincinnati, 10-3.

Gray held the Yankees to five hits in registering his first victory of the season against nine defeats. Gene Woodling's home run after a safe hit by Joe Collins produced the only New York tally.

Jim Delsing binked two home runs and Gray himself scored the winning run after singing in the seventh.

Billy Goodman of the Red Sox ran his hitting streak to 15 games with a pair of doubles and a single against the Browns.

The Braves really blew one against the Giants. Three Milwaukee pitchers gave up 16 hits, the fielders contributed two errors and the batters were baffled by Ball (The Barber) Maglie, who allowed only four safeties. Bob Buhl drew the loss, his third.

EASY WIN

Heavy hitting by Rip Repulski, Ray Jablonski and Solly Hemus made it easy for Wilmer Mizell, to pick up his seventh victory for St. Louis. Repulski and Jablonski each had four for four, while Hemus drove in three with a triple and a pair of singles.

Randy Jackson homered with the bases loaded to put Chicago ahead to stay in the first game of its doubleheader with the Dodgers but his bases-empty blast was the only run the Cubs could get off Russ Meyer in the nightcap. Ralph Kiner and Hank Sauer also homered for the Cubs in the opener.

The Seattle Rainiers may be weak against left hand pitching, but they're all right with their own southpaw pitcher, Jim Davis, doing the throwing.

They were Friday night. Los Angeles sent Lefty Joe Ostrowski against the Pacific Coast League leaders and he proved to be a pretty good batting practice thrower. Seattle tagged him for 11 hits in seven innings, and went on to win, 3-1. Davis, meanwhile, pitched a six-hitter and the Angels got their only run in the second by bunting a double and a single.

Billy Joe Waters, Oakland right hander, twirled the Accurs to a 3-1 victory over Portland and squared the series at two games each. The Oaks got all their runs in the sixth on Pete Milne's double, Ray Dandridge's single, Piper Davis' double, a fielder's choice and a force. Portland threatened in the ninth as Waters loaded the bases with one out, but Jim Russell popped out and Herm Reich grounded out.

San Diego nosed out San Francisco, 2-1, as Bob Kerrigan outpitched Al Lien, but he required help in the ninth from the old reliable Al Benton. In the last of the ninth Dick Faber singled with the bases loaded. The hit gave the Victory to Benton and the defeat was charged against Bob Muncie, who came in to pitch for the Seals in the eighth. When the Padres scored in the seventh it was their first run in 26 innings.

Hollywood cuffed Sacramento, 7-2, but the Stars' pitching was uncertain until Lefty Lloyd Little took over in the fourth and shut out the Sacs the rest of the way. Red Munger started, gave way to John MacDonald in the third and Clarence Marshall was summoned to replace him in the fourth inning. But Little pitched 5 and two thirds innings and not only wasn't scored on, but didn't allow a hit. Jack Phillips, Lee Wallis and Dale Long hit homers for the Stars.

Trotting Feature Shapes

NEW YORK (AP) — Word from up the Hudson says that the little village of Goshen (Pop. 3,400), the "cradle of American trotting," already is stirring with preparations for its one great day of the year when the \$70,000 Hambletonian Stake is raced over its historic Good Time track.

With the date of this year's rich event, Aug. 12, still more than a month away, some 70 horses are in training and around Goshen for the meet, which features the three-year-old classic. This comes as something of a surprise to this corner, for we had supposed all the available trotters were occupied at Roswell Raceway on Long Island.

Among those warming up for a crack at the game's richest prize are three father-and-son combinations, two of which have won the Hambletonian before. Family partnerships seem to thrive in the sulky business as in no other branch of sports.

Best known of the three is the team of Ben White, 80-year-old dean of the drivers, and his son, Gib, 38, both of Orlando, Fla. They are prepping Famed Abbey, a son of Guy Abbey, who sired the immortal Greyhound. The colt did not start last year but is said to be turning in some hot training miles at present. Gib is expected to drive him in the big one, old Ben being content with his record of four Hambletonian triumphs.

Henry Thomas, 64, who has held the reins on three winners, is thought to be about ready to let his son Dick, 32, have a whirl at it this time. They have been driving against each other regularly on the Grand Circuit. Their hope in the Goshen test is Shelby Hanover, who won one of nine starts as a juvenile.

The third father-son set consists of Harry Bedell of Ridgewood, N. J., who at 57 is known as "Junior" to his more seasoned rivals, and his son John, 31. They never have won a Hambletonian, but think they have something real good in Mr. Titan, a son of Titan Hanover the 1945 winner. The current word is that Harry intends to do the steering on Aug. 12, but that John is trying to change his mind.
