

FINALLY BLOWS UP

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaya (AP) — An old demolition charge placed by retreating British forces to blow up a small bridge during the Japanese invasion of 1941 finally detonated Monday, throwing 12 workmen into the river. Four are missing and believed drowned.

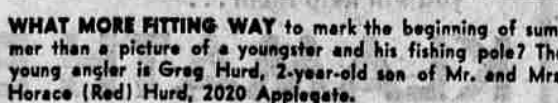
AMNESTY

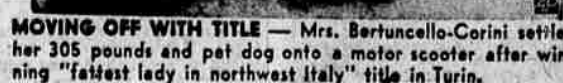
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The judge told Johnson, "But my hands are tied. You waived your rights. I know from my own experience how they handle these things in Missouri."
