Klamath Falls and Medford are still locked for the top spot in American Legion Junior Baseball League 4 after Sunday's activity saw both the leaders split doubleheaders.

The Cokes split with Central Point at Recreation Park, losing the first game, 7-5, winning the second 11-9.

Medford dropped the first game to Grants Pass, 5-4, came back in the second with a 22-2 slaughter.

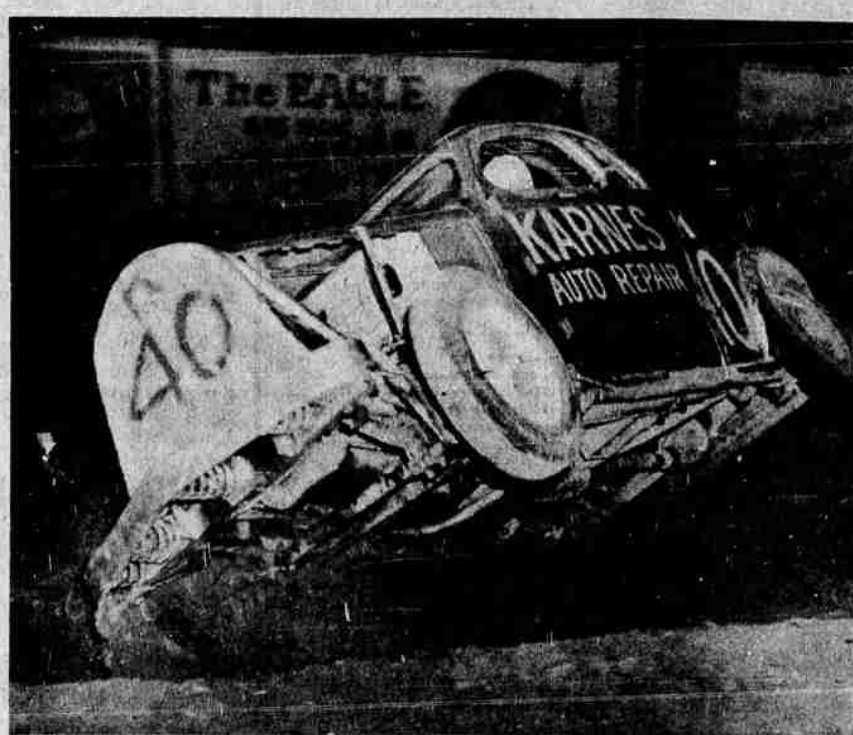
OGA Meet Opens Today

The women's field was headed by 1951 champion Gracie De Moss, Corvallis, Ore. The defending title, Pat Lasser, Seattle, did not enter the 1953 tourney.

Then last Saturday evening he had a 4:03.7 in the NCAA meet here—the second fastest time.

Santee expressed a little disappointment that he had missed the magic four-minute race and revealed he was some five pounds under his usual weight of 140-45 and "very tired."

Interviewed in Kansas City, he said, "The field was simply too crowded to have done any better."

Santee, who said he was learning more about his pace, still thinks he can crack a four-minute mile under right conditions. It could come at the National AAU Meet in Dayton, O., this week end.

"After the AAU meet I hope to hook on with one of the European tours," he said. "I have a chance. I believe, to join the one that will perform in Finland, Sweden and Norway."

After that, he reports to the Marines at Quantico, Va., for summer training.

LONGVIEW, Wash. (AP)—Twenty-two-year-old Dick Price, a home-towner, walked off with the Washington State Men's Amateur Golf Tournament title Saturday, besting Everett's Bob Whisman on the 28th hole, 10 and 8.

Price took the crown with some dandy long-bull driving and cool putting. Whisman, on the other hand, was having his troubles on the tee shots and on the greens.

Price started out yike a champion, jumping off to a 5-up lead on the eighth hole. He bogied the ninth and Whisman parred it to cut Price's lead to 4-up.

Continuing his steady game, Price ended the first 18 holes with a one-under-par 69 and a 9-up advantage over the Everett Linksman.

The second 18 was a carbon copy of the first, with Whisman's tee shots and putting troubles spelling the match. Price held a 9-up advantage when the duo started the final nine. Whisman got off a poor tee shot on the 28th and Price grabbed the crown with a birdie on the hole.
