15 California Weekend Dead

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Fifteen traffic fatalities — one of the highest figures in recent weeks—were reported as the result of Northern California traffic accidents this weekend.

The speeding Southern Pacific's Shasta Daylight out of Portland collided with an auto east of San Pablo Sunday night, instantly killing a passenger, tentatively identified by the Highway Patrol as driver Charles F. Marshall, 36. San Pablo died this morning at the Kaiser Medical Center. No train, which was delayed about an hour and a half because of the accident.

Two taxicab passengers were killed near Squaw Rock on the Russian River when the driver said he believed he dived "for just an instant" and the cab plunged into a ditch. One tentatively identified victim was Vernon Newbury, 37, Santa Rosa. The other, a woman, was not available.

Truman Arrives East, Says He's Avoiding Politics

WASHINGTON (AP)—Harry S. Truman slept "late" Monday—past 7 a.m.—and passed up his usual before-breakfast walk.

He was, he confessed, "just too tired" after the three-day automobile trip of nearly 1,200 miles from his home in Independence, Mo.

The former President didn't look tired, as he sat in his suite at the Hotel Mayflower chatting with a reporter.

The 66-year-old Truman refused to talk politics for publication on the ground that the time is not ripe for serious attacks on the Republicans.

Truman drove in yesterday with Mrs. Truman for a round of meetings with old personal and political friends.

"Keeping away from politics" was one of the main things Truman said he had in mind when he arrived Sunday night.

Lakeview High Ag Teacher Hired

LAKEVIEW—Delmer J. Dooley, formerly of Platte, S.D., has been employed by School District 7 to be vocational agriculture instructor at Lakeview High School, filling the vacancy left by William Holloway who has been given a two-year leave of absence to join the technical assistance program in Pakistan.

Mr. and Mrs. Dooley arrived in Lakeview the past weekend, and this week it was announced by H. B. Ferrin, superintendent of schools, that his application had been accepted.

The early part of this week, Dooley accompanied Holloway to Hot Lake, near La Grande to attend the summer conference of the Oregon Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association. At that time, Holloway was presented with his 20-year-pin, honoring his 20 years as an ag. teacher, given by Sears Roebuck Foundation.

At Rotary Club Wednesday, Holloway was presented with a desk pen set by the club. He plans to leave later this week for Washington D.C.

Dooley received his bachelor degree at South Dakota State College and his master's degree at Colorado A & M. The past five years he has been an instructor at Platte, S.D. During the war he served as an engineer and gunner with the Army Air Force in Africa and Italy.

Pro-Hells Canyon Association Asks Radio Station's End

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—The Idaho Oregon Hells Canyon Association has asked the Federal Communications Commission not to renew the license of Boise radio station KDSH because the station discontinued a series of programs favoring construction of Hells Canyon Dam.

The association's secretary-treasurer, George H. R. Taylor, in a letter to the FCC termed the action "unlawful and discriminatory." The letter was made public Sunday.

Taylor was one of a group of speakers who appeared on a transcribed 15-minute weekly broadcast sponsored by the association calling for construction of the Snake River dam.

Taylor's letter said Earl Glade Jr., station manager, notified him May 20 the Idaho Power Co., which has proposed to build a dam for construction of the Snake, had objected to the broadcasts. The broadcasts were terminated May 30 "without assignment of reason, and without advance notice of any kind," Taylor said.

The letter added the station's general manager, Westernman Whillock, informed him June 8 the broadcasts "failed to meet station policy because they were negative in character." Whillock said Idaho Power Co. officials had "questioned several statements of facts" in the series of programs but had not asked to have the programs discontinued.

Lakeview Queen Selection June 28

Not Committed To Conquering All Of Korea: Churchill

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill told a cheering House of Commons Monday "we have not committed ourselves in any way to go forward and conquer the whole area of Korea and place it under the authority of Mr. Syngman Rhee."

At the same time, the Prime Minister disclosed Britain had sent a stiff note to Rhee denouncing his "treacherous action."

Churchill said the South Korean President's release of thousands of anti-Communist prisoners of war had created a situation "full of danger."

Churchill told the House "the matter is obviously very serious. We can all see the appalling way of the fruits of these years of fighting."

He said the U.S. had a "very heavy burden to bear" in the guarding of the prisoners, explaining that the U.S. had moved "30,000 troops from guarding prisoners to the holding of the front."

The British protest note to Rhee, delivered by the British minister in South Korea Monday, told him: "As a member of the U.N. whose military forces are participating in the Korea action Her Majesty's government strongly condemns this treacherous violation of the authority of the U.N. command to which the government of Korea had agreed in 1950."

"Moreover, Her Majesty's government understands that during recent weeks the government of the Republic of Korea have actually affirmed this position by assurances to the U.N. command that no unilateral action of this kind would be taken by them."

"Left-wing Laborite Jennie Lee said "a great deal of world opinion was baffled by the failure of the United Nations intelligence service" and wanted to know whether the Prime Minister would seek an investigation "to find out how this treacherous act took place."

Churchill replied "we must place confidence in the United States authorities who were very likely to examine all the details of the course taken and the efficiency of their intelligence."

Under a barrage of questions, Churchill said: "It was hoped that by a settlement in Korea—there would have
