CHICAGO (AP) — At least 2 persons were injured Monday in a collision of two elevated railway trains carrying workers downtown in the morning rush hour.

A four-coach Evanston train rammed into a standing eight-coach Englewood train at the Sheridan Road station, Sheridan Road and Irving Park Boulevard, on the north side. The two trains were southbound.

Twenty-six persons were taken to the American hospital. Three were hurt seriously enough to be kept there.

### Big 3 To Meet, 100 Chinese POWs Taken After Flight

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House indicated Monday the Big Three Bermuda conference will start July 8 regardless of whether the French have chosen a new Premier by that time.

President Eisenhower, Prime Minister Churchill of Great Britain and a French government representative will attend. The British announced Sunday that it is a conference will start July 8. The White House at the same time, described July 8 as only a "target date," and said the actual start of the sessions still was dependent upon selection of a French Premier.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty was asked Monday whether he could shed any light on the differences in the British and the American announcements.

"There isn't any difference," Hagerty replied.

Hagerty added he was sure there will be a French representative on hand for the start of the sessions July 8.

Asked whether that meant that the conference would go ahead then whether the French picked a Premier or not, Hagerty simply repeated that the British and the United States expect the French government to have a representative present.

A little further clarification was provided by diplomatic officials who said France has notified the United States it plans to be represented by a Premier and that Rene Mayer, head of the present caretaker government, will attend if a successor has not been chosen.

The French message agreed to July 8 as the date for the meeting.

ANTI-RED AT LAST  
TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israel's trade union federation, Histadrut, voted overwhelmingly Monday to abandon its neutral attitude on the issue of Communism in world labor organizations, and to join the anti-Red International Confederation of Free Trade Unions.

### 100 Chinese POWs Taken After Flight

PUSAN, Korea (AP) — About 100 Chinese prisoners of war broke from a U.N. prison camp Sunday but were recaptured quickly, as anti-Red Chinese POWs clamored to join more than 27,000 freed North Korean POWs.

Special Allied investigators meanwhile surveyed the turmoil caused by release or escape of the North Korean prisoners, which now perils a Korean treaty.

The U. S. POW command said

some 100 Chinese captives escaped from a mainland inter-urban but were arrested soon after by South Korean police near Tongnae, about five miles north of Pusan.

The command said South Korean police turned 57 of the Chinese back to Allied control and held 50 others.

Unofficial reports, however, said some eluded the police and were seeking shelter among Chinese residents.

It was the first breakout by Chinese since the mass escape of anti-Red North Koreans began last mid-week.

Some 2,000 anti-Red Chinese prisoners marched about their enclosure and waved Chinese Nationalist, South Korean, U.S. and U.N. flags Monday in their second demonstration in two days in a camp on Cheju Island.

Using non-poisonous gas, U.N. troops restored order without casualties.

Anti-Red Chinese POWs Saturday had demanded immediate release "the way Korean prisoners were released."

The POW command also reported only 8,254 North Korean anti-Red prisoners remain in camps which held 33,416 until last Thursday, when South Korean President Syngman Rhee ordered them freed.

The total includes 668 who fled Saturday and Sunday, but not "a small number" who escaped Sunday night from a POW enclosure near Sangmudai, which previously

had lost all but 306 of its original 10,561 North Korean POWs.

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
