### Indochina King Out Of Exile

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—Cambodia's King Norodon Sihanouk has returned to his Indochinese kingdom as abruptly as he left it a week ago, but today he avoided his capital city, Phnom Penh. Terminating his self-imposed

exile to Bangkok, capital of neighboring Thailand, the King and his retinue returned to Cambodia by motor yesterday and stopped at Battambang, 180 miles northwest of Phnom Penh.

### House Indian Group to Meet

WASHINGTON (AP)—A special House subcommittee set up to investigate Indian Bureau operation will hold its first meeting in Sheridan, Wyo., July 15, Chairman Harrison (R-Wyo.) said Saturday. The meeting will be held in connection with an all Indian celebration there which is expected to attract at least 3,000 members of several tribes and bands. The subcommittee will study the extent to which the bureau has carried out its program to free Indians from government supervision.

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### Six Migs Shot Down Today

SEOUL (AP)—Hot U. S. Sabre jet pilots today blasted six Communist MIGs from the North Korean skies.

The 35th jet ace of the war was crowned in blazing aerial warfare which extended nearly to the Manchurian border. Col. Robert Baldwin of Sherman Oaks, Calif., qualified as an ace by downing his fifth MIG. He also has damaged three.

### Canadian Boat Sinks; 1 Missing

PORT ARTHUR, Ont. (AP)—A Canadian freighter sank last night and one of her seamen was missing and presumed drowned after the ship collided in a heavy Lake Superior fog with another vessel.

The sunken ship was the Canada Steamship Line's 4,432-ton Scotiadic, which went down with a cargo of 253,000 bushels of wheat, valued at more than \$500,000. She collided with the 4,959-ton Burlington, owned by the Patterson Steamship Lines. The Scotiadic's 29 crewmen abandoned ship, but one, Wallace MacDermid, 37, of Sault Ste. Marie, was reported missing.

ANSWER: The pay of your grade or rank for each training assembly or day in camp while in a unit.

QUESTION: How much spare time a year must I spend to earn a lifetime income?

QUESTION: How much retirement income will I get?

ANSWER: It can be \$90.00 or more per month for enlisted men.

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
