WAR QUIETING DOWN AGAIN

SEOUL (AP)—Communist troops jabbed lightly at Allied lines across Korea and patrols prowled through no man's land today. Both Allied and Communist armies appeared to be awaiting the outcome of tangled armistice negotiations.

Communist loudspeakers on the Central Front again blared their prediction that an armistice will be signed Thursday—third anniversary of the war. The Reds had predicted a truce on June 25 for days before an armistice was jeopardized by South Korea's release of more than 27,000 anti-Communist war prisoners.

The biggest Red probing attack Tuesday was in company strength, the Eighth Army reported.

Overcast skies and rain grounded most Allied warplanes.

The Eighth Army said more than 10,000 Communists were killed last week, most of them in the bloody fighting on the Central Front. The total was the biggest since the battles for White Horse Mountain and Triangle Hill last October.

Allied casualties for the week were not disclosed, but U. N. losses presumably were heavy in the battles along the East-Central.

HOUSE VOTES TAX RELIEF - - FOR MEMBERS OF HOUSE

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House of Representatives, which since last February has kept bottled up a bill for individual tax reduction, has voted to give its own members substantial tax relief.

But the Senate may knock the plan in the head, as it did last year.

Without debate and with no audible opposition, the House voted yesterday to allow members of Congress to deduct all their Washington expenses when they figure out their tax bills. They could deduct lodging, food, taxis, telephone charges and so on for themselves but not for their families.

For tax purposes, their legal residences would be in their home districts, and all Washington expenses would be considered business expenses and deductible for tax purposes. Congress members may now deduct up to \$3,000 a year as Washington expenses.

The tax relief proposal was written into the annual appropriation bill to finance Congress. It was proposed by Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.), who long had advocated a pay raise for congressmen on the ground that they have difficulty making ends meet on their present \$15,000 official income.

A similar proposal was added by the House last year to the same bill, but the Senate knocked it out and the result was the compromise allowing members of Congress to deduct up to \$3,000 as business expenses. The McCormack proposal in effect would remove this limitation.

Sen. Williams (R-Del.), who led the Senate fight against the proposal last year, said he would fight it again this year.

Some members of Congress, Williams said, have large outside incomes which put them in the bracket taxed at 90 per cent of income. He estimated that these members spent at least \$20,000 a year while in Washington, and if they could deduct at all, their tax bill would be decreased by 90 per cent of that amount, of \$18,000.

The House-voted plan, he said, "gives the most relief to those who need it least."

McCormack estimated that the average congressman spends at least \$4,500 on business expenses while attending sessions of Congress, a conservative estimate.

It's only fair, he said, that the lawmakers be treated the same as anyone else coming to Washington on business and be allowed to deduct their necessary expenses.

AG DEPARTMENT TO SELL PEAS

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department Monday offered to sell its remaining stocks of 23,200 tons of Austrian winter peas on a bid basis.

A recent sale of 80,000 tons to three large private concerns at a negotiated price of \$30 a ton brought congressional charges of favoritism, and an investigation by a House agriculture subcommittee which is still under way.

The peas were bought under a grower price support program in 1949 and 1950 at prices averaging about \$90 a ton.

FLYING BOXCAR VANISHES

TOKYO (AP)—A C119 Flying Boxcar vanished in a rainstorm today with its crew of four and three paratroopers. The big transport was part of the airlift taking the U. S. 187th Regimental Combat Team to Korea.

The pilot radioed shortly after taking off from Southern Japan's Ashiya air base that the gyro compass had failed and he was returning to base. It was his last message.

Japanese police at Moji, on the northern tip of Kyushu, reported the plane may have crashed into the rugged mountains near there about 6:30 a. m. A ground party was sent into the mountains.

Platte River, nine miles north of here. The victim was identified yesterday as Mrs. Irene Espinosa, 19.

A couple acquainted with the Espinosas, identified by Raedel as Benancio Trevino, 24, and his wife Martina, 28, were questioned last night. Both couples moved here recently from Houston, Tex.

The detective captain said Trevino

no told him he drove Espinosa to a river bridge where they unloaded what Espinosa said was "junk" he wanted to get rid of. He said the "junk" included a trunk similar to the one containing the body.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Trevino denied any knowledge of the slaying.
