Plywood Firm Cuts Schedule

OLYMPIA (AP) — Georgia Pacific Plywood Co., announced Tuesday it will reduce its work schedule from five to four days a week at Plywood plants in Olympia, Bellingham and Springfield, Ore.

Gen. Lewis A. Ick, Company vice chairman, said the reduced work week will go into effect July 6 after a four-day shutdown over Independence Day from July 2-5.

"In shifting the general offices to Olympia, we have made some changes in the administrative set-up and in the assignments of responsibilities and missions of our various plants," Gen. Ick said.

Circuit Judge Frank J. Lonergan imposed the sentence after the prosecution reported Fuller had previously been convicted of forgery, unlawful use of an automobile and grand larceny.

CHICAGO (AP) — Once again the country cut their daily hog supply well below the indicated number Tuesday and forced buyers to respond in the usual fashion—paying 25 to 50 cents a hundred pounds higher.

Cattle were steady to 20 cents lower with steers and she stock in poorest demand and sheep were steady to weak.

Good to prime spring lambs generally made \$23.00 to \$25.50 but a top price of \$27.00 was paid sparingly.

Salable receipts were estimated at 7,500 hogs, 8,000 cattle, 400 calves and 1,000 sheep.

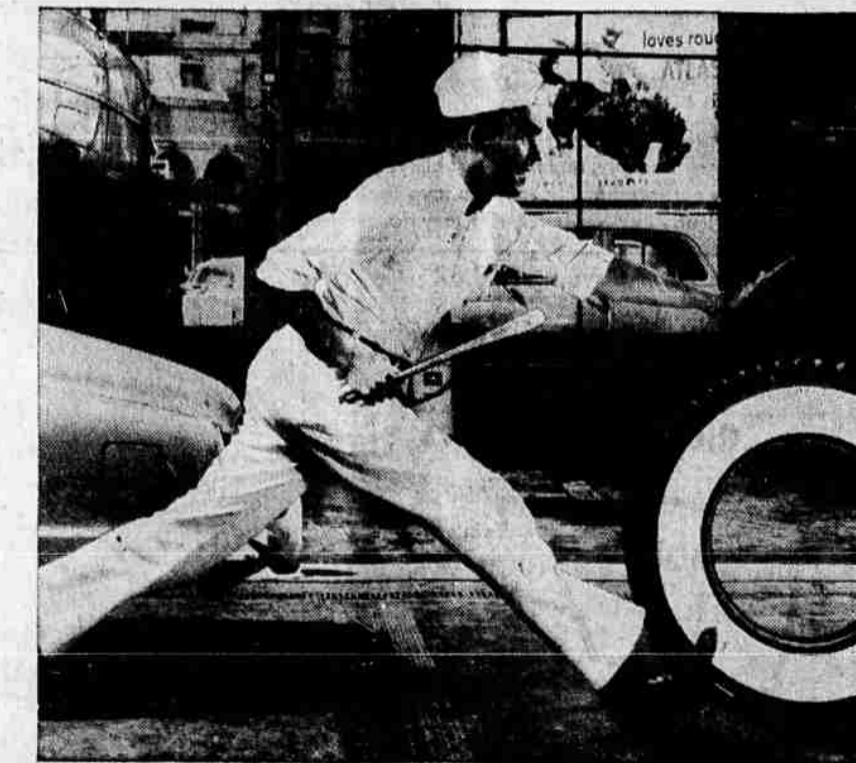

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Morse Points At Tax Benefits Granted Private Utilities

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon said Monday that private utility firms got millions of dollars in tax amortization benefits after the Korean War started.

"I've never heard anyone in the Eisenhower administration describe these as creeping socialism," he said in a 2-hour 55-minute speech which he titled "The Cadillac Crusade Against Public Power."

But President Eisenhower has referred to the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) as "creeping socialism," Morse said.

"I say for shame," Morse declared. "Now we have a president of the United States so dedicated apparently to the philosophy of big business that he describes a program dedicated to the little people of the Tennessee Valley as creeping socialism."

Morse said that Eisenhower has "forgotten completely the position he took in the late campaign when he was trying to gain votes in the South."

Communists Have Official Say On Spies: No Justice

NEW YORK (AP) — The Communist party had its official say about the Rosenberg spy executions Tuesday, and called the couple "two immortal American patriots."

The statement was published in the Daily Worker, party journal, over the signatures of William Z. Foster, party chairman, Pettis Perry and Elizabeth Gurley Flynn.

The statement said "the claim the Rosenbergs 'had their day in court' is a mockery of truth and justice. The Supreme Court was reconvened illegally to cancel the stay of execution, and met with a pistol to its head in the form of impeachment threats, in an atmosphere of a Southern lynch town."

Julius and Ethel Rosenberg were electrocuted at Sing Sing Friday for conspiring to betray U. S. atomic bomb secrets to Russia. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court five times. It met in special session last week after Justice William O. Douglas granted a stay on the grounds the couple might have been tried under the wrong law. By a 6-3 vote the full court voided the stay.

Throughout their trial and afterwards, the Rosenbergs declined to answer questions whether they ever belonged to the Communist Party, and insisted they were innocent victims of a frameup.

Two of the signers of the statement, 62-year-old Miss Flynn and 56-year-old Pettis Perry, were convicted Jan. 21 with 11 other "security" Communist leaders for participating in a revolutionary conspiracy. Each was sentenced to three years in prison and fined \$6,000. All have appealed.

Foster, who is 72, recently was granted a stay of trial because of a heart condition. He is charged with conspiring to advocate overthrow of the government.

KING VOWS AGAIN

SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — The King of Cambodia made another vow Tuesday—he won't return to his capital at Phnom Penh until France grants his country full independence. The king, 31-year-old Norodom Sihanouk, returned to Cambodia Sunday from the self-imposed exile in Thailand he vowed he wouldn't break until his country gained total freedom. But he settled down in Battambang, 150 miles from the capital.

Hunt For Missing Girl Continues

NORWALK, Calif. (AP) — Developments in several directions Tuesday enlivened the hunt for 8-year-old Stella Dylrene Noiau, believed kidnapped Saturday night from a shopping center.

A cab driver in Stockton, Calif., examined enlarged photographs of Stella, flown to that northern city, and said he was almost certain they were of the child he saw leap from a car.

The taxi driver, William A. McLeod, 23, said a small girl darted from a blue 1952 Mercury and stopped at the southern outskirts of Stockton about 5:30 a.m. Monday. He said a woman jumped from the back seat and pulled her back into the car and that the youngster screamed: "I want my mommy."

NO MORE MOUNTAINS

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — Tenzing Norgay, conqueror of the world's highest mountain, said Tuesday he is through with mountain climbing.

The Sherpa guide, who with New Zealand beekeeper Sir Edmund Hillary, scaled Mt. Everest, declared: "This is certain—no more conquests of peaks. My ambition had been to stand on top of the world and God blessed its fulfillment. There it ends."

Linman Wins Board Seat

J. P. (Jack) Linman yesterday won a 335 to 282 vote victory over R. A. (Bob) Thompson for a seat on the City High School Board. Linman, the incumbent, was seeking his second term.

At 6:40 last evening, only 272 votes had been cast. In the remaining hour and 40 minutes of polling time, 345 voters jammed the polling place to cast ballots.

Justice Won't Be Subpoenaed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Judiciary Committee Tuesday decided in a secret session not to subpoena Supreme Court Justice Tom C. Clark for questioning by a subcommittee.

Chairman Reed (R-Ill.) said the action was taken after the majority of the committee which has been investigating actions of the Justice Department while Clark headed it as attorney general.
