

Hogan In Scotland For Open

PRESTWICK, Scotland (AP)—Ben Hogan, the little man with a magic wand for a golf club, landed in Scotland today after a transatlantic flight to prepare for the one major tournament he has never won—the British Open. He's never tried it before.

It was a tanned and smiling Hogan who told those who came to greet him that he had made the trip for three reasons: "Everyone I know wanted me to, this year the British Open doesn't interfere with anything I wanted to play in America and because I am told Carnoustie is one of the finest courses in the world."

The recently crowned U. S. Open Champion will spend two weeks polishing his game for the British Open which will be held on the testing Carnoustie layout from July 6-10. The championship Carnoustie where the 72-hole medal play event will be held probably is the toughest in the British Isles.

Asked upon his arrival whether he'll win Hogan replied "golf tournaments are like horse races—hard to predict. But I shall be trying to win as I do in every tournament."

Just before he took off from New York with his wife and Frank Stranahan, the Toledo strong boy who also will compete, Ben said he planned to start playing the course today. "I haven't given a thought to the course. After all, no one else can tell you about a golf course."

He said he expects no trouble from the British ball. "I will use American-made balls that conform to British rules," he said. "The smaller ball goes farther, and anyhow I hope to get in lots of practice."

Ben is just going to follow the same methods he uses in all his tournaments.

"If the big tees are closed, I'll get plenty of shots from where I think the championship tee shots should land," he said. "If the weather is calm for three or four days, I'll begin to drop the ball back to where I think it would be if I were playing against the wind."

Moore Defends Boxing Crown

Maxim Ring Foe in Ogden

OGDEN, Utah (AP)—It took 16 years for Archie Moore to achieve the goal of a world champion in boxing, and the 38-year-old craftsman from California doesn't intend to surrender the title he holds as king of the light heavyweights in his 15-round fight with Joey Maxim tomorrow night.

Moore, the St. Louis-born Negro, has seen enough of the fight game from the lower ranks. It was a long, bitter and often frustrating path he trod coming up.

And when he got his big chance he made the most of it. This was in St. Louis last December when he handed the champion, the same handsome Italian from Cleveland, Maxim, an artistic lacing in 15 rounds.

The bout is to be televised nationally (CBS network). It will not be broadcast anywhere by radio.

Co-promoters Al Warden and Kenny Mayne predicted a turnout of 10,000 to 12,000 in the open air Ogden Stadium and gate receipts approaching \$100,000. On top of this will be the television money of \$50,000. Each fighter gets a \$25,000, or 30 per cent of the net gate, plus 15 per cent of the TV money.

The promoters took over selection of a referee and two judges when Jack Kearns, Maxim's manager, and Charley Johnston, for Moore, failed to agree on officials. It was in December, 1938, that

Moore fought his first professional fight, and it was in St. Louis. He won, over a man named Sammy Christian. Some 119 matches later came the title victory.

Archie's luck was indifferent until nearly nine years ago when he wrote Johnson in New York and asked him to handle his affairs. "I told him to 'come on,' Johnson recounted. "He drove over in a rattie-trap car from California. Believe me, he was out at the seat of his pants, but we've done pretty well since then. We don't want to backtrack now."

Facing the Pacific Coast enemies are Sim Iness, who broke the world's record with a toss of 190 feet, 7 1/2 inch in the NCAA meet, and husky shot-putter Parry O'Brien.

Interest will be focused on O'Brien's effort to break his own world shot record of 59 feet, 2 3/4 inches and Iness' attempt to better his newly-established mark.

Moran Heads Pocatello

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP)—Cyril (Butch) Moran, former major and minor league first baseman, Monday was named playing manager of the Pioneer League Pocatello Bannocks succeeding Hershel Martin.

General manager Walter Malls said Martin was being dismissed because the club's board of directors felt "a change had to be made."

Pocatello, the 1952 pennant winner, is now in the Pioneer League basement 21 1/2 games behind league-leading Ogden.

Moran, who played for Cincinnati in the National League in 1939 and 1940 and later was in the Pacific Coast League and American Association, held down first base for Lewiston in the Western International League last year.

The sharp-stroking miss from San Diego, Calif., trounced Dora Kilian of South Africa, 6-0, 6-0, in a second round match. She drew an opening bye.

The leading contender for Miss Connolly's title, Doris Hart of Coral Gables, Fla., kept pace with the champion by sweeping into the third round on a 6-0, 6-0 victory over Jeanette Morgan of Great Britain.

Sacs Make Room For Essegian SACRAMENTO (AP)—The Pacific Coast League Sacramento Solons Monday optioned first baseman Jerry Ballard to Salem of the Western International League to make room for Charles (Chuck) Essegian, 22, former Stanford University football and baseball star. 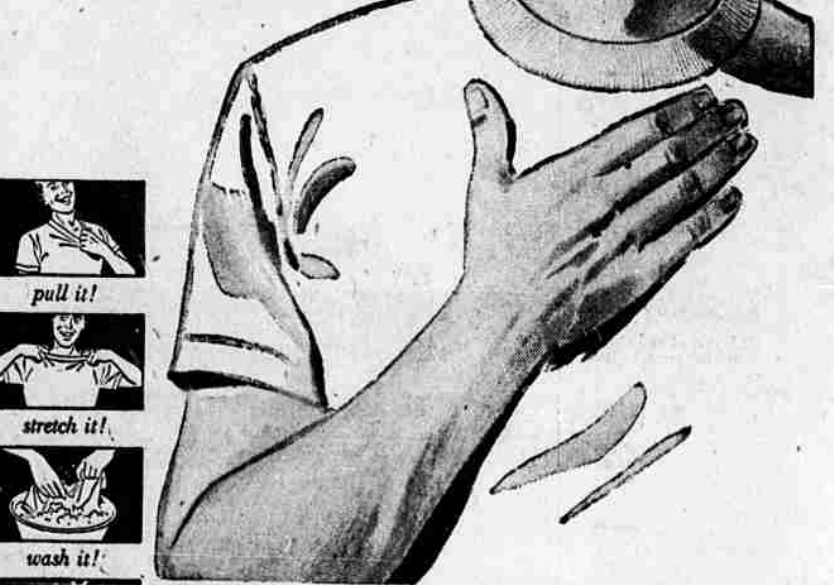
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
