NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was generally lower Wednesday with a few issues under special pressure.

Trading was moderate. For the first four hours, volume totaled 720,000 shares and estimated sales for the day were one million. Tuesday, 1,080,000 shares traded in a rising market.

Lower groups included the rails, oils, televisions, electrical equipments and aircrafts. Utilities and farm machineries were a little higher.

Mau Mau Desire: To Be Treated Human

PORTLAND (AP) — The Mau Mau extremists of Kenya, Africa, are only trying — quickly — to get back their land and to be treated as humans, the Northwest Institute of International Relations was told here Tuesday night.

The speaker was Dr. Ernest B. Kalibura, a former U. N. specialist from Africa. He said Kenya colony covers 200,000 square miles of which 30,000 white own 150,000. He said that a tribe of 5,000 black people once was evicted from a 70,000-acre area to make way for 13 English immigrant families.

Elsewhere in Africa too, he said, there has been oppression and exploitation. And now the natives are rising against their oppressors — but while they are turning against the whites, they don't know what course they will take.

Rose Festival Made Profit Despite Rain

PORTLAND (AP) — The Rose Festival, despite the rain, made a profit this year.

L. W. Mallett, executive manager, said the books weren't closed but the margin would be "a couple of thousand dollars, anyway."

Last year the festival lost \$11,407 when rain cut crowds in the stadium. This year the rains let up for the night shows.

Solon Asks FPC Review of Hells

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Horan (R-Wash.) said Wednesday he has asked the Federal Power Commission to make "an exhaustive and expert examination and review of the relative merits of Hells Canyon Dam."

He made public a letter written to the commission earlier this week in which he urged that it "authorize any expenditure of time and effort necessary to reveal the hard core of material fact" in the plans of the Idaho Power Co. for three Snake River dams and earlier government proposals to build a higher Hells Canyon Dam.

"Any decision made in the public interest," the congressman declared, "must envisage not only immediate benefits but also a recognition of responsibility to the generations to come in our rapidly expanding economy."

He asked that the commission's study be "completely free of partisan bias and uninfluenced by divergent economic theories of development."

GROWING DEER HERD

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — The Arizona Game and Fish Commission believes the deer herd in the Kaibab National Forest at the Grand Canyon is the fastest growing herd in the country. In 1950 the kill by licensed hunters was 2,888. In 1951 it was 2,915 and last year it was 4,312, but even so the deer have multiplied faster than the rising kill, a joint report of the commission and the U. S. Forest Service shows.

CHICAGO (AP) — Hog suppliers overreached trade requirements Wednesday the same 1,500 head they fell short Tuesday and prices of hogs suffered most, declining 25 to 75 cents, while barrows and gilts were steady to 25 cents less. Cattle were steady to 25 cents lower and sheep steady to 50 cents higher.

Choice butcher weight hogs sold from \$24.00 to \$26.40 with a short load maintaining the previous session's peak of \$26.50. Sows were mostly \$18.50 to \$22.75.

Choice and prime steers and yearlings were worth \$20.50 to \$23.00 and just-prime kinds brought \$20.25 to \$24.00. Choice and prime heifers sold from \$20.00 to \$22.50 while cows were \$14.50 and below.

Good to prime native spring lambs had a wide range from \$23.00 to \$27.00 but a few choice and prime old-crop shorns took one price, \$22.00.

Estimated salable receipts totaled 8,500 hogs, 12,000 cattle, 300 calves and 1,000 sheep.

Grains

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat futures prices slumped on the board of trade Wednesday under the pressure of the expanding harvest.

Prices were down more than 3 cents a bushel at times.

July corn was firm most of the time on buying influenced by light receipts of 53 cars. Distant contracts were easy most of the session, however. Oats also were easy.

July soybeans dipped more than a cent a bushel at times.

Wheat closed 2 1/4 to 3 1/4 cents lower, July \$1.95 1/2-1/4, corn was 1/2 higher to 1/2 lower, July \$1.54 1/2-1/4, oats were unchanged to 1/4 down, July 74 1/2, rye was 3/4 to 1 1/2 lower, July \$1.40-1.39 1/4, soybeans were 1 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, July \$2.83 1/2-1/4, and lard was unchanged to 8 cents a hundred pounds lower, July \$8.80.

Cripple's Death Admitted By Hot-Dog, Comic Book Boy

ATLANTA (AP) — Eighteen-year-old David Gene Price admitted, police said, that he killed a crippled next door neighbor whose mutilated and nude body was found in a suburban wooded section Monday.

The youth then asked police to telephone his mother to bring him "some real scary murder comics and some hot dogs."

Detective Supt. Glynn Cowan said the youth told him yesterday that he choked Betty Bagby, 22, after having intercourse with her Saturday night, then dropped a stone upon her head. They had quarreled. Price told police, over taking a bus home instead of a taxi. He said he didn't have money enough for a cab.

The young woman's left breast was almost severed, Cowan said. Price told police he remembered nothing about the mutilation but added: "I could have done it."

He was held on a charge of suspicion of murder.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Finance Committee Wednesday gave the Republicans control of the Tariff Commission, and then approved legislation for a one-trade agreements law.

Electric Energy Use To New High

NEW YORK (AP) — Electric energy produced by the nation's utility industry soared to an all-time high of 8,329,297,000 kilowatt-hours last week, Edison Electric Institute reported.

This compared with 8,244,853,000 kilowatt-hours in the previous week and represented an increase of 14.8 per cent over the year-ago week's output of 7,254,058,000 kilowatt-hours.

yesterday by disclosing he is getting an annual \$5,000 pension from Anaconda Copper Company and remarking that the federal coal mine safety law should never have been passed. He said safety enforcement powers should be exercised by the states.

Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) predicted in advance of today's session: "I don't see how at this point Lyon could qualify for the job." If the one-time Salt Lake City mining engineer gives no further "explanation," Jackson said, "he has placed himself in an impossible position."

Lyon, 65, worked for Anaconda Copper or its subsidiaries from 1916 to 1950. He is now acting deputy administrator of the Defense Metals Procurement Administration.

A large, quiet-spoken man, Lyon yesterday told the committee: 1. Several government officials he knows have the same pension arrangement with their companies that he has with Anaconda.

Lyon said his pension could be cut off at the whim of the company. And he added: "You can't take these government jobs without some outside income." The Director of the Bureau of Mines gets \$14,000 a year. Private pensions

to government officials are not illegal.

2. He doesn't think any mining company would "willfully do anything that would cause an accident because it costs them so much money" in workmen's compensation, insurance and the like.

3. That 99 per cent of all mining disasters and accidents are the result of carelessness on the part of "individual miners."

Jackson and Sen. Clements (D-Ky.) at once demanded statistics to support that statement.

4. That mine safety is a "state responsibility" and that passage of the law giving the federal government power to close down mines "is just that much more federal control."

Lyon contended the federal government should advise state safety regulators and should work closely with mine operators, but should not have any "police powers."

But if confirmed as head of the bureau, he said, he would "not hesitate for a minute" to close down a mine deemed unsafe.

Clements, after that comment, said: "I seriously doubt you know much about this business."

And Jackson said: "You're the first man to come before this committee and admit you're not in sympathy with the philosophy of the laws you'll have to administer."

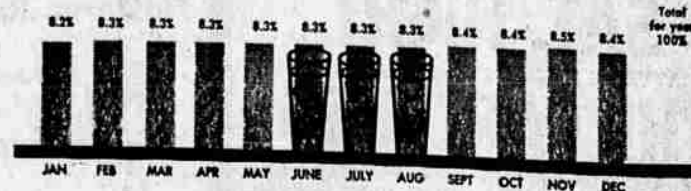

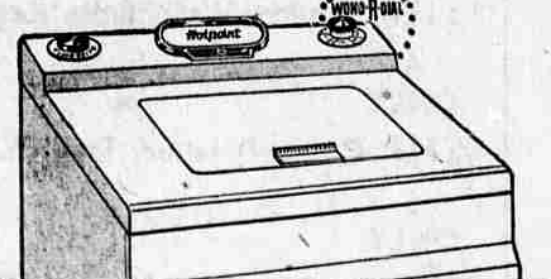
