With her killed husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, standing at attention nearby, the young Queen proudly took the royal salute from the 300-strong first battalion of Argyll and Sutherland highlanders marching to the skirt of bagpipes.

Engineer Chief To Inspect Sites

PORTLAND (AP) — The chief of the Corps of Engineers will inspect Pacific Northwest projects next week, including visits to McNary, Chief Joseph and The Dalles Dams and to Ft. Lewis. Maj. Gen. Samuel D. Sturgis Jr. will arrive here Sunday. He will look over harbor projects at Astoria and Tillamook, then visit The Dalles Dam Monday. He will be at Ft. Lewis Tuesday, at Chief Joseph Wednesday, and at McNary Thursday. Then he will take a plane to Boise, flying over the proposed Mountain Sheep and Hells Canyon Dam sites on the way.

French Reinforce Cambodia Troops

SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — France sent troop reinforcements to the Indochinese kingdom of Cambodia Friday in the wake of King Norodom Sihanouk's threat to war against the French independence.

A French command spokesman termed the troop movement "precautionary" and said the men would "protect the lives and property" of French residents in Cambodia, one of the three French-associated states of Indochina.

Norodom took the French by surprise June 13 when he dashed across the border into Thailand and said he wouldn't come home until France gave his state complete independence. The French said they had given the king all he had asked for so far, but couldn't relax their control of Cambodia's defense because of the threat from the Communist-led Vietnam.

Deputy Prison Warden Named

SALEM (AP) — Warden Clarence T. Gladden drew upon the federal prison system again Thursday in naming another deputy warden at the penitentiary.

He appointed Arthur Hoffman, who has been at Leavenworth, Kan., federal prison for 25 years. The other deputy warden is L. R. Barnes, who, like Gladden, also comes from the federal prison system.

Hoffman succeeds Lawrence O'Brien, who resigned last week.

Seattle Man McKay Aide

WASHINGTON (AP) — Raymond A. Davis of Seattle is back in the Interior Department as a \$10,000-a-year assistant to Secretary McKay. Department officials announced Thursday Davis has returned to McKay's staff after helping the Treasury Department reorganize its War Bond Savings Division.

Davis, who came here in January to help McKay organize his new staff, was assigned to the Treasury Department April 20. Interior officials said Davis has completed his job at Treasury and is back on McKay's staff working in connection with staff and department reorganizations.

Seven Falls Youths Now Journeymen

SALEM — The State Labor Department gave its Certificate of Journeyman status to seven Klamath Falls youths during 1953. They were among 410 Oregon apprentices completing on-the-job training during the past 12 months.

Those receiving certificates were Wilbur Snapp, R. C. Shaffer, inside electricians; R. W. Pex, Roy Plank, D. L. Jones, carpenters; T. E. Lynch, meat cutter, and R. W. Schroeder, refrigerating serviceman.

There are 1,707 apprentices receiving industrial training under the Oregon Apprenticeship Council of which Klamath Falls has 62 registered. Klamath Falls is fourth in the cities outside of Portland having the highest number of apprentices indentured.

No Cause Set For Lakeview Girl Death

CORVALLIS (AP) — An autopsy Thursday failed to disclose the cause of the death of Madeline Frances Manning, 13 Lakeview, who collapsed and died at the 4-H Club summer school here Wednesday.

Pathological specimens were sent to the state medical school at Portland in a further attempt to learn the cause of death. The girl collapsed while walking across the Oregon State College campus.

Funeral services will be held in Lakeview Saturday.

Bend District Sales \$24,863

The Bend District of the Bureau of Land Management sold 1,730,000 bd. ft. of timber in three tracts for a total of \$24,863.49 at the regular monthly sale conducted by Kenneth A. Burkholder, District Forester on June 23.

Sealed bids were received on two tracts and one tract sold by oral auction bidding. All units sold above the appraised price.

In sealed bidding George Post purchased 67 thousand board feet on the Izee road in Grant County for \$2,280.00, and Charles Christy Jr. was high on 32 thousand board feet near Tumalo Reservoir in Deschutes County at \$912.00.

The successful bidder in the oral auction was Leonard Lundgren of Bend who purchased 16,220,000 board feet for \$21,671.49. The timber was ponderosa pine in the Lost Forest in northern Lake County.

All tracts offered were sold.

State Dries Plan Petition

Initiative petitions calling for statewide prohibition will be circulated in Klamath County beginning June 28, according to the Oregon Anti-Liquor League.

Plans are being laid for a prohibition petition drive to begin June 28, and organization of a Klamath chapter of the Oregon Anti-Liquor League, State League Pres. George Smith Brown announced today.

The league's immediate goal is to have 42 circulators secure 1047 valid signatures as Klamath County's quota of the required 37,399 names to put a statewide prohibition measure on the November, 1954, ballot. Petitions are now off the press and circulation will begin throughout the state on Sunday.

Formation of a Klamath Chapter of the OALL is also being requested in letters to county prohibition leaders. The chapter would be permanent and locally controlled," according to Brown.

"Our program is to mobilize all dries and to educate the neutrals," Brown stated. "We will use the scientific approach of a good advertising agency."

"The Klamath chapter would have a budget quota of \$1,400, to be raised by the advertising campaign as well as aid in local publicity, education and promotion."

If successful in obtaining the petition quota by July 1, 1954, the state would witness the first prohibition election since repeal. The proposed measure would ban all alcoholic beverages of over 1/2 of 1 percent alcohol by volume except for sacramental, medicinal or scientific purposes.
