WALL STREET
NEW YORK (U) — Utility shares put on the best performance in an otherwise mixed stock market Friday.

Brokers linked improvement in the utilities to the easing of the tight money situation by the Federal Reserve Board. Utility issues had been hard hit by selling as money rates rose because investors saw a chance to get better yields elsewhere.

The market started out lower and then turned mixed. In the first four hours, only 530,000 shares changed hands, and for the full session, estimated sales were 800,000.

Outstanding Art Instructors Due

The fifth annual Summer Art Workshop, designed under sponsorship of the Klamath Art Association to further interests in arts and crafts in the community, will bring some outstanding instructors this summer to Klamath Falls.

Classes on the OTI campus get under way July 6 and will continue through July 31.

The project is especially designed to interest the person with no art training yet the experienced artists will gain new inspiration from the work offered.

Jack Wilkinson, well-known Northwest painter, who has studied in France, Italy, Switzerland, Belgium and Holland and has had one-man shows in the California School of Fine Arts, the San Francisco Museum of Art and the Portland Art Museum will teach painting classes. These will be accredited through the University of Oregon. Fees for two hours credit will be \$25 and \$50 for four hours. Four hour terms may be earned during the session.

Craft classes to be taught at the YMCA will be non-accredited. Time will be July 6-17, Mondays through Friday, 9 a.m. to noon and 7 to 10 p.m.

Silk screen printing will be taught by B. B. Blomquist, instructor, KUHS. No previous experience is necessary for enrollment in this group.

Jewelry, metal work and ceramics will also be taught and students will learn the use of copper, bronze and other metals. This class will be taught by Vera Arnold, artist and lecturer.

Silk screening will be taught for \$1.25 per lesson or \$19 for the course of 10 lessons. The same charge will be made for other craft enrollment.

Railroads Ask Mail Fee Hike

WASHINGTON (U) — The railroad industry Friday asked an increase of at least 45 per cent in payments for hauling the U. S. mail.

A petition for the rise was filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission only 24 hours after Postmaster General Summerfield appealed to Congress for a general postage-rate advance.

The Postoffice Department is running millions of dollars in the red each year and Summerfield asked the postage rate hike — including a boost from 3 cents to 4 cents for letter mail — to close part of the gap between revenue and spending.

No Hike For Fir Employees

Fir Milling and Planing Company employees in Ashland have withdrawn their authority with the IWA Northwest Regional Bargaining Committee and signed a contract for the current year which calls for no wage increases.

The plant, which employs some 70 union members, announced the signing on Thursday. The contract will run until April 1, 1954. Fringe benefits including a revised holiday schedule providing six paid holidays, lowering of vacation eligibility and a night shift differential boost from four to six cents were granted.

This, according to officials, was merely a catching-up operation as the contract openings were not filed in a timely matter in 1952 negotiations and had to be carried over until the current talks.

Looter Drops Wallet, Caught

DENVER (U) — Jesse Reynolds stole a car here Thursday police said, then drove to nearby Golden and looted a tavern cash register of \$35.

Officers said he was back in his Denver home counting the haul when detectives walked in. He had dropped his wallet—with identification—in the tavern.

He was held for authorities at Golden, just across the county line.

Larger County Home

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Trial Slows As Witnesses Testify

The Charles Gaymon Jr. second degree murder trial was proceeding at a snail's pace Thursday in Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg's Court as the prosecution interrogated a group of witnesses concerning the scene of the alleged crime.

Testimony was punctuated by clashes between opposing counsel over admissibility of testimony. With the validity of the indictment against Gaymon already in question, it is probable the case will not be concluded until ruled upon by the Oregon Supreme Court.

County Jail records show it is the second time Gaymon has been tried by jury. On Feb. 18, 1949 he was found not guilty of assault by a jury in Susanville, Calif.

The defendant is now charged with the slaying with a knife of Willie Watson, garage worker, April 3.

Prosecution witnesses started to testify Wednesday after Judge Vandenberg denied a motion to dismiss the action by Defense Attorneys Ben Goddard and George Proctor. The judge added that, if Gaymon is convicted, he will request the County Court to finance an appeal to the Supreme Court.

City Detective R.N. (Bud) Atkins was called to the witness stand by District Attorney Frank Alderson to identify a series of photographs taken at the scene of the crime.

Detective Atkins was preceded by Cledus Caldwell, a friend of the knife victim. He told the jury he saw Watson running from his home at 521 Commercial St. with Gaymon in pursuit. He also testified he heard Willie Watson yell "don't kill me!"

City Policeman Victor Murdock described the scene of the alleged slaying and also said he saw Watson after he collapsed in an alley near his home.

County Engineer William R. Canton appeared as a prosecution witness. He told the jury he made a scale drawing of the floor plan of the Watson residence. Prosecutor Alderson produced the drawing and had Canton identify it.

Frank Weaver, another city policeman, told the jury that he participated in the arrest of Gaymon.

Gaymon has sat silently beside his attorneys since the trial opened. He smiled a few times when his attorneys became involved in arguments with the prosecution. Defense counsel has refused to say whether Gaymon will take the stand in his own defense.

He is Lyle M. Parran, 433 N. 10th St., who was arrested by Juvenile Officer Francis Mathews on complaint of the child's mother.

According to Mathews, the suspect took the girl to his room. He is charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

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Forest Fighters Attend Training

ALTURAS — Lookouts, firemen, tanker operators and others in the forest protective organization including district rangers and their assistants, are attending the annual firefighters training session this week for Modoc National Forest personnel at Hackamore Camp, West of Canby.

Harold Stratton, fire control officer of the forest said today that about 70 men are taking part in the study of forest protection. Six districts are represented.

Training is being given in the use of firefighting tools, techniques of firefighting and firecrew organization. This training is designed to weld all able-bodied men on the forest into a first class firefighting unit.
