Hit-stingy Fran Miller and hit-happy Klamath Merchants' bats combined yesterday to give Hi Hatfield's charges a 9-1 win over Lakeview in an Oregon-California Border League game at Recreation Park.

The defeat knocked the Gems out of a league tie with Burns; the Elks took sole ownership of the league lead with a 4-3 win over Alturas.

Lakeview lost its mound ace, Bobby Long, to LaGrande and Manager Hugh Mercer had to leave Max Martin, a Big high school boy this year, in for the nine innings. It was legalized murder.

Two hits, Miller was touched for two hits and one run in the first inning as the Gems took an early lead. But from then on, Miller was the master of the situation. He gave up just one more hit the rest of the way—a double to Mercer in the seventh—for a neat 3-hit performance.

After he caused Mercer to fly out to retire the Gems in the first inning, Miller put down 15 Lakeview batters in a row until Wes Dollard walked in the sixth frame, the only free pass off Miller all day. He struck out eight.

Martin got out alive in the first inning but in the second chapter, with a blooper over third base and Dick Lundsten beat out a bunt to load the bases. Willie Dunster slammed a single to left. Hatfield scored with the tying run and Miller and Lundsten followed when Hatfield singled, let the ball squirt through his legs.

HOME RUN
That gave the Merchants a 3-1 lead and they made it 7-1 in the third when George (Butcher Boy) Hanson slammed a three-run homer over the left field fence after Gary Dawes had singled and scored on Hatfield's double. Miller followed with a walk to put two on base for Hanson's four-bag clout, belted on the 3-2 pitch.

Hank Decker's single and Dunster's triple added runs in the sixth and seventh.

PORTLAND (AP)—Bruce Cudd, 19-year-old Portland golfer, ace, Saturday pocketed his second straight men's title in the Oregon Golf Association Tournament while Mrs. Francis Rowell, also from the Rose City, won the women's title.

Cudd downed Bob McReynolds 5 and 3 and Mrs. Rowell beat Mrs. Harold Weiss, Portland, 1-up. For Cudd and McReynolds, another Portlander, it was the second straight year they had faced each other for the title. Cudd slipped through last year with a 4 and 3 victory.

Mrs. Rowell won her title on the 35th hole when she went ahead of her rival. Both boyeyed the 36th and the championship went to Mrs. Rowell.

WIL Winds Up First Half; Salem on Top

The Class A Western International Baseball League winds up the first half of its split season this week with the Salem Senators and the Lewiston Braves locked in a tight battle for the championship.

The late-starting Senators, who came from nowhere to snatch the lead with a winning streak they stretched to 11 straight before the season snapped Sunday, face the week with a half-game bulge over the Braves and a date with the Vancouver Capilanos.

The Braves, who relinquished the lead only last Thursday, will try to get it back in a three-game series at Spokane.

The first half finale will find Wenatchee at Tri-City, Yakima at Victoria, and Calgary at Edmonton.

SETBACK
A 16-6 setback at the hands of the Tri-City Braves ended Salem's winning streak at 11 Sunday. But the Oregonians came back to take the nightcap of the doubleheader at Salem 5-4. That kept them in front of the Braves who also split a twin bill, bowing 5-3 in the first game at Lewiston but taking the afternoon, 3-4.

Yakima downed Wenatchee 4-3 and 1-0 in a doubleheader at Yakima. Other clubs took the day off. Jim Deyo's base-running put the Senators back in the win column after they had lost the opening game to Tri-City. Deyo raced home from second while the Braves were trying vainly for a double play that would have retired the side in the seventh inning. Tri-City tied the score in the top half of the seventh with three unearned runs. In the opening game, the Braves collected 20 hits from four Salem hurlers.

HOME RUN
At Lewiston, two three-run innings led the second game for the Braves. They opened the scoring

against five losses, Charlie Beamon and Jack Klein teamed in a four-hitter for the Bears. The game's only run came in the first inning. Elmer Clough racing home after Noren's long fly to the outfield.

In Saturday games, the Chiefs trounced the Bears 11-4; Lewiston shaded Spokane 4-3; Salem edged Tri-City 7-6 in 11 innings; Victoria won a doubleheader at Calgary 9-6 and 11-8 and Edmonton clubbed Vancouver at Edmonton 7-2 and 2-1.

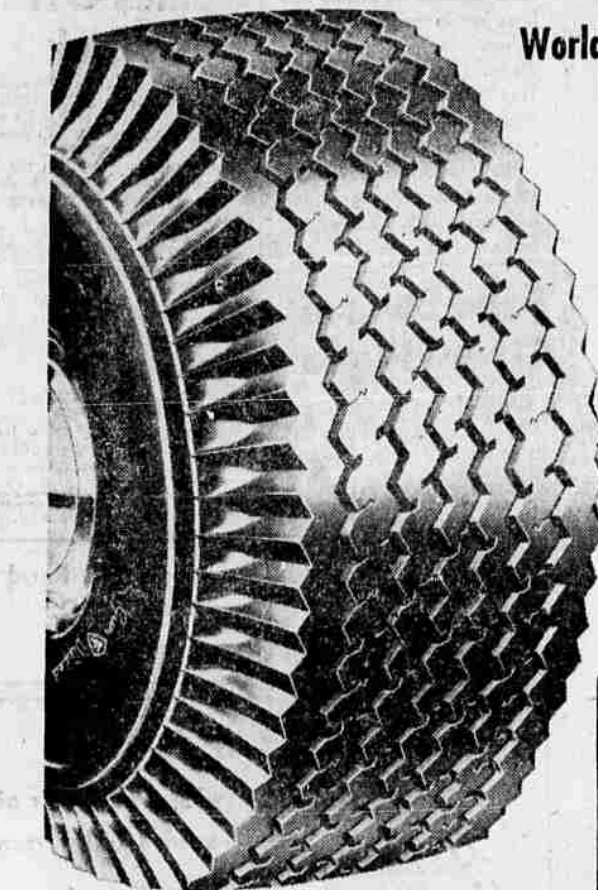
