Jap Flood Leaves 2,500 Dead As Dark Clouds Pose Threat

TOKYO (AP) — A great flood that left more than 2,500 persons dead, missing or hurt and a million homeless receded today on the Southern Japan Island of Kyushu but dark rain clouds posed an ominous new threat.

Seven days of torrential rains turned much of the northern part of Kyushu—an area about the size of New Jersey—into a vast lake. The hapless Japanese residents fled to any high ground they could find.

By late afternoon today, the known death toll stood at 408. It was expected to rise when those missing—now numbered at 1,178—are accounted for.

State Weekend Toll Nine

At least nine persons died in Oregon in week-end accidents.

Four were killed when an automobile left the Coast Highway about seven miles north of Florence. Supton Lee Standley, 77, the victims were identified as the driver, Ven Tsui Tol, 40, San Francisco; his wife, Kimiko, about 30; Toyosuke Masamoto, 72 Puyallup Wash. and his wife, Kiyomo, 63.

At Portland Alois L. Swanke, 68, died from injuries suffered Friday night when hit by a pick-up truck at an intersection. He was the city's 24th traffic fatality of the year.

A large gravel truck hit the side of a bridge 21 miles south of Lebanon, killing the driver, Ben Richard Duffey, 28, Eugene.

Eugene Aubrey Rees, 18, Rt. 4 Hood River, squirrel hunting with a companion above the Columbia Gorge plunged 90 feet to his death Sunday. Glenn Randall, 18, also of Hood River, said they stopped at Hog Canyon Falls about 20 miles east of Hood River to look down on Rowena Lake and the Columbia River. He said Rees, trying to get a better view, slipped and hurtled from his sight. The body was found in the lake.

The victim was the son of Aubrey Rees.

A nine-year-old Portland girl died Sunday in a fall from Haystack Rock at Cannon Beach. She was Julie Kersten, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Kersten. The father and others on the beach pulled her from the surf, but she failed to respond to pulmonologist treatment.

Robert Gurney, 4, son of Mr. and Mrs. Myron Gurney, was killed by a tractor Saturday on a farm near McKinley, in the Coquille area.

Morse Scorns Resolutions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Resolutions criticizing the administration's power policies are not enough, Sen. Morse of Oregon said in a speech Saturday.

Morse, one of the administration's most vocal critics, said in his weekly committee report to the Senate that he had received a resolution from the Oregon State Grange supporting Morse's stand in favor of public power.

"But I say to them a resolution is not enough. Go to work in the state and translate your opposition to political action in 1954 and 1956. Vote against the candidates who have not been throwing in with us. That means the Republicans," said Morse.

Farmers throughout the nation have an interest in the power dispute in the Northwest because phosphate beds cannot be developed without cheap power, Morse said.

The farmers need cheap fertilizers and "Senators from the farm states should be fighting shoulder to shoulder with me," Morse added.

Klamath Boy Male Lead In Play

PORTLAND (AP) — "The play's the thing" again this summer at Fir Acres Theater, Lewis and Clark College, where six student players and several "extras" under the direction of Constance Roth Polts are working round the clock to get four plays ready for 13 performances during July and early August.

Summer theater will pull the curtain July 3 on a three-night run of its premiere production, "Elizabeth the Queen" by Maxwell Anderson. Ronald Coleman of Klamath Falls will play the part of Sir Walter Raleigh, chivalrous favorite of the Queen.

Coleman was one of 10 winners of scholarships to Fir Acres Theater. A graduate of Klamath Union High School this year, he has been active for three years in the Klamath Falls Little Theater. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess H. Coleman, 607 Upham.

Catholic Schools May Lose Texts

PORTLAND (AP) — Most Catholic schools in Oregon apparently will not be eligible next fall for the free textbooks they have been getting under Oregon law.

Catholic school heads explained that most parish schools will have to ignore the state standards on student-teacher ratio. They said a big increase in students is coming up.

The state standards aim at not more than 25-30 students per teacher. The archdiocese ratio will be not more than 45-60 pupils per teacher.

Failure to meet the state standard means that parents will have to provide the textbooks for students in parochial schools.
