William Nendel Reported Dead

Word has been received here of the death of William Nendel, June 18, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Alma Kirsch, Mehama, Ore.

He had for several months been at the home of a son, Roy Nendel, Klamath Falls, where he suffered a stroke May 11. Despite his almost 80 years he had regained his strength and was moved to the home of Mrs. Kirsch June 8. Death came after another stroke on the 18th.

All of his children had visited him here after his first illness. Beside Roy Nendel who lives at 216 E. Main and Mrs. Kirsch of Mehama, there are C. E. Nendel, Empire; Veda Hondrick, Los Angeles and Esther Baker, Roseburg. All of these including their families attended funeral services at Woodburn, June 22, with Glen Vernon, pastor of First Christian Church, Stayton, conducting the service.

Mrs. Nendel had preceded him in death in 1941. Others from Klamath Falls attending the services were grandchildren and great-grandchildren, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Eden and family, Mr. and Mrs. Frances Schuck and family, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Nendel. From other points were Mr. and Mrs. Robert Nendel, Prineville; Mr. Von Baker, Roseburg; Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Kirsch, Mehama and Mr. and Mrs. Bud Barkmeyer, Lyons.

Nendel was one of the pioneers of Oregon, coming west to Gilliam County by covered wagon from Nebraska in 1855 with Mrs. Nendel and their two oldest children. A very interesting diary of the trip was kept by Mrs. Nendel. Recently an account of early day experiences in the Indian uprisings in Nebraska appeared in the Journal of Gordon, Neb., including a picture of Fort Nendel built at that time by several families for protection against the Sioux Indians.

In all, five children survive, 19 grandchildren and 23 great-grandchildren.

Head Douk Weds Amid Ten-House Smoke Screen

KRESTOVA, B. C. (U)—New fire raids by radical Sons of Freedom Doukhobors sent 10 homes up in smoke over the weekend in an apparent attempt to steal attention from the marriage of John J. Verigin, leader of Canada's Orthodox Douks.

Put to the torch Saturday night after young Verigin was married to Laura Relkoff were four homes at Gilpin, three here and three at Winlaw. All three communities lie within the troubled Kootenay area of British Columbia.

Verigin, great grandson of Peter (The Lordly) Verigin, former spiritual leader of Canada's Doukhobors, is secretary of the Orthodox communities.

The fire raiders made their strike Saturday night just two weeks after a similar torch raid following the imprisonment of a Sons of Freedom terrorist who had been convicted of arson.

Coon Supports Wheat Changes

WASHINGTON (U)—Sam Coon supported changes in wheat marketing laws during debate in Congress last Thursday.

The Eastern Oregon Congressman stated that it is too late this year to do anything but try to improve most existing agricultural laws, but said in the long run he thinks the country needs a new and better farm program.

The Congressman spoke during debate on House Bill 5451, which passed the House and now goes to the Senate. This bill makes national and state wheat allotments more favorable than in the past, exempts many small wheat operators from compulsory wheat allotment programs, insures workable penalties for violations of quotas, permits the date of a referendum to be postponed after July 23, if necessary, and limits to approximately 15 per cent the allowable wheat production cut this year.

Sam Coon said a new farm program should encourage a maximum of self-help for farmers, give a maximum of freedom to the market, and work for the welfare not only of farmers, but of all the people.

He said also that he favors the principle of a two-price or certificate plan for wheat in any future program.

By-the-Drink Has Cut Washington's Intake, Accidents

GEARHART, Ore. (U)—Liquor consumption has declined and traffic accidents due to liquor have decreased in Washington State since liquor by the drink became legal in 1948. Robert L. Smith, a member of the Washington Liquor Control Board, said Saturday.

Smith told the western regional meeting of the National Alcoholic Beverage Control Association that law enforcement problems have not increased.

Smith said that a new problem was developing—moonshining. He blamed this on high taxes on liquor.

Representatives of state liquor control bodies attended from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah and Iowa.

He also outlined the summer camp program and spoke of the fine program sponsored at the salvation Army Summer camp near Santa Cruz for a group of blind people.

Business included the acceptance of the resignation of Barnum as treasurer and the appointment of President John Vai, of the Weed First National Bank to that office, he having been contacted prior to the meeting regarding acceptance of the position.

The meeting closed with the showing by Major Kelso of a motion picture of the delictics on Skid Row in Chicago and the work being done there by the Salvation Army to rehabilitate these down-and-outers.

Homer Perry Surrenders

Homer Perry, 17, sought since the April 21 robbery of the Snack Shack at Gilchrist, early yesterday morning surrendered to State Police here. The youth phoned State Police headquarters from a S. 6th service station at 5:15 a.m. yesterday and said he wanted to give himself up.

There was a grand larceny warrant for Perry in connection with the Gilchrist theft. He was lodged in City Jail.

Perry, an employe at the Snack Shack, disappeared from Gilchrist on the morning of April 21. It was discovered a strong box had been forced and approximately \$250 was missing.

When Perry surrendered to a state police officer yesterday morning he told of other crimes he had committed. The officer reported Perry told him he had, since leaving here, robbed a Paso Robles service station where he was working. He said also that he had obtained a soldier's orders and had tried unsuccessfully to impersonate the soldier and enter the service.

Prohibitioners To Try Again

PORTLAND (U)—Another effort will be made to restore prohibition in Oregon.

The Oregon Anti-Liquor League said Sunday it will circulate petitions to submit a constitutional amendment to the voters in November, 1954. The amendment would ban the sale, manufacture or importation of alcoholic beverages in the state.

To get on the ballot the proposal would need signatures of 27,329 registered voters. Last year the proposal did not have enough signatures for the ballot.
