Cokes, Medford Split; D'Olivo Has 5-Hitter

The knot is still tied in the state's American Legion Junior Baseball's League 4 as Klamath Falls and Medford split a doubleheader Saturday at Recreation Park.

Medford's Ken Piland and Klamath's David D'Olivo both turned in fine five-hitters to register the victories.

Medford won the first game, 10-2; the Cokes captured the second game in a 21-4 marathon as four Medford pitchers trounced to the mound in an attempt to stop the tide.

The split gives each team a 1-2 record in the league.

Medford added up seven runs in the fifth frame of the opener to make a rout of a close pitching contest between Modesto Jimenez and Piland.

But in that chapter with the score tied 2-2 after Jimenez lead off with a single in the fourth, slot second and romped home on Orin Perkins' single, Medford batters found the range and Jimenez lost the range.

WILD INNING

When the wild inning was over the visitors had seven runs on just three hits, but Jimenez walked four before Dexter was whisked in from shortstop. Three Klamath errors didn't help the cause.

At that Jimenez gave up just four hits, but he couldn't find the plate in the nightmarish fifth. Dexter gave up one hit in the fifth and two more in the seventh as Medford added a late insurance run.

Medford took a 2-0 lead in the first inning when Willie Garner landed on base via an error, went to second on the same bobble, to third on another miff and scored on a balk. Frank Rector walked, thieved second, went to third on the balk and scored on a passed ball.

Don Taucher singled in the lead-off spot in the first, waltzed all the way home on an error as the Cokes got back in the ball game and led it in the fourth on Perkins' blow.

BUNCHES

The second game was just as nightmarish for Medford as the Cokes got their runs like bananas—in bunches. Six came in the first inning and saw Eldon Francis leave the mound in favor of Don McLoughlin.

Before it was over the Cokes bombed McLoughlin out of there, then Terry Sherwood who left shortstop for the hill, and Piland, the first-game winner, finished the game.

Klamath had two seven-run innings of their own in the second game, in the fifth and sixth.

The extra run came in the second inning when Don Dexter parked one of McLoughlin's pitches over the left-field fence. The circuit clout came in the lead-off spot with no mates aboard.

Dexter added a double and a single for a three-for-four performance. After Jimenez followed Dexter's slam with a single, McLoughlin did well until the hectic fifth when he went to the showers finally on a three-run triple by Perkins. Sherwood caused Gary Hackley to fly to center field for the third out.

WHIFFS FIVE

McLoughlin looked like he would stick around till the end after Dexter's circuit clout and Jimenez's single. He whiffed the next five men to face him, got through the fourth in fine style but in Klamath's big fifth inning he got wild, served up singles to D'Olivo and Dexter, walked three and threw the triple ball to Perkins.

Sherwood couldn't find the strike zone either. In the sixth he gave four free passes, three of them directly responsible for runs, got hit by Bob Kelly twice, Hackley and D'Olivo, all singles, as Klamath added another seven runs.

The second was D'Olivo's only bad frame. A double by Sherwood, consecutive singles by Jim McAbee and Richard Kenner, a walk and an error gave Medford two of its runs.

But the second was unearned as were the other two Medford runs in the third and the sixth.

Taucher in the second game showed why he bats in the lead-off spot. He singled the first time up, teased out walks four times straight and got on via an error to land on base six straight times. D'Olivo didn't hurt his cause either. He singled three times in four official times at bat.

Grants Pass won both games from Central Point by 4-2 and 6-4 counts. The double win put Grants Pass in sole ownership of second place and shoved Central Point into the cellar.

Betty Rawls Wins Open Tee Title

NEW YORK (AP)—By winning the first Women's Open Championship of the United States Golf Association, Betty Rawls has just about proved that it is possible for a girl to have everything.



Three years ago she was graduated from the University of Texas with a Phi Beta Kappa key and a strong desire to become a top-flight golfer. Now she has the biggest title a woman golfer can win and a comfortable bankroll and good looks, too.

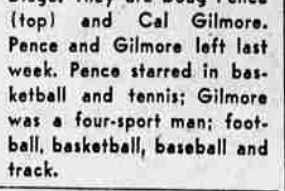
In addition, the feminine golfing brigade has a firmly established championship tournament—something that wasn't quite certain until the past few days.

When Miss Rawls beat Jackie Pung of Hawaii and Glasgow, Ky., 71-77 in yesterday's 18-hole title playoff after they had tied at 302 in a thrilling three-way finish Saturday, the continuation of the Women's Open as a UGA tournament was assured. It was the climax of a highly successful experiment.

Despite a rather small entry list, the tournament drew good crowds—more than 2,000 for the playoff—and the players were delighted with the course and the conduct of the event. They'd like to play often on real championship courses.

Miss Rawls, who said she was hitting her wood shots better than ever before during the tournament, had rounds of 75-78-75 for the regulation 72 holes and then tied the brand new course record with her 34-37-71 in the playoff.

Joey May Face Kid In Fight

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A meeting this summer between former light heavyweight champion Joe Maxim and Harry Matthews of Seattle may be in the works, a fight manager said Saturday.

Charley Johnston, manager of light-heavy champ Archie Moore, said Maxim and Matthews may clash on a doubleheader fight card along with Moore and Utah's Rex Layne.

Johnston said the card is "past the talking stage" and might be held in Utah before the end of the summer.

Discussions started last week after Moore successfully defended his title in a 15-round match at Ogden with Maxim. Johnston said, adding the public might be invited to decide the final makeup of the card.

While Johnston was optimistic the four would be signed for two ten-round fights, the report brought this comment from Doc Kerns, Maxim's manager:

"We have been after Jack Hurley (Matthews' manager) for a fight for a long time. I don't believe he will listen to fighting any one of the three. However, we have an ace in the hole in Edward Charles, who is very popular in Utah."

Again atop the Pacific Coast League standings, the Seattle Rainiers play host this week to the team that knocked them off a week ago—the Los Angeles Angels.

A quirk of the schedule puts the two at Seattle just a week after they met at Los Angeles when the Angels tripped the Rainiers out of first place by winning five of seven.

Hollywood had only a brief stay in the top spot. The Stars lost the past week's series to the San Diego Padres four games to three while Seattle was taking five of seven from Oakland. That gave the Rainiers a game and one-half bulge on Hollywood and Los Angeles faded five games off the pace by losing a series to Portland four games to three.
