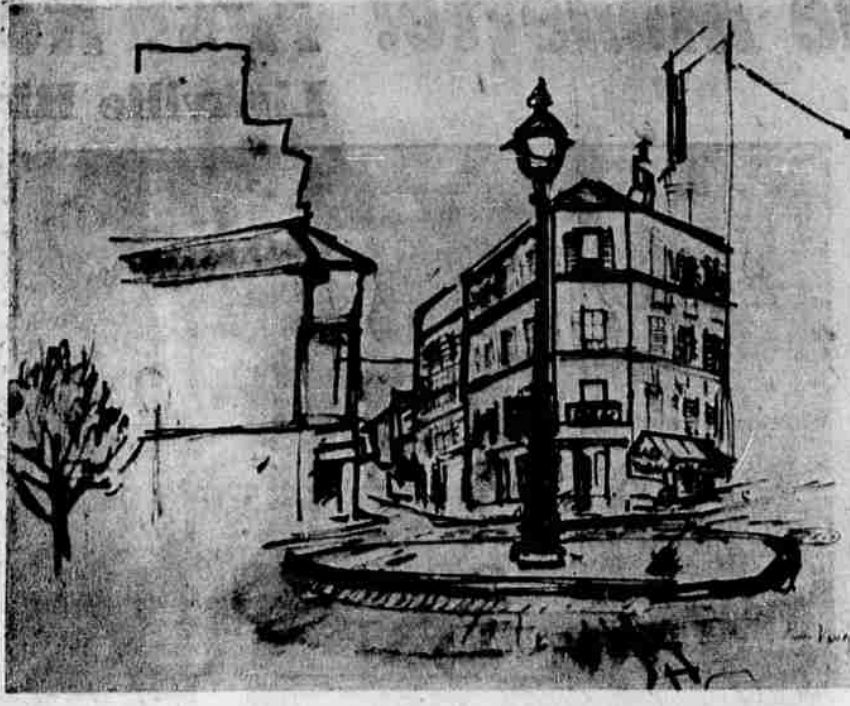

## Demos Lately Indicating Honeymoon Is Growing Old

WASHINGTON (AP) — There was ample evidence Monday that many Democrats have decided to end the honeymoon with President Eisenhower and come out fighting in preliminaries to next year's battle for control of Congress.

Over the week-end, Sen. Kerr (D-Ore.) journeyed to Iowa to lash the administration's farm and monetary policies, while in the Senate, Democrats Magnuson and Henry M. Jackson, both of Washington, and Kefauver of Tennessee roundly condemned administration public power policies.

Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore.) joined in these criticisms in the Senate with the assertion it was "a shame" that Eisenhower had spoken of "creeping socialism" in connection with the Tennessee Valley Authority. Morse disputed the assertion of Sen. Cooper (R-Ky.) that Eisenhower had approved TVA's biggest budget, declaring Eisenhower knew nothing about the budget items.

Morse, who bolted the Republican Party to back the Democratic

ticket in last year's presidential race, aimed his criticism at Eisenhower's suggestion recently that projects like TVA should be re-evaluated. Eisenhower said that, in such future programs, he wants to make sure the local people have a bigger voice.

Magnuson said Eisenhower had demonstrated his "ignorance of the facts" of power developments. The interior secretary of the senatorial caucus and the Republican-controlled Congress of "trying to stop the clock on Western progress and development."

**McKay For Wide Atom Research**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of the Interior McKay told the joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee Monday he opposes granting exclusive patents to any group conducting research into industrial uses of atomic energy.

McKay said benefits from such research should be "spread over as wide a field as possible."

McKay, Undersecretary of Commerce, Walter Williams and Federal Power Commissioner Dale E. Doly testified at a hearing on legislation to define a federal policy for industrial atomic power development.

Williams told the committee he agreed with McKay that benefits should be made available on a "non-discriminatory basis to both large and small business and to all geographical regions of our nation."

Doly proposed issuing government licenses to encourage private investment in atomic power development.

**1953 Rose Festival Didn't Pay After All**

PORTLAND (AP) — The Portland Rose Festival wasn't a paying proposition this year and probably never will be, Festival President George Henderson said.

But the festival will be continued with contributions making up for the operating loss, he said.

This year the operating loss was about \$18,000. The books will show a \$9,000 profit because associate members contributed \$27,000, he said.

**Kite-Flying Father Juiced by Highline**

EAST MEADOW, N. Y. (AP) — George Hollister, 35, dropped dead Sunday while helping his daughter, Kathy, 10, fly a homemade kite.

The Medical Examiner's office said he was electrocuted when the aluminum wire kite string hit a high tension cable.

**FINLAND PREMIER QUILTS**  
 HELSINKI, Finland (AP) — The coalition government of Premier Urho Kekkonen resigned Monday, and the Socialists were expected to make a bid to take over. Kekkonen, leader of the Agrarian Party, handed his resignation to President Juho Paasikivi. The outgoing government, a coalition of Agrarians and Socialists, had deadlocked over economic policies.
