CHICAGO (AP) — Lighter weights of hogs were steady to 25 cents lower in slow market Tuesday but the rest of the market was steady to strong. Cattle trends were mixed, unevenly strong to 25 cents lower. Sheep were mostly steady. Most butchers brought \$23.00 to \$26.00. Sows were worth \$18.00 to \$22.50. Good to prime steers and yearlings sold from \$17.50 to \$23.00 and choice to low-prime heifers from \$19.00 to \$21.00. Commercial cows and fat beef bulls could do no better than \$13.50. Good to prime spring lambs still ranged from \$23.00 to \$27.00. Salable receipts were estimated at 8,000 hogs, 6,500 cattle, 400 calves and 1,500 sheep.

Fluoridation Loses in Albany

ALBANY, Ore. (AP) — A proposal to add fluoride to this city's water supply was rejected, 876-582, by voters Monday. It was the second time in little more than two years Albany voters have turned down fluoridation. The City Council recently passed an ordinance ordering the Mountain States Co. to put fluoride in the Albany water supply. More than 500 residents signed petitions opposing the ordinance, and the council ordered a special election.

Rep. Wheeler's Impeachment Case Against Douglas Fails First Hurdle

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Wheeler (D-Ga.) made his formal argument Tuesday for impeachment of Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas and a majority of the hearing subcommittee promptly told him he had failed to make a case. Wheeler offered his resolution immediately after Douglas had issued a stay order, quickly overruled by the full court, to hold off the execution of atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. The Georgian based his complaint largely on that action but brought in other matters in charges which included "treason" and "moral turpitude."

"I am completely satisfied," Wheeler said, "and will so express myself privately and publicly." Graham said the subcommittee probably will report to the full Judiciary Committee. Wilson, after remarking that Douglas acted in the Rosenberg case was "rather strange," said: "I don't think there are any legal grounds by which this committee could vote impeachment." He suggested the Supreme Court itself should "lighten up" its rules to prevent individual justices from acting on cases which have already been heard by the full court. Wheeler agreed with members of the committee that Douglas had a legal right to act as he did. Walter joined in that view but commented that the action raised a substantial question which he said "till the end of time" will be discussed in the law reviews. Wheeler told the committee he had been wrong in listing Douglas with an Oregon divorce case, saying he had brought the matter up on the basis of a newspaper report. "The implication carried in the newspaper story was false," he said. "The divorce proceedings in Portland, Ore., did not involve Justice Douglas."

New Date Set On Gateway Case

WASHINGTON (AP) — Effective date of an Interstate Commerce Commission order in the Ogden (Utah) Gateway freight rate case has been postponed from Aug. 8 to Oct. 7. The ICC, announcing the change Monday, said the postponement was requested by the Union Pacific Railroad which is making a court test of the agency's ruling in the case. The ICC last week refused to reconsider an order issued last January directing Union Pacific and Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad to establish joint rates on a limited list of commodities shipped to and from the Pacific Northwest through the gateway. DEAN STRICKEN EUGENE (AP) — The second heart attack he had suffered in two days sent Sydney M. Little, 48, dean of the University of Oregon school of architecture and allied arts, to a hospital here Monday.

Wheeler did not name the newspaper Tuesday but in a preliminary statement made in a House speech Monday, he said it was The Washington Times-Herald. The newspaper made no immediate comment. Wheeler maintained that Douglas' "political predilections" and "partisan political enterprises" have brought both him and the supreme court into ill repute. Wheeler went on to assert that Douglas' action in the Rosenberg case was "obviously and patently an impulsive yielding to a clamorous and partisan group." Only four members of the federal judiciary have ever been removed by impeachment. In only one instance has a Supreme Court justice been brought to trial before a Senate court of impeachment, and he was acquitted. In the present case, it appeared improbable that Wheeler's resolution would ever get to the floor of the house. Wheeler yesterday rejected as "completely repugnant" a suggestion he said had been made that he apologize to Douglas after the full court, while setting aside Douglas' stay of execution, said he had full authority to grant it. The Rosenbergs were executed June 19. "If apology is due," Wheeler said, "it is from Mr. Douglas to all the fine members of the American courts and to all Americans who have had every right to hold the court as the ultimate bastion of our liberty." Wheeler reviewed his case in a House speech yesterday, listing six specifications against the justice: (1) conduct unbecoming a Supreme Court justice, (2) actions tending to bring the court into disrepute, (3) public statements in effect prejudging cases before the court, (4) moral turpitude, (5) conspiracy, and (6) treason. Wheeler said his impeachment move was not based on Douglas' stay of execution, which he conceded had proper legal grounds. The stay, Wheeler contended, "served to accentuate" his belief in the "general unfitness of this man." Discussing his charge of moral turpitude, Wheeler asked the House to subpoena the records of a divorce case in Portland, Ore. He said the case involved "the divorce of Assistant Secretary of the Interior C. Girard Davidson from his wife, Mercedes Davidson, with Mr. Justice Douglas reportedly named as co-defendant." Davidson, now a Portland attorney, termed Wheeler's statement
