HONOLULU (AP)—The International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union Tuesday withdrew all previous demands in wage negotiations for Hawaii stevedores, and its president, Harry Bridges, submitted two offers. He asked management to offer a wage increase about 6 cents an hour, the amount awarded West Coast stevedores by an arbitrator, or offer 11 cents with the privilege of reopening wage talks within six months.

WHEELING, W. Va. (AP)—A 61-year-old man trying to break the transcontinental walking record stopped briefly in Wheeling for a rest late yesterday.

David Will Power, who said he left California April 20, admitted the hills of neighboring Eastern Ohio had left him a little tired when he arrived in Wheeling. After a short rest, he set out again last night.

Power is accompanied on his coast-to-coast walk by two men who remain close by in a small automobile. The trio camps out at night.

Power said he is trying to break the 77-day record which was set in 1910 by Edward Payson Weston. Power hopes to be in New York City by July 11.

Funeral services were conducted Monday, 10:30 a.m., in Mountain View Chapel and burial followed in the IOOF section of Mountain View Cemetery, with Litwiler Funeral Home in charge.

Mrs. Purdy is the daughter of David Haynes, Langell Valley pioneer of 1886. She married Walter Purdy. At one time they leased farm land near the site of the present town of Tulelake. Later they lived on the J. Frank Adams ranch. Their children, Ruth and Owen, attended Merrill schools. UN Defers Talk On Soviet Slaves

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP)—Despite vigorous United States objection, the United Nations Economic and Social Council decided Tuesday to put off until next year discussion of a report charging existence of forced labor in the Soviet Union and three other Communist countries.

The council voted, 10-5, with three abstentions to adjourn the forced labor discussion, in spite of a warning by U. S. Delegate John C. Baker that the action was one "those who put their faith in this council as a guardian of human rights would find difficult to understand."
