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Cleveland Signs Another Averill



EARL AVERILL, JR. ... like father, like son?

CLEVELAND (NEA)—The battery for the Indians within a couple of years could be Garcia, Lemon or Wynn pitching and Averill catching.

The Cleveland club hasn't resurrected its one-time slugging center fielder, Earl Averill, given him a shot of eternal youth and stationed him behind the plate to add a little punch to the batting order.

The Tribe, you see, has another Averill—Earl, Jr., a little heavier and taller, but every inch an Averill from physiognomy to batting stance.

Although he was a well-regarded recruit, no Joe DiMaggio or Mickey Vernon preceded Averill, Sr., to the American League in 1929, but in his first turn at bat at old League Park he smote a mighty home run over the right center field wall.

For 14 years, the first Earl of Snodgrass went on abusing such pitchers as Grove, Earnshaw, Rowe, Bridges and Ted Lyons.

In eight years, he batted well above .300, his top average coming in 1936, when he hit .378 in 152 games only to lose the league championship to Luke Appling of the White Sox, who appeared in 14 less contests.

Earl Averill, Jr., would be the third Earl of Snodgrass, Earl Torgeson of the Phillies also hailing from the same Washington town.

Unlike his illustrious dad, Earl, Jr., bats from the right side, moved behind the plate in his attempt to crack the majors. The youngster showed enough to warrant a contract with Reading of the Class A Eastern League.

Last year, Averill, Jr., was co-captain of the University of Oregon team, made the National Collegiate Athletic Association All-American team as an outfielder. He has also played the infield, mostly at third base.

But he was better than 350 batting average as a collegian that had bird dogs excited until he elected to follow in his father's footsteps. It was the old man who advised the kid to head for Cleveland.

Averill, 21, is a father of a nine-months-old son, so has plenty of incentive.

Earl Averill, Jr., starts knowing that sons of famous players have never gotten anywhere in particular.

The progeny of George Sisler, Eddie Collins, Connie Mack, Christy Mathewson, Walter Johnson, Big Ed Walsh, Billy Sullivan and other super stars tried to be like pop with little or no success.

Pros Dubious of PGA Changes

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (AP)—Something new has been added this year to the Professional Golfers Association Championship, which always has its own unique flavor.

And the stay-at-home club pros who are the main support of the organization aren't sure they like it.

The 35th PGA tournament, starting today at the toughened-up Birmingham Country Club course, still is the club pros' big party. But when they set the dates over the busy July 4 weekend and gave architect Robert Trent Jones the job of stiffening the course, some of the players began squawking.

Many found it difficult to leave their clubs on the busy weekend and some couldn't make it at all.

And they shuddered at the mention of what Jones did to nearby Oakland Hills for the 1951 National Open.

But as the firing began today, everything looked pretty normal. Practice rounds showed that the narrow fairways and rolling greens can be mastered. The rough had been trimmed a bit and the fairway widened on one hole—the ninth. It was explained that this would allow misplaced drives to roll into a couple of big traps instead of sticking in the deep grass.

And the favorites were about the same as for any tournament, even though some of the younger tournament stars aren't eligible for the PGA and a couple of well-known players dropped out.

Salem Eyes Halfway Title on Double Win

The Salem Senators are within a single game of winning the Western International Baseball League first half championship.

The Senators, who opened their drive for the top only two weeks ago, all but clinched the title Tuesday night by sweeping a twin bill at Vancouver 5-2 and 7-6.

The double win coupled with Spokane's 12-4 triumph over second-place Lewiston hoisted the Senators two full games ahead of the Broncos. There are two games left to play before the league closes the first half of the split season and Salem can take the championship by winning one of them.

NOT OUT

Lewiston is not entirely out of the race but the Broncos will need an assist from Vancouver. A sweep by Vancouver and Lewiston of the two remaining games would give the title to the Broncos by four percentage points.

Edmonton, another late starter, bowed out of the race Tuesday night. The Eskimos, who rode an eight-game winning streak to within one game of first place, yielded 5-2 to Calgary the ninth time out and lost all hope of catching the leaders.

Wenatchee climbed into the first division, pushing Victoria out of fifth place with a 7-3 win over Tri-City. Victoria lost to Yakima 5-4.

Six-hit pitching by Dave Dahlgave Salem an easy victory in the first game at Vancouver, but the Senators needed two extra innings to take the nightcap. They won in the 11th on a single by Gene Tansell after Dick Sabatini had walked and manager Hugh

Lucy had singled.

Stan Palya carried most of the load for Spokane's Indians in their encounter with the Broncos. He had a five-for-five evening, including two home runs. The loss went to Lewiston's pitcher-manager Bill Brenner, his third of the season against 12 wins.

Glen Hittner spaced eight hits as Calgary stopped Edmonton's winning streak at eight straight. The Eskimos' Ray McNulty also went the distance, but gave up 13 safeties.

The night's best pitching job was at Kennewick where Charley Bowman turned in a neat three-hitter. Bowman was in trouble in the first inning, yielding two of Tri-City's three runs on two walks, a sacrifice and a single, but settled down and handcuffed the Braves the rest of the way.

Manager Walt Novick's ninth-inning homer plus a Victoria error pushed Yakima into the win column at Victoria. Novick's round tripper snapped a 3-3 deadlock. Yakima then added an insurance run, Bill McNamara scoring from first on Phil Steinberg's triple after Bob Monis had dropped Mc-

Namara's high fly to right field, Victoria scored a single run in the bottom of the inning but Jack Rial relieved Tom Del Santo on the mound and ended the rally.
