Man Knifed At Reunion

SEATTLE (AP) - A Portland man was stabbed fatally early Tuesday after a beer-drinking reunion of employees of a sprinkling system firm, and a Kennebec man was held without charge in the case. The stabbing victim was George Gelanda, 31, of Portland. The man being held in the county jail for further questioning is Bert E. Carpenter, 44, of Kennebec. Both worked for the same automatic sprinkler company. County Detectives Jack Appel and Dan Evans said Carpenter admitted the stabbing and said it occurred in a scuffle after "Gelanda threatened to knock my block off" after an argument. The two men had worked together previously on jobs for the firm. Gelanda had arrived in the city with three co-workers only a few hours earlier to work on a Boeing field hangar installation. Carpenter was a member of a group already on the job. The stabbing, with a pocket knife, occurred in an apartment after closing of the tavern in which the men had been drinking beer.

Star System Falling Apart: Betty Grable Dropped Off

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - The growing peril to Hollywood's star system was dramatized today with the news that 20th Century-Fox had parted with its biggest money-maker, Betty Grable.

The star and studio reached an "amicable" ending of her contract, which would have expired in September, 1954. During her 13-year reign as queen of the lot, she had earned millions for herself and the company in glossy musicals. She became the No. 1 box-office draw in wartime and has remained among the top 10 longer than any other female star.

At 36, her glamor gains are still holding their own with the newer names. Then why would 20th Century-Fox grant her wish for freedom? One of the principal reasons is that the film studios can no longer support the expensive star lists of the past. With picture making divorced from theater operation by government order, the studios have to show a profit or else. That meant cutting down the overhead costs that the theaters could once absorb.

Miss Grable was earning an estimated \$500 a week plus big bonuses at the end of each picture. Studios now figure they can avoid such year-around expenses and merely hire talent by the picture. The 3-D revolution has caused fewer pictures to be made, requiring fewer actors. This points to the decline of the star system. The studios are letting many of their established stars go and building few new ones. Miss Grable's relations with her studio began to worsen two years ago. She sat out a year's suspension after turning down "The Girl Next Door." She declared she was "physically and mentally exhausted after 18 months of steady work." After returning for a film, she was again suspended for refusing "Pickup on South Street." She explained: "It was a starkly realistic picture done in black and white. I think it would have been dangerous for me to do." She gained her third suspension for refusing a Columbia loanout. Her reason: "The studio couldn't assure her who the co-star would be."

Cattle Bring Record Price

PETERBOROUGH, N. H. - A single herd of 136 head of registered Guernsey cattle recently sold for over half a million dollars, according to The American Guernsey Cattle Club. The record-breaking sale, which grossed \$503,650, was the Fair-lawn Dispersal Sale at Port Chester, New York. Some 1,000 persons, representing over 20 states, saw the Guernsey herd of S. L. Katz sold for an average price per head of over \$3,700. A. M. Sonnabend of Mills, Massachusetts was top buyer, as he personally purchased 57 head for \$321,000. Mr. Sonnabend bought the top-priced cow in the sale for \$30,000. She was Pine Manor Courtesy, a 10-year-old cow which has twice classified Excellent. "Courtesy," well-known brood matron, is the daughter of Pine Manor Crown Jewel, another famous dam, and has a son, Gardenville Rose King, which recently sold for \$50,000. The top bull, also purchased by Sonnabend for \$16,000, was Fair-lawn H. Eastern King, a proved sire who has 14 tested daughters producing over 700 pounds of fat. In addition, "King" has sired eight proven sons. His sire was Green Meadow Hornet, who has 61 tested daughters and 33 proven sons. This was a record-breaking sale for the Guernsey breed, regarding both gross and average for over 100 head.

Los Angeles Area Lobbying Claimed

WASHINGTON (AP) - A House subcommittee charged Tuesday that millions of dollars of federal housing funds in Los Angeles have been poured into political and lobbying activities "in brazen disregard of federal criminal statutes." The subcommittee called for a Department of Justice investigation. It asked prosecution, if warranted, of "apparent violations of both the corrupt practices act and the Hatch act," barring federal employees from soliciting political funds. The subcommittee recommended "the appropriate administrative action be promptly taken in connection with the involvement of top housing authority officials in lobbying and political activities." It asked for "particularly close scrutiny" of Washington policy-making officials of the Public Housing Administration.
