Art Workshop Supplies Listed

Registrations are coming in much earlier than usual for the fifth annual Summer Art Workshop on the OTI campus, and early indications are there will be a larger attendance than in past years. Experienced painters in the Northwest have registered, several for the third and fourth years. Several teachers are taking the opportunity to take a "vacation with art," since the painting classes are accredited by the University of Oregon.

Students, according to Jack Wilkinson, who will instruct in painting and drawing, may use any medium and choice of palette but the following list of colors and supplies is suggested by Wilkinson. For oil painting—titanium zinc white, cad. yellow pale, or zinc yellow, cad. yellow medium, cad. red light, alizarine crimson, cobalt blue, ultramarine blue, ivory black. Either canvas boards or canvas and stretcher bars in any size, 16x20 or larger. For water colors—zinc yellow, cad. yellow medium, cad. red light, alizarine, phthalo blue or prussian blue, black; water color paper block 14x18 or larger. Drawing supplies—vine charcoal

or a medium black conte crayon, newspaper, sketchbook 8 x 10 or larger, drawing board, approximately 20x24. Because it will be of help to the association to know in advance the approximate enrollment, registrations by mail will be appreciated. No deposit necessary.
