for President Eisenhower's request for blanket authority to use government-owned farm surpluses to combat famine abroad.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn) sought to attach the proposal in modified form to the Senate foreign aid authorization bill last night and was beaten down, 53-12, after Sen. Russell (D-Ga) shouted:

"Here we are finding in this business administration the Brannan Plan on an international scale."

Sen. Knowland of California, the acting Republican leader, replied that Eisenhower specified the farm commodities were to be used to meet "famine or other urgent relief requirements" in friendly nations.

Taking issue with Democrats who said the President was asking for blank check authority to give away some three billion dollars worth of government-held farm stocks, Knowland said Eisenhower expected Congress to provide "appropriate limitations."

But Russell insisted the President's proposal was comparable, on an international scale, to the

plan advanced by former Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan for dealing with surplus farm supplies. Congress spurned the Brannan Plan.

Russell said Eisenhower was asking for "absolute" authority to dispose of the government-held surpluses at whatever price or in whatever way he wanted, with the taxpayers committed to footing the bill.

Magnuson Would Protect Ag Products From Imports

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash) renewed Wednesday his efforts to streamline and strengthen legislative machinery designed to protect domestic farm programs from imports.

He said his proposal would amend a section of the agriculture adjustment act but would be offered now because "it actually is directly related to the trade agreement program and tariff policy."

The section which he seeks to amend provides that when imports of an agricultural commodity tend to impair or destroy the effectiveness of marketing agreements or price supports, the President has authority to impose an import quota up to 50 per cent or an import fee of up to 50 per cent ad valorem on the commodity.

Magnuson said he believes the section has never been the instrument of procedural and administrative defects.

Provisions to give industry direct access to the Tariff Commission, Magnuson said, are "necessary to avoid the circuitous and time-consuming procedure of permitting investigations only upon the recommendation of the secretary of agriculture and approval of the State Department and President."

The amendment also would clarify what Magnuson says was the original intent of Congress when it enacted the legislation—"namely, not to permit excessive imports to interfere with the national objective of achieving for agriculture parity prices in the market place."
