Western Dance—will be held at Pae Valley Community Hall Saturday night, July 4. Public welcome.

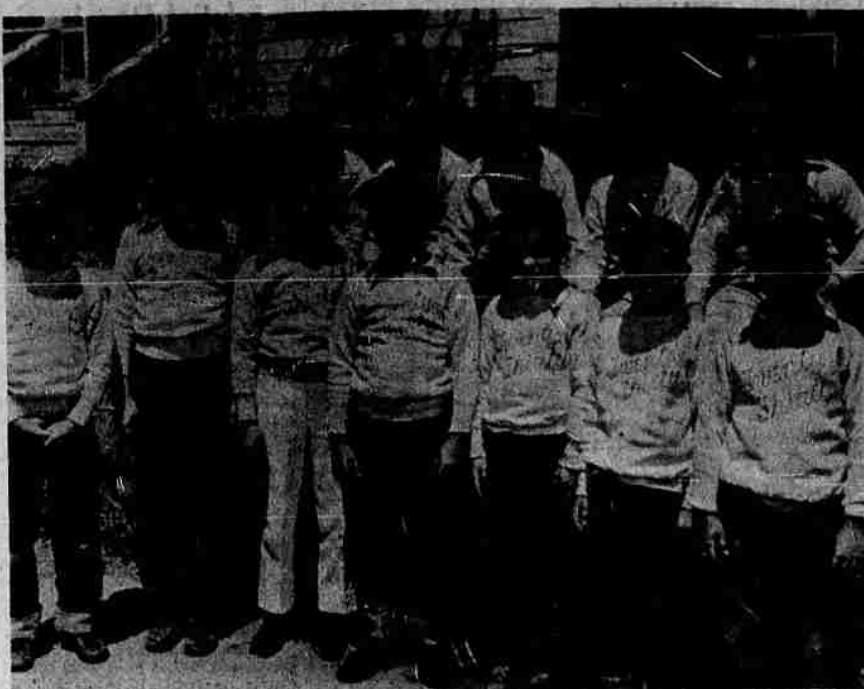
Expressman's Rites Held

Hoover Backs Ike Food Plan

NEW YORK (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover says President Eisenhower's proposal to send American surplus food abroad "will bring results in saving human life and building friendship."

Hoover, head of European food relief after World War I, said yesterday in a statement: "Twice before, after both World Wars I and II, the skill and energy of the American farmer and the generosity of our people have saved uncounted lives."

Describing as a "constructive recommendation" the President's request to Congress for authority to distribute surplus food to famine areas overseas, Hoover added: "An additional reason could be given. These surplus food accumulations of our government are perishable, and to withhold them until they spoil is unthinkable."

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Plant To Process Whale For Fido Without Raising Stink

HOQUIAM (AP)—The whale, which went out of Grays Harbor's economic life along with the old whalebone corset, may be coming back again—but without any support for or from the ladies.

It was announced this week that a whale meat processing plant is being started here for entry into the animal food field.

A 100-ton delivery of whale meat is the first large whale cargo to enter the harbor since the automatic Bay City whaling station closed some 30 years ago.

The processing project is being handled at the Paragon plant by Pacific Sea Products, Inc., of San Francisco. It is described as potentially a \$70,000 to \$100,000 a month business for six months of the year.

The whale catches will be from

Canada's west coast. The meat brought here will be fat-free loins for grinding and packaging in one pound cartons for quick-freezing. It will be marketed primarily for dog and cat food.

Some, however, has been bought by the State Department of Fisheries for hatchery food and some is going for mink food.

Otto Weissich, president of the firm, said the plant will be the first in the country to process whale meat for food. It has been imported in the past. He said the firm has been experimenting with it for eight years.

The plant operation is expected to employ about 30 people. Actually, says Weissich, there is nothing wrong with the whale meat as human food. He said it has long been used in the Scandinavian diet and in recent years has gained an increasing place on the tables of Japan and other European countries.

The big mammal's flavor is described as resembling ground moose meat or venison, rather than fishy.

Grays Harbor had a whaling industry of major proportions for many years at the old Bay City plant. The main product was oil, rendered from the blubber. None of the meat was used for food in any form.

The new plant is not expected to be so easily traceable by a traveler as the old Bay City one. The scent of the old one identified it for miles—when the wind was in the right direction.
