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Know Your Cantaloupes

Summer always means lots of cantaloupes on the menu. For pickers, this is the easy season. A half of a 4 1/2 inch cantaloupe (that's a large one) contains only 33 calories. But it is rich in vitamins, particularly A and C.

Our friend Helen E. Goodrich of Los Angeles is a cantaloupe enthusiast. She declares: "It's fun to have chilled cantaloupe halves for breakfast—or fill the prepared melon halves with a combination of fresh summer fruits, top with a 'dollop' of sherbet and serve on lettuce cups. Presto — a beautiful salad."

"For cantaloupe a la mode, fill the halves with a scoop of ice cream. Serve at once with or without the embellishment of crushed and sweetened fresh berries. Of course, the perfect dessert to present to the weight-watchers is an unadorned chilled cantaloupe half, served with sensible sections of fresh lemon or lime."

With a little practice you can pick a perfect melon every time. Vine-ripened, mature cantaloupes

have two definite "signposts" to guide you. 1—look for a slightly sunken, smooth, well-calloused scar at the stem end. This "fingerprint" is your guarantee that the cantaloupe was vine-ripened and picked at the peak of its flavor. 2—Check the netting. It should be well developed and stand out in bold relief over the surface of the entire cantaloupe.

Above all, don't be a "bruiser." A slight softening may indicate a mature melon, but, then again, "bruises" ahead of you may have softened an immature melon. Don't be misled. Depend on the quality of the netting and the characteristic "fingerprint" at the stem end in choosing perfect cantaloupes.
