Plush Catholic Church Started

LAKEVIEW—Construction is well under way on a new Catholic Church at Plush, while the probable completion date is September, it was announced by Father James O'Connor, rector of St. Patrick's Catholic Parish.

Name of the new church will be St. Thomas Catholic Church, and services will be conducted there twice monthly by Father O'Connor or his assistant from St. Patrick's church. In the past services have been held at Plush once a month in the homes of parishioners.

The church will seat 75 or 80 persons and will be 28 ft. by 46 feet in size. Construction will be brick veneer finish, with interior wainscoting of Philippine mahogany and ceilings of acoustical tile. Exposed laminated trusses will support the structure which will stand on a concrete slab flooring.

The cost will be \$15,000. Father O'Connor said, which is being paid by subscription among members. Contractor is Riverman & Sons of Portland. The land for the new building was given by T. R. Conn. Plans for joint services in which to dedicate the new St. Thomas Church and the new St. Patrick Parish Hall are being laid for September, when the Most Rev. F. P. Leipsig, bishop of the Baker diocese, will be present to participate. One new structure will be dedicated in the morning, the other in the afternoon.

Lake County Levy Approved

LAKEVIEW—Lake County voters approved the courthouse two-year serial levy in the special election held Friday, June 26, and arrangements are being made to publish the call for bids early in July. At present, it is planned to have the opening of bids on Wednesday, Aug. 5.

On the first question, asking for the approval of the special levy, the final vote was 561 for the levy and 432 against, a margin of 129 in favor. On the second question, asking for approval of the levy outside the six percent limitation, the vote was 548 in favor and 419 against, a margin of 129 in favor.

The vote was light with less than 1000 of the county's more than 3000 registered voters taking part. The tax levy will total \$198,000, to be collected in two tax years. This will be added to principal and interest of two earlier construction levies and the memorial fund principal and interest, which together total upwards of \$182,000.
