Seattle is getting even with Los Angeles in their recent series in Los Angeles, where the Angels won five games of seven.

If Thursday night's score in Seattle, 15-0 in favor of the Rainiers, was an accurate margin between the teams' capabilities, Los Angeles might well abandon its hopes for winning the Pacific Coast League pennant.

But Friday night is another night. The Angels hope so, at least. Seattle had a 6-0 lead by the third, added four more in the fifth and three more in the sixth. Bill Evans of Grand Junction, Colo., toyed with the Los Angeles hitters as he held them to five bingles. The Rainiers pounded Cal McFie, Bob Spicer and Alan Thide for 16 base hits and the Angels committed four errors to compound their miseries.

Hollywood staged a half game behind Seattle by edging Sacramento, 2-0, as Harry Fisher pitched a three-hitter against the Solons. Dale Long blasted a tremendous homer in the eighth, his 16th of the season, over the left-centerfield fence.

San Francisco, showing steady improvement, moved into a fifth place tie with San Diego by beating the Padres in the tenth inning, 3-2. Elmer Singleton went all the way for the Seals, while Al Benton relieved Bob Kerrigan for San Diego in the tenth. Hero of the game was Second Baseman Lou Stringer, who was traded by San Diego to the Seals for Joe Grace. Stringer singled with the bases jammed in the tenth.

Oakland had a big third inning against Portland, scoring four runs and going on to a 5-3 win against the Beavers. Al Gettel posted his 15th pitching victory as he held the Ports to seven hits. They got two of their runs off Gettel in the ninth. Lefty Royce Lint, Portland starter, was driven out in the third.

Trout fishing is good on the Upper Rogue and the North Umpqua is improved. Condition of the Lower Deschutes is good and good catches are being made in the Crooked River.

Northeast Oregon streams are clear and fishing is fair to good. Klamath basin streams are providing good catches.

# Seixas Wins Net Crown

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Vic Seixas of Philadelphia overpowered Denmark's Kurt Nielsen Friday to win the all England men's singles tennis championship, 6-7, 6-4.

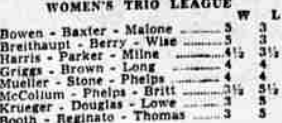
This was the sixth Wimbledon victory for an American player in the last seven years.

The 29-year-old Seixas, captain of the 1952 U. S. Davis Cup team had never before won a major tennis title. He came close in 1951 but lost in the American finals at Forest Hills, N. Y., to Frank Sedgman of Australia.

Earlier America's Doris Hart and Shirley Fry, the world's top feminine doubles team, trounced the British combination of Helen Fitcher and Mrs. Jean Rinkel, 6-0, 6-0, to gain the final of the all-England lawn tennis championship.

Miss Hart, of Coral Gables, Fla., and Miss Fry, of Akron, O., are seeking their third straight Wimbledon doubles title.

The Florida star also is in the singles final. Seixas will meet Maureen Connolly of San Diego, Calif., for the crown Saturday. The doubles final also is scheduled for Saturday.

# Palmer Ties PGA Record

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (AP) — The main event in one of golf's finest shows — the match play in the annual PGA tournament — got under way Friday, with two nice little guys who haven't been doing too well lately at the opposite ends of the bracket.

One was Jimmy Turnesa of Briarcliff, N. Y., the defending champion, the other Johnny Palmer of Baidin, N. C., the qualifying medalist and now co-holder of the PGA qualifying record.

Palmer's qualifying performance Thursday was one of the finest seen in 35 years of PGA tournaments. He shot rounds of 68-66-134 over the 6,485-yard Birmingham Club course on a day when strong gusty winds made good scoring difficult.

That score equaled the PGA record set by Jim Ferrier in 1946 and equaled by Skip Alexander in 1948 and the 66 matched the course record.

Turnesa, who didn't have to qualify for match play, tried it anyway and came through with two rounds of 70 which stamped him as a serious title contender.

# Star Voting Ends Friday

CHICAGO (AP) — Balloting will end at midnight Friday night in the 1953 poll to name the American and National League lineups for the 20th annual All-Star baseball game in Cincinnati on July 14.

In the latest tabulations of returns at the Chicago Tribune's balloting headquarters, the 16 leaders for starting positions in the lineups retained their positions. The poll started June 12.

Mickey Mantle, New York Yankees center fielder, still led the individual vote getting with 679,858 ballots. Ted Kluszewski, Cincinnati Redlegs' first baseman, and the hero of Thursday night's triumph over the Milwaukee Braves, is the second highest individual vote getter with 667,204. Kluszewski is far ahead of Brooklyn's Gil Hodges in the race for the first base starting job.

# Yankees Finally Win One

Now that the Yankees finally have quit losing maybe the Cleveland Indians will go back to playing better baseball.

Instead of concentrating on their own business, the Indians this week have been going through their paces with one eye on the scoreboard to see how much ground they were gaining on the fading New Yorkers. As a result they lost two in a row to the tail-end Detroit Tigers. They have a chance to make immediate amends since they go home tonight to face the usually docile Bengals in three more games.

The Yanks broke their nine game victory drought by edging the Red Sox, 5-3, in 10 innings at Boston yesterday. Cleveland bowed, 4-2, to Detroit and slumped six full games behind the World Champions.

## SIX BACK

The Chicago White Sox, who had yesterday and today off, also are six games back and just two percentage points behind the Indians.

In the National League the Brooklyn Dodgers made sure that they will be in first place on the morning of the Fourth of July, traditional turning point of the pennant races. The Dodgers defeated Philadelphia, 8-0, and second place Milwaukee skidded a game and a half behind by losing to Cincinnati, 3-1. The rest of the National League clubs weren't scheduled.

Johnny Mize hammered the hit that broke the Yankee slump. Pinch hitting in the 10th with two out and Yogi Berra on third base. Mize drove a 3-2 pitch from Sid Hudson into left center field for a double.

First base was open at the time but Red Sox Manager Lou Boudreau gambled on pitching to Mize rather than waiting for Oil McDougald, the next scheduled hitter. As it was, McDougald then drew an intentional pass and Bill Martin brought in the insurance run with a single that scored Bill Renna, running for Mize.

## HOME RUN

Don Bollweg, yesterday's first baseman in Casey Stengel's ever-changing lineup, drove in three runs with a home run in the fifth inning, and the New Yorkers thought they were going to win in regulation time. But George Kell opened the Boston ninth with a home run and forced the extra inning.

Al Rosen hit his third home run in three games to get Cleveland out in front at Detroit but the Tigers went ahead with a pair in the third on a walk, a wild pitch by loser Mike Garcia and singles by Johnny Pesky and Walt Dropo.

Don Lund produced the winning runs with a home run scoring Matt Batts ahead of him in the seventh.

Steve Gromek scattered seven hits in registering his third victory.

Washington's scheduled game in Philadelphia was rained out.

So far this year Brooklyn's biggest difficulty has been its pitching but you couldn't find much wrong with Carl Erskine's seven hit performance against the Phillies. The shutout was only the fourth this season by a Brooklyn pitcher and it marked the first time in 18 games that the opposition hasn't hit a home run against the Dodgers.

## EXTRA BASES

Brooklyn collected only eight hits, but six of them went for extra bases.

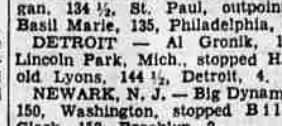
Cincinnati has hit 94 home runs, more than any other major league team and the Redlegs used them to good advantage in handling Milwaukee its eighth straight home loss.
