Jimmy Braddock, "The Cinderella Man" of boxing, was born December 6, 1905, in North Burger, N. J., very much Irish and got his fighting education on the docks of New York as a longshoreman where might was right, where the weak perished and only the strong survived.

So to survive you almost had to fight and that's what Jimmy did. He started boxing in 1926 and met men like Tommy Loughran, Maxie Rosenbloom, Jimmy Slattery and on June 13, 1935, met and defeated Max Baer for the heavyweight championship of the world.

Max Baer was known as the "playboy champion." He liked to clown and have fun and would not take anything seriously. He played in several pictures, minor parts, and would-much-much accidents, an actor than a fighter. (Maybe he had something there!)

Previous to his becoming the champion he was involved in two ring accidents, one fatal. In the other he was said to be instrumental in causing a fatality. It was said at that time, by the boxing moguls who are supposed to know, that Max would not hit a man as hard as he could, fearing that he might hurt him seriously.

I boxed Max in an exhibition bout in Miami while he was champion and he did not in that bout hit me a solid punch, and believe me he could have at any time he wanted to. It was wrong for some people, in my opinion, to refer to Baer as the "champion with the million dollar body and the two-cent head." His previous accidents bothered him. They must have for he was almost too human. He had a heart and soul like people who didn't fight, maybe he wanted to sleep when he went to bed. I know nights he didn't.

Max is now doing what I think he always wanted to do. He and Maxie Rosenbloom, the ex-lightweight champion, are doing a song-and-dance routine at night clubs and theaters.

Sam Langford was a gentleman and a great fighter. He went anywhere, anytime, and fought anyone who wanted to fight. He didn't care anything about your race, color or creed. If you weighed a ton, if you wanted a fight, Sam would accommodate you.

Let's tell a story about Sam when he was fighting in London: Time came for the fight and the promoter asked him if he had any preference as to referees so Sam replied, "I never worries about referees, I carry my own with me and here they are"—and he waved his two big fists at the promoter. Sam won in four rounds.

Receipts for the Sharkey-Maloney fight at Yankee Stadium in New York City was \$232,199. Receipts for the Delaney-Maloney fight, held at Madison Square Garden, was \$201,485, of which I received 27 1/2 per cent.

Things have since changed; I borrowed five dollars from Kathryn for expenses; I hope it will last a week.

It's a good guess the Cokes will work overtime in base-running this week as the Klamath American Legion Junior baseballers prepare for two road trips — to Albany Thursday and Grants Pass Sunday.

Base-running was the stickout weakness as the Cokes dropped two close decisions to Albany at Recreation Park, Saturday and Sunday. The Cummings Movers of Albany won Sunday's game, 8-7, in 10 innings; Sunday's margin was just 4-3 in seven innings.

It didn't make much difference how the lads trod the basepaths in Sunday's second game; there was plenty of traffic as they wallowed 13-3, behind the six-hit pitching of Modesto Jimenez.

AHEAD

David D'Olivo had what looked like a certain win in Saturday's game, coasting ahead 7-6 going into the ninth inning after pitching himself out of some early trouble.

He caused Bob Daley to pop harmlessly to the mound to retire the first man up in the ninth. But third baseman Bruce Ridinger slapped a triple and scored on a squeeze play as Albany tied the count.

Don Taucher teased a walk from Jerry Hazelwood, got over-anxious and streaked for second base. Hazelwood whipped the ball to Ray Derrah to catch Taucher with room to spare. That bit of base-running was costly because Don Dexter slapped out a single but died on the bases as both Modesto Jimenez and Craig McCarty went out on routine infield grounders.

FIRST HIT

Gene Metler knocked a double, his first blow of the season, as the Cokes tried to get back in the game. But Bob Harshbarger whiffed for the second out and Bob Kelly forced Orin Perkins at second base after the latter had walked.

Albany went ahead in the first inning on a two-run double by Jerry Roth. Klamath tied it up 1-1 in the second on a single by Jimenez. Albany rapped out consecutive triples after Taucher had singled. A double by Dave Shelby, a wild pitch and an error gave Albany a 4-4 lead in the fourth but the Cokes pounded back with three runs and a 7-4 lead in the sixth.

A 7-6 lead in the sixth frame on a two-run triple by Harshbarger that tied the count. Harshbarger scored on an error to put the Cokes ahead until the ninth frame when Albany tied it up. Albany led, 4-1, in Sunday's game, one run coming on a powerful home run poke by Hazelwood, when the Cokes closed it 2-4 in the sixth when Kelly landed on base on an error and eventually stole home.

The Cokes started a rally in the seventh when Gary Hackley led off with a double and scored on Jimenez' triple in a pinch-hit role. Behind just one run and with Jimenez parked on third, Craig McCarty lifted a fly to short left field.

PICKED OFF

Jimenez took off after the catch but it was no effort for Cottman to pick him off at the plate.

Harshbarger struck out to end the threat.

Eleven Bender errors—six in the first inning and 12 Klamath hits off starter Chuck Christianson and reliever Jim Crowell gave the Cokes an easy win over Bend to salvage one victory in the three games over the weekend.

The Cokes scored four runs in the first inning on a single by Rod Wright, a triple by Don Dexter and a double by the six Bender errors. A two-run triple by Hackley and an error gave the Cokes three more in the third. They added two in the fourth, one in the fifth and three in the sixth. Dexter smacked a single, double and a triple in four trips to the plate for the day.

Jimenez, who had two for three, had just one bad inning on the mound. That was the sixth when he gave up three of the six hits as Bender scored two runs.

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Yanks Lose Pair; Brooks Skid Back

Bob Porterfield and Johnny Schmitz are the new idols of "I hate the Yankees" clubs from coast to coast. And Jerry Snyder must be at least an honorary vice president. The trio of ex-Yanks, traded out of the New York organization during the regime of manager Casey Stengel, teamed up to help Washington sweep a double-header from the Yanks yesterday, 4-0 and 5-4. It was the Yanks' first double loss of the year.

Porterfield, shunted to Washington in the Bob Kuzava deal in 1951, shut out New York with five hits and allowed only one man to reach second base in the opener. Schmitz, cut loose this spring, mopped up with a fine relief job in the second game. Snyder, who toiled on the Yankee farms until he was tossed into the Jackie Jensen-Noren swap last spring, came through with three hits, drove in two runs and scored another in the 12th attack on Kuzava.

GAIN

Chicago and Cleveland both gained a full game on the Yanks by splitting two Cleveland, South-paw Billy Pierce blanked the Indians, 4-0, on five hits to keep the White Sox in second place after Cleveland came from behind to beat reliever Harry Dorch in the opener, 7-4.

Boston scored eight in the first inning to give Mel Parnell a 10-3 romp over Philadelphia. Detroit, for the first time all season, took both ends of a double from St. Louis, 10-7 and 7-1. It also was the first time the Tigers had beaten the Browns all year.

As a result of the day's action, the Yanks lead Chicago by 3 1/2 and Cleveland by six games.

Brooklyn's National League advantage shrank to 1 1/2 games when they absorbed a 3-0 drubbing from the New York Giants, their worst defeat in many seasons. Hank Thompson hit two homers, one with the bases full off Ralph Branca, and drove in seven runs to let Sal Maglie ease home.

DIVIDE

Milwaukee and St. Louis, fighting for second, split. Warren Spahn pitched his 25th major league shutout in the first to win, 4-0, with the help of homers by Johnny Logan and Ed Mathews. Red Schoendienst' three-run pinch homer gave St. Louis the second, 4-1, halted by darkness after eight innings.

The Phillies picked up a full game on Brooklyn by nipping Pittsburgh, 2-0, in 10 innings as Robin Roberts started the winning rally with a double.

The Sunday curfew saved the Phillies a likely defeat in the second game for they trailed 7-0 after six innings when the game was stopped. It goes as a suspended game to be completed from point of interruption before an Aug. 11 night game.

CADILLAC

Chicago and Cincinnati divided a pair of free-hitting games on "Dutch Leonard Day" at Wrigley Field. Dutch saw action in both games and received an air-conditioned Cadillac between games. Hank Sauer hit two doubles and a single to run his string to six straight hits in helping win the first game, 6-4, but he was stopped

by Clyde King in the second game. Ralph Kiner hit his 17th and 18th homers and Hank Sauer and Bill Herrera also homered but they weren't enough to save the second game, won by Cincinnati, 6-6.

The Yanks' troubles at Washington started early when Allie Reynolds was chased in the second inning of the first game, after giving up three runs in the first.

Schmitz, third Washington pitcher in the second, thrilled the largest Griffith Stadium crowd of the year, 27,685, by holding the Yanks to five hits and one run in the final six innings.

Bob Elliott's bat backed up Pierce's pitching in the second game against Cleveland. The veteran third baseman singled to drive in the first run and hit his seventh homer in the sixth. The Indians scored four in the seventh to pull out the opener.

13 TO BAT

Thirteen men went to bat for the Red Sox in the first inning and six of them hit safely against Carl Scheib, Marion Franco and Joe Coleman. Billy Goodman and Dick Gertner each had a double and single in the inning. Gertner hit his 14th homer later while Parnell breezed along with a six-hitter.

The Tigers finally caught up with the Browns after losing seven straight to them and pulled within one game of seventh place. Johnny Bucha led the Tigers with a perfect game against Cleveland. He had three hits, Ted Gray held St. Louis to four hits in the second game, the only run coming on Don Lenzard's homer.

Sal Maglie, who has whipped Brooklyn 16 out of 22 through the years, had an easy afternoon, scattering nine hits. Clem Labine, Joe Black, Branca and Ben Wade all were hit hard by the Giants.

Kluszewski Tops Mantle On Ballot

CHICAGO (AP)—Ted Kluszewski of the Cincinnati Redlegs and Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees are the first choices on the teams in the annual All-Star Game at Cincinnati July 12.

Kluszewski was top vote-getter among the 4 1/2 million fans who helped pick the teams, with a whopping 1,652,803 total.

He surpassed Mantle, who led individual balloting all but the last few days, by about 240,000 votes. However, Mantle was the American League leader with 1,413,938.

Kluszewski will start at first base for the National League team in the 20th annual inter-league game. Mantle will start at center field for the American League.

A total of 4,430,338 votes were cast in the poll, handled by newspapers throughout the country with the Chicago Tribune serving as counting headquarters.

All starting spots except pitchers for both National and American league teams were filled by the poll.

Casey Stengel, the American League manager, was to announce his mound selections tonight. Charley Dressen, the National League manager, was to follow with his tomorrow morning.

Goodwill Leads In Yacht Race

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The schooner Goodwill of Newport Beach, Calif., took over the lead Monday in the 2,225 mile Los Angeles to Honolulu yacht race.

A Columbia Broadcasting System engineer, Pat Walsh, aboard the Goodwill, radioed that she had overtaken the Morning Star, owned by Richard Rheem of San Francisco. The Morning Star, winner of the last two trans-Pacific yacht races, had held the lead almost since the start of the race.

The Goodwill, owned by Ralph Larrabee, is reported to have a five-mile lead over the Morning Star, with the Chubasco of Los Angeles third. At last report, the cutter La Apache of Seattle was fourth.

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
