Senators In Second Half Lead

The Salem Senators, the Western International Baseball League's first-half champions, are off to a fast start in the race for the second-half title.

The Senators posted a pair of 4-3 wins over Victoria Sunday for Salem. It was the sixth straight win in the five-game series at Victoria for the Senators in their latest hot streak and their 20th win in 23 starts.

The Yakima Bears and Spokane Indians, both second division clubs in the first half of the split season, kept pace with Salem half a game back by sweeping Sunday doubleheaders.

The Bears clipped Lewiston's Bronchos 9-8 and 3-2 at Yakima while the Indians downed Edmonton's Eskimos 5-4 and 13-5 at Spokane.

SPLIT
Tri-City subdued Vancouver 5-1 in the first game of a twin bill at Kennewick but lost the nightcap 5-4 after 14 innings. Calgary and Wenatchee also split, Calgary winning the opener 17-6 and Wenatchee the afterpiece 2-1.

Salem moves to Tri-City for one of the three games on its Monday night. For the others, Edmonton will be at Vancouver and Calgary at Victoria.

Late-inning rallies gave Salem its two Sunday victories. Trailing 2-2 in the sixth inning of the first game, the Senators combined two hits and three walks for game-winning runs. They took the second contest with two unearned runs in the eighth.

OUTHIT
Lewiston outthrew Yakima in both contests at Yakima—a 17-11 margin in the opener and 8-4 at night—but failed to convert them into counters.

At Spokane, Stan Paly gave the Indians their first-game victory margin with an eighth-inning home run. Edmonton's Whitey Thompson led off on the first pitch of the second game and blasted it out of the park, but the Indians came back with four runs in their half of the inning and were never threatened.

It took Calgary and Wenatchee two hours and 26 minutes to stagger through the seven-inning opener at Wenatchee. During the marathon three Wenatchee hurlers gave up a total of 18 bases on balls.

Charley Oubre pitched four-hit ball for the Chiefs, winning the nightcap. Joe Orrell's wild pitch sent in the winning tally in the ninth after the Chiefs had reached him for three safeties to load the bases.

In Saturday games, Calgary thumped Wenatchee 10-3 and 5-1. Salem trounced Victoria 12-10 and 5-3. Vancouver clipped Tri-City 7-5. Yakima, bouncing back from an 11-0 shutout took the second game of a twin bill 5-1, and Edmonton ended a Spokane winning streak at five straight by a 5-2 win over the Indians, posted after dropping the first meeting 5-4.

Campbell Decathlon Winner

PLAINFIELD, N. J. (AP) — You can make a long-range bet that the United States will hang on to the Olympic decathlon Jim Bausch won for Uncle Sam back in 1932.

And the bet will still be good even if Bob Mathias, the two-time Olympic champion and world record holder, is not on hand to represent this country in the tough test of speed, skill and strength.

Nineteen-year-old Milt Campbell's performance in the 1953 National AAU decathlon over the weekend stamped him as the fourth greatest performer in the event. In three years, the still growing youngster could come very close to Mathias' world mark of 7,887.

Right now only Mathias, 1936 Olympic Champion Glenn Morris and the Rev. Bob Richards of Long Beach, Calif., have better marks than Campbell's 7,235 points. Richards, who scored the equivalent of 7,239 points, under the current scoring system, when he won the title in 1931, found out over the weekend, however, that this was 1953. He finished a distant second to Campbell with 6,456 points.

Veteran AAU officials sports-writers and track "bugs" at the meet came away marveling over the performance of two other athletes in their first shot at the decathlon. Joel Shankle, Duke's one-man track team, placed fourth in his maiden effort with 5,995 points, and 18-year-old Aubrey Lewis of Montclair, N. J., made sixth with 5,737.

Lewis, in particular, caught the track critics' eye. His first practice for the decathlon was exactly one month ago today. He had never competed before in five of the events.

Harmon, Burkemo, 'Unknowns' in Semis

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (AP) — Four of the "home" pros who form the backbone of the Professional Golfers Association met in the semi-final matches of the 25th PGA Tournament today and at least one of them is beelining midly over a new ruling which may give him a place on the Ryder Cup team.

The two matches bring together a pair of fairly well-known pros, Walter Burkemo and Claude Harmon, and a pair of complete "unknowns," Felipe Torza and Jack Isaacs. One of them is bound to make the Ryder Cup team, which will play in England in October, under the new PGA ruling by which the champion is an "automatic" selection.

It was Harmon, after whomping Bill Nary, 4 and 5, in yesterday's fourth-round match, who raised his voice in a mild objection to this rule.

BEAT ONE
"In this kind of a tournament, you only beat the men you play. Today our match came apart and I beat Nary. I didn't have to beat Walter Burkemo or anybody else, just the one man. In the Open championship you have to beat every man every day—but the winner isn't automatically on the team. It isn't quite reasonable."

Harmon, of course, hasn't won the Open, but he won the Masters in 1949 and didn't make the cup team the next year. And the cold figures on the scoreboard provide some justification for his argument. He shot a morning round of 73 yesterday and was one down. In the afternoon he went out in 33 to gain a six-hole lead when Nary's game came apart and closed out the match four holes later.

A medal play tournament might have produced vastly different results.

UNDER PAR
Burkemo fired an afternoon round of 67, four under the par of 72, for the 6,465-yard Birmingham Country Club course. The 45-year-old Isaacs, unknown and virtually ignored by the crowd of more than 15,000, fired 69-68 and is 7 under par for the four matches he has played. And Henry Ransom, who was eliminated on the 36th green, had two 69s.

Burkemo staged a stirring finish to eliminate Dave Douglas, the Newark, Del., stringbean who had knocked out Lew Worsham, Sam Snead and Jackson Bradley in successive extra-hole matches.

FINAL GREEN
That match went to the final green, just as two of the other three did. Burkemo, who had been 2 down after the morning 18 and then 3-up with three holes to go, finally pulled it out, 2-up, with a magnificent second shot 2½ feet from the pin for an eagle.

Torza, a 5½-foot, 135-pounder, also won the 36th hole with a great second shot and beat Jimmy Clark, the last of the "touring" pros in the tournament, 1-up.

Isaacs, a weather-beaten 45-year-old who has played in seven PGA Tournaments and as many National Opens without getting into the headlines, put on the best finish of all to beat Ransom, 1-up.

Hogan, the U. S. Open golf champion, playing before a jammed gallery of some 6,000 people, shot a 32 on the first nine, and came in with a 38.

Meanwhile Bobby Locke of South Africa, the defending champion, set a new course record at Burnside with a 33-32-65. The former record of 66 was made by Jo Kirkwood, Sr., of the United States in the 1930's.

Hogan was two under par for the first nine, and came in with one over 38 when his putting was somewhat off.

Frank Stranahan, Toledo, Ohio, amateur, was one of the first to finish. He played the championship layout and had a sparkling 37-36-73.

The top flight American pro, Floyd Mangrum of Los Angeles, fired a wind-blown 73 on the championship course.

Mangrum, playing with a local golfer who shot a 90, didn't extend himself in his qualifying round. He went out in 40 and came in with a 38.

California dominated the field Monday as the annual Oregon State Tennis championships got under way at the Irvington Club courts.
