## Eleanor Hits At McCarthy

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt declared here Monday that Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) has done "a great deal of harm to my country."

But she added, "I am speaking as a Democrat, of course."

Mrs. Roosevelt held a news conference here just before leaving by plane for Belgrade on the next leg of a world tour.

Answering foreign and Greek reporters' questions on McCarthy, chairman of the Senate investigations subcommittee, Mrs. Roosevelt said:

"You have to feel very free in the United States these days to disagree with him."

She credited him, however, with "perhaps creating something which is essential"—public realization of the danger of Communism.

She added: "But he has made the great mass of people blindly afraid. . . he will cast a shadow over anybody. . . People in the United States today are afraid to be different, to disagree with neighbors because of the possible consequences."

## Nehru Sees Korean War Continuation

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru declared Monday the attitude of the South Korean government means not only a continuation of the Korean War, but a possible extension of it elsewhere.

He was speaking in Ara, North India, at the opening of a two-day policy conference of the 400 members of the all-India committee of the governing Congress Party. He reviewed the international situation in the light of the recent commonwealth prime ministers' conference in London, Korean events and his talks with the Pakistan prime minister, Mohammed Ali.

The attitude of Dr. Syngman Rhee, the South Korean President, he said, has imperiled the atmosphere of peace that has been built up in the world. In the event of a world war, Nehru said, India will keep aloof and try her best to restore peace although, he added, no country could remain unaffected by such a war.

Because of her neutrality, he went on, India has been able to play her part in the cause of peace and confidence. She is prepared to go to Korea, not to fight anyone there, but to help the situation and discharge the responsibilities assigned her by both sides, he said.

The 16-member congress executive committee, meeting in Delhi Sunday, passed a resolution condemning Syngman Rhee "for making impossible demands for continuation of the war or resumption of it after a stated period."

## Lots of Influence on Film Of Glenn Miller's Life

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Aaron Rosenberg, the man who is producing the film about Glenn Miller's life, agrees with J. Jimmy Durante: "Everybody wants to get into the act."

The producer, once a great football guard at Southern California, remarks: "When I got the Miller story, I thought a lot of people of my generation would be interested in it. But I didn't expect the tremendous personal interest that so many people have about Miller and his band. Everybody has been issuing suggestions, warnings and even threats about what I should do with the picture."

I saw some of the mail he has received. One letter to an Englishman in Salisbury, Southern Rhodesia, who said: "I'm a member of the Glenn Miller Appreciation Society—an ardent Miller fan. The G. M. A. S. is of the opinion that the role should be given to a comparatively unknown actor. . . I doubt if you could get Prince Bernhard of The Netherlands, but the resemblance is good."

Another came from an enlisted man in the RAF: "Might my wife and myself, who are Miller fans and workers of the G. M. A. S., make a suggestion for the Miller role—the star who plays the part of Superman in the serial of the same name. He bears a striking resemblance."

One correspondent urged that "Adios" be played as the last number in the picture, and many dozen have insisted that their own favorite Miller discs be included in the score.

Not all of the letters are polite.

## French Forces In Annam Cleanup

SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — Several battalions of French Union forces have been waging a large scale cleanup operation for 10 days on the mountainous plateaus of Annam in the Angke region, a staff headquarters spokesman said Monday.

There were several clashes Sunday with the Communist-led Vietminh forces of about two companies in which the enemy left 15 dead.

Objective of the operation is to halt infiltration of the Vietminh into a region where last year Communist units made a big effort to make a stand with two regiments.
