St. Louis hitters have topped the senior circuit batting crown 16 times since 1901—six each by Rogers Hornsby and Stan Musial. The others were Jess Burkett, Chick Hafey, Joe Medwick, and Johnny Mize.

The lanky Redbird second baseman gained five points last week to 351 on 11 hits for 27 at bats. Frankie Baumholtz of Chicago moved into the runner-up spot with six.

In the American League, George Kell replaced his Boston Red Sox teammate, Billy Goodman, as the batting leader. Kell collected 12 safeties in 29 trips and hit his percentage 11 points to 341. Goodman dropped to third place as Pete Suder of the Athletics picked up nine points and jumped from sixth to second. Suder is hitting at .326 and Goodman, who fell off eight points, .324.

Goeducks Have Long Necks-It Says Here

OLYMPIA (AP)—Now that it has been pretty well established that there is nothing better anywhere for saltwater sportmen than Puget Sound, let's look into what Olympia can add to that fine sportsman's picture.

The Capital City is at the southernmost tip of the sound, so appropriately enough, that bivalve husky of all bivalves, the goeduck, found it favorable to its growth and multiplication to inhabit the sometimes inaccessible depths of semi-tidal, sand-and-muck tide flats here.

The goeduck, or if you prefer, the goeduck or gweduck—the con-

trovery over the proper spelling of the name and its meaning continues—thrives elsewhere on the sound, but some of its finest beds are located near Olympia.

The fact that huge mounds of sand have to be moved to latch onto one of these bivalves has led to some pretty tall stories of the goeduck's un-clam-like mannerism, its prowess and its speed of motion.

One but has to observe three husky, full-grown men labor in one muddy hole to capture a goeduck as the sound tide rises around them to know how and why these legends spring up.

The goeduck lives in a permanent burrow extending to depths

up to three feet. It feeds by pushing its hose-like neck to the surface through a narrow tunnel. Its bulky body is gripped tightly by the pressure of compacted material around it, and it maintains a suction with the base of its burrow.

It's a mighty firmly planted clam. Many a goeduck has despaired of digging and started tugging the neck which can be torn from the clam by terrific yanking. Unfortunately many clam diggers are over-eager, and one May morning in 1946, the fisheries found the heads of 25 goeducks strewn over a half-mile of tide flat. There's little chowder there, mates.

For you paleontologists, amateur

and otherwise, be informed that the goeduck has been with us many a century.

Evidence of the clam are found in Pliocene formation away down south in the San Fernando Valley of California. It has one of the oldest Puget Sound family trees.

Strangely enough, the goeduck lived peacefully in its soft muck until the white man savored its fine flavor in chowder. The Indians, who called it the hyas squish-squish (hyas means big, and squish-squish is the onomatopoeic description of what happens when one treads near the goeduck) didn't care for it as food.

ANCIENT

The clam's life-span is estimated at from 15 to 40 years. Actually, however, a freshly-dug goeduck looks as if it had been entombed about the time King Tut was.

The clam is exceedingly plump, but the shell appears added as an afterthought. It never quite reaches.

The long neck, of course, was never intended to be protected by the shell, as is the case in most other clams.

That neck, too, is the most highly developed organism of the clam. Within the thick tube of muscle are the twin siphons that daily transport hundreds of gallons of water to and from the goeduck's digestive machinery. An efficient pump handles all that water. A filter catches the minute plant and animal organisms for food.

HEAVY

Tall tales are built up about the size of this clam. Stories of goeducks weighing up to 25 pounds have to be taken with a good amount of that salt that goes with their chowder and patties.

The largest verified record is 10 pounds, a giant dug near Des Moines by Stanley Kop in the spring of 1940.

It is reported that state fisheries inspectors checked the weight but they couldn't convince sea-food fancier Kop the clam should be preserved in the interests of science. Ground up, that clam must have made a whale of a lot of chowder.
