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Today's Women

It is the duty of every woman to hogtie her husband, if necessary, to keep him from taking the family for a jaunt on the so-called open road this Fourth of July.

Unless the lady of the house takes a firm stand, say a number of traffic experts, all 43 million motor cars in the USA will hit the nation's highways at once—forming an immovable mass stretching from coast to coast, with the usual carnage.

The reason they're appealing to the women this time, says Harry W. Arnold, of Columbus, O., president of the American Transit Association, is that they are more realistic than men. Says he:

"Pop is a dreamer, let's face it. Every year when vacation time rolls around he responds to the call of the road, forgetting last year's traffic horrors and fondly believing that things will be different this time."

"But Mom remembers well how the children got sick all over the new car when they were stuck in

that two-hour traffic jam in Philadelphia, how she sprained her wrist trying to help jack up the car to change a tire, how they never could find a motel with a vacancy and how they got lost among a million other cars every time they hit a city.

"It's no use for us to try to convince Pop that holiday motoring is a nightmare. Let Mom do it. She can."

Glen Johnston, of Roanoke, Va., chairman of Project Adequate Roads, spends most of his time trying to un-choke the nation's highways. He heads a committee engaged in a national drive for a system of roads that will make sense out of the motor age. Meanwhile he has some advice for those benighted souls who insist on holiday motoring:

"Avoid congested highways (if you can) and try to bypass cities. The greatest farce in the motoring nightmare is our system of super-highways which converge on a city from all directions, meeting in the middle of town in our vast tangle. "Study a highway map of your route before you start, and try to locate secondary roads which parallel the main highways. They may not be as good, but at least they probably will not be crowded. Try to find roads which will not take you through the middle of a city. Even if it's miles longer, you will save time."

A number of these top traffic experts and city planners are priming their guns for an all-out attack on the national traffic problem at the annual convention of the American Transit Association, to be held in Los Angeles early in August.

France Faces New Taxes

PARIS (AP)—The new government of Premier Joseph Laniel outlined Monday a series of new taxes, reductions of expenditures, and means for paying back advances from the Bank of France through which it hopes to get the nation's teetering economy back on a stable basis.

Roughly, the measures which the Laniel cabinet is proposing are those which caused the downfall of the Rene Mayer government on May 21. Each of the four candidates for Premier who were rejected by the National Assembly during the 37-day crisis which followed Mayer's ouster also said the measures would be needed.

State Plans "Expensive"

SALEM (AP)—The Capitol Journal said Monday that the Glendora Apartments, which the state proposes to buy for \$102,500, were offered for sale in March, 1932, for \$80,000.

The \$102,500 price was approved by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry and State Treasurer Sig Unander.

Gov. Paul L. Patterson, the third member of the board of control, held up the deal.

The apartment house is located in the future Capitol Mall. The newspaper said that in March of last year, the apartment house was listed with several real estate firms for \$80,000.

The governor said the board had two appraisals made. One was for \$103,000, the other \$94,000. Mrs. Della B. Hayden, owner of the Glendora, asked the state to pay \$105,000.

McCarthy Mark Smeared

BALTIMORE (AP)—A red swastika was smeared overnight on the monument dedicated to Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) on the Fourth of July by Temus (Tim) Bright, Baltimore automobile dealer.

Police Sgt. Elmer Healy and Patrolman Joseph Stransky found the eight-foot granite monument defaced on a routine patrol past Bright's showrooms at 4:20 a.m. Lipstick had been used to change a part of the inscription to read: "... Destroyer of American freedom."

The words "statesman, senator, and super-patriot" also had been altered with crayon into obscenities.

Healy and Stransky could find no one near the monument, so they filed a routine report on the incident. They noted there was no real damage to the stone and that the lipstick work could be washed off.

Pair Wed, Gallop Off To Reception

DETROIT (AP)—The bride and groom kissed briefly, then galloped off to the strains of Mendelssohn's "Wedding March" which came from a loud speaker attached to a horse-drawn repair truck.
